WHEN PESETAS GO UP

The Spanish Businessman's Meat Will Be the Tourist's Poison If (or When) Spanish

Exchange Fulfills Present Indications of Rising



value of the peseta in the world's money market is bound to be followed with eager interest and anxious speculation by everyone who has dealings in

lation by everyone who has dealings in foreign exchange. The recent slight improvement in the Spanish currency has been attended with considerable optimism that the rise is more than a passing phase and that it will continue.

Naturally we too have wanted to know what it all means, but inquiries among businessmen and bankers do not result in any very decisive answers, for foreign exchange is always a gamble, and all predictions are offered with very strict qualifications.

However, it is plain that Spanish business interests hope more strongly than a few months ago for an improvement in the peseta. In the centres of Spanish industry, they are talking of the effect of such things as improvement in the agrarian situation and the possibility of fewer labour disputes in Cataluña under the Estafuto.

Of course others do not see any reason for hope, but it is one of the features of this sort of economic discussion that no one dares to speak in straight affirmations. Hope and doubt are employed rather than statement or denial.

However, the possibility of a peseta worth substantially more than at present is viewed with entirely different emotions by the active businessman in Barcelona and the retired businessman keeping a jaundiced eye on the stock market from his retreat in Mallorca.

The tourist, the refugee from the depression, the posessor of a fixed income from England or America sees only calamity in the return of the peseta to its level of, say, two years ago, which would be something like 30 to the pound and 9 to the dollar. For it is recognized that the cost of living would not drop in anything like proportion, any more than it rose in proportion as the peseta declined.

Many residents of Mallorca, already hard hit by American «Bank holidays» and such phenomena, would be obliged at some considerable sacrifice to quit the island. All those Mallorquins who gain their chief support from the tourist trade would

watch a soaring peseta with sorrow and dismay.

Little such feeling would be manifest in other parts of the country. Except for a very few and less important resorts, the tourist trade, although increasing, has not become an important item in Spanish economy.

According to the opinion of several men who have been engaged in business in Barcelona most of their lives, Spain would gain more and suffer fewer disadvantages than most European countries from rising exchange. The reason is that, although impressing the visitor as an old, old country, Spain presents many of the economic problems offered by new, undeveloped nations.

Therefore, the task of national industry is to develop her resources. For this the importation of foreign machinery, of foreign technicians and foreign products is essential. The more a peseta will buy abroad, obviously, the better for the progress of all those industries that depend on importation.

Furthermore, incomes even if not raised by increasing prosperity would buy more. The price of imported articles, so essential to the permanent resident and comparatively unimportant to the visitor, would drop. Decrease in unemployment and a consequent amelioration of Spanish labour troubles could be expected.

The progress of Spanish exchange whether up or down has not displayed any of those rapid and alarming fluctuations which have caused crises in other countries. Six months before the fall of the monarchy, the peseta was about 40 per cent, below par, 8 to the dollar. Then it began to slip and was well over 9 when the revolution occurred. Naturally such an important change in the national regime did not stop the decline.

The gentle slide continued downward. In the early autumn of 1931, just before the pound went off the gold standard, the Government made a determined effort to peg the peseta at 55 to the pound or about 11 to the dollar. It failed, and just a year ago this month, the peseta fell to its lowest point 13.90 to the dollar.

point, 13.29 to the dollar.

The fastest thing about the whole movement was the subsequent recovery. In little over a month Spanish exchange was back at about its present level, just over 12 to the dollar.

Tsapline Exhibition

For six months Mallorca has been sheltering a sculptor of international repute and undoubted genius, Dmitri Tsapline, whose work in native wood and stone is now on view at his studio in Casa Singala, a fine old farmhouse standing back against the hills of Puerto Pollensa.

M. Tsapline has exhibited in Moscow and Paris. Three of his pieces have been bought by the Moscow State Museum and a film has been made of his work in Moscow. After his exhibition in Paris at the Galleries Sloden in 1930, the Paris press, always sceptical of new genius, expressed itself

with rare enthusiasm.

This three years ago. M. Tsapline is now a mature artist with a magnificent technique in wood and stone. Although he is a Russian peasant by birth, there is little primitive about his work. He has, in common with all fine primitive artists, that infallible recognition of the essential characteristics in human and animal forms, and the reduction of those forms to their greatest emotional content. There the resemblance ceases, for Tsapline's work is extremely erudite, not only in the anatomy of his subjects but in mastery of his material. He works in the roughest of stone with a sublime disregard of its flaws, in fact he even uses them to heighten certain effects of ruggedness and strength. His simplifications and eliminations reveal profound structural knowledge.

Since he left his native village and went to stu-

dy at an art school in Saratoff and later in Moscow and Paris, Dmitri Tsapline has never lost his inner vision of what, to him, is fine sculpture. Technically he has admired much both ancient and modern, but not until his first encounter with Egyptian sculpture in a Moscow museum did he recognise his artistic kinship. Tsapline has been able to learn much from modern masters and yet escape modernity. In his

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work there is not a trace of the undigested idea or the self-conscious application of intellectual formulae. Intellect is there, as in all great art, but fused with emotion to true sculptural ends.

The first impression of Tsapline's work is of immense, almost oppressive strength; even of brutality, but only where brutality is implicit in the nature of the subject as in the panther and the birds of prey. One feels that no really civilized man could express nature with such a ruthless clarity, with such a non-anthropomorphic vision, reducing an animal to the very essence of its brutality or a bird to such a symbol of life's sinister reality. Nor could any quite primitive artist be capable of such formal conceptions.

But brutality and ruthlessness are only phases of life and Tsapline sees life clearly and sees it whole. There is a serene archaic, almost nostalgic beauty in the stone «Woman's Head», and the «Wooden Figure» has the tender poignant grace of all young life. In it, young tree life and young

female life are magically fused.

There is in all Tsapline's work a combination of sensitiveness and strength, of powerful emotional content and masterly technique, and although the artist himself prefers to regard this relatively small sculpture as preparation for larger, more architectural work, M. Tsapline's «experiments» in Mallor quin stone rank with sculpture of any age.

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The Tennis Tournament

The best week of tennis Mallorca has ever seen is drawing to an end on the courts of the local club, and the chances are that the championships of Palma's first international tournament will be taken back to Barcelona by the players who came over from that city.

Our choice for the title is Mr. Crawshay Williams, the English novelist and one of the best veteran players of England, while Mrs. Williams is almost certain to win the women's singles. The first prediction is, perhaps, a little risky since as this goes to press (and if the threatening rain holds off) Williams is meeting Dominguez in one of the semi-finals. Dominguez, who is doing better than any other local player, showed excellent tennis in beating Servera, 6-3, 6-3, Crolius, 6-4, 7-5 and Viñamata, one of the Barcelona visitors, 6-4, 7-5. Williams was beating Roddy, 8-6, 6-0 and Park 9-7, 2-6, 6-4.

Esteva plays J. Blanch and L. Carles meets Calatell to enter the other semi-final. Blanch and Carles are the two best of the young players sent over by Barcelona, and both of them are interesting to watch. Carles beat Gray, last year's champion of the Baleares, 7-5, 6-4.

In the women's singles Miss Dahl beat Mrs. Spittall 6-2, 7-5 to enter the finals and will meet the winner of a match between Mrs. Williams and Miss Witty. Mrs. Williams beat Mme. de la Bruyere, 6-0, 6-0 and Miss Witty disposed of Mrs. Leader, 6-3, 7-5.

Most of the doubles matches remain to be played, and since all the Barcelona players must return home on Monday evening, it is possible that the mixed doubles will not be finished, at least with the visitors.

Today's semi-final matches and tomorrow's finals should bring out excellent tennis.

There is also included in the program a consolation tournament for the losers, of which several matches have already been played, but this too may have to be completed after the visitors have gone, which will make it a consolation prize indeed.

The gallery to watch the play has been increasing every day, although admission is only to members and by invitation.

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More British Fleet

Tomorrow (Monday) units of the British Fleet will begin arriving in Puerto Pollensa, but there will not be so much social gayety as distinguished the visit of the three battleships to Palma last month. For the present contingent is working on manoeuvres and will not have so much time or shore leave.

The ships arriving tomorrow are the battleships Nelson and Rodney. On Thursday the aircraft carriers Courageous and Furious will come in, and on Friday the cruisers Dorsetshire, York and Exeter, the minelayer Adventure and a group of destroyers. All these vessels will remain until Mar. 15th. Also coming on Friday is the cruiser Cairo, which will stay until the 20th.

Still another unit of the Fleet will visit Palma, but also in the course of a working cruise, on the 17th to remain until the 24th, while late in the month additional ships will call at Pollensa.

More Tourists

The Hamburg American Line is adding another vessel to the list of tourist steamers visiting Palma. Their agents, Baquera, Kusche y Martin, announce that the Oceana, of 14,000 tons, will spend the day of March 20th here.

Exchange of the Week

Despite much political stirring, the peseta continued to rise slightly. Dollars closed the week at 12, as against 12.06 and 100 francs dropped from 47.55 to 47.45. The pound, however, also rose, and starting at 41.25 went to 41.40. These figures are of the Madrid bourse as furnished by the Credito Balear.

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The Blue Cave of Cabrera

A PPROACHING Cabrera but about a mile to the left of the entrance to the harbor is a «blue» cave, which in the beauty of its effects deserves to be as famous as that of Capri, even if it has not had the distinction of being the bathing place (legendary) of the Emperor Tiberius.

The entrance, made from the west, is rather small and low, giving onto a surprising domed height within. The interior is almost circular, about eighty meters in diameter, ample room for thirty or forty feluccas to lie at anchor. There would be more than enough depth for them, since the indigo waters are 100 to 120 feet. The best time of day to visit this cave is just before sunset.

Santiago Rusiñol describing Miramar in his book, L'Illa de la Calma, says: «There was once a child on this island who would never take a bath because he was afraid of dyeing himself blue.»

What would my good friend have said if he had visited the Blue Cave of Cabrera? For surely this child would have been not only afraid to bathe in the cave but even to enter it lest he become impregnated with the blue, so deep is the color. Actually, from a little boat in the cave every movement of the oars or the hands trailing in the water seems to set up ripples not of water but of ink, but ink of such a crystal transparency that any object can be

seen at a great depth.

The phenomenon of this cave can be seen under two aspects, when the sea is calm and when the wind blows from the west. Only in the first case, and better when the sun shines a little into the mouth of the cave, do we see the perfection of the clear blue tone.

But when it blows a bit from the west, there is set up a succession of waves and surges which produce the most completely Dantesque effect which it is possible to imagine. The undertow which sends the waters booming and gurgling

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and swishing on the steep rocky sides of the caves creates an infinity of sounds, strange and wonderful, which echo and re-echo and mingle with each other. This weird music, combined with the diversity of color in the water and reflections on the walls, is something majestic, impressive, powerful, one of those spectacles which impress upon one the littleness of man and the grandeur of nature's

The blue cave of Capri is visited daily by hundreds of tourists, and some of them have converted the island into a paradise with their chalets and villas, but men who have visited both assure me that ours at Cabrera is the more wonderfut. Finally, it is appropriate to conclude with the paragraph in which the Archduke Louis Salvador closes his description of Cabrera:

«Most beautiful of all is the view of Cabrera as one approaches or departs; far away one can see the cap llebets and the bowl of the harbor with rising ground crowned by the castle. Nearer are the precipices of the Conejera and the other little islands, the point of the Isla Pobre and in the distance at the left the Isla Foradada.

«The boat is bearing us swiftly over the foam flecked waves towards the coast of Mallorca, which soon we shall see. God grant that we may be permitted to visit again, at least to see once more, the shores which we are leaving. And with this desire I shall close this description of the Island of Cabrera, which has earned by affection.»

GINGER ALE MIRE

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After a month of strenuous rehearsals, which they say were great fun as well as hard work, the actors of the Palma Theatre Guild are almost ready to show the public what they can do. This includes Mabel Scott and John Georgii, who have been with the Vagabond Players in Baltimore, one of the best amateur organizations in America; Capt. and Mrs. Sullavan-Tailyour, who played in the Guild's first production a year ago, The Dever Road; Roscoe Fitts, whose career as an All-American fullback and first string basketball player ought to give him the necessary experience to play his role of an athletic young man.

The others in the cast are Mrs. Hugh Flower,

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who is a daughter of Lord Claud Hamilton, Peter Owen, Leonora Hebard and Mrs. Lawrence Glass.

The Guild's committee have fixed a top price of 6 pesetas for the evening performance and 4.50 for the matinee. The first ten rows of the stalls will be sold at these prices, and the remainder at 4 pesetas in the evening and 3 for the matinee. A general admission to the balcony (especially designed for Spanish students of English) will be 2 peseias and 1.50.

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
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The Week in Spain

The Spaniard's Sunday entertainment is the bullfight; the German generally prefers electing a new Reichstag. Today it will for the first time be possible for Germans living abroad to indulge in their national pastime and take part in the election being held at home. The Reich, anxious to get as many votes as possible for the Hitler government, has adopted a scheme for absentee voting.

So today the Halle of the Hamburg America Line will be in Barcelona and take on board all Germans provided with an election certificate from the Consulate and a ticket from the steamship agents — price, 10 Ptas. The election party will then sail out beyond Spanish territorial waters and

cast their votes.

As the followers of Hitler are supposed to be numerous among the German colonies abroad, the trip may not be altogether a pleasure for those known to hold more peaceful political views. However, we hear that shotguns will not be allowed on board.

Some interesting excavations have been made at San Cugat and other places in Cataluña. Under the church and cloisters at San Cugat the remains of the basilica of an early monastery have been found together with the ruins of an adjoining cloister containing a number of ancient sepulchres, which are believed to have been destroyed by Almanzor, the Caliph who was famous for his persecution of Christians (754-775 A.D.)

In Tarrasa three basilicas of churches of the sixth century have been unearthed, and in Boades Castellgari near Manresa the *Amics de l'Art Vell*, have excavated a large Roman sepulchre and an Iberian necropolis on top of which the Romans built. Round about are traces of a Roman village.

Most of Barcelona's students have returned to their studies after a strike that lasted several weeks. The principal cause of the boycott was that the students objected to the giving of positions requiring profound theoretical knowledge to people without University training just because they would accept a lower salary. The question is to be studied by the Government, and an early solution is expected.

The Barcelona bourse had a very slack time last week owing to rumours of a «crisis». There was very little business done, and on Thursday the first transaction was not effected until a quarter of an hour after the opening, something that has never been recorded before.

The Cortes went back to its work after Carnival to resume the debate which has been important enough to be called a crisis in all the papers, and at the end of it the Azaña Government defeated a vote of lack of confidence by 191 to 128, its second

victory during the debate.

However, the general impression of the Spanish press seems to be that the position of the ministry is not as firm as this vote would seem to indicate. Indeed, there are so many important problems coming up in the next few weeks that it is difficult to predict anything, a circumstance which has not kept the political prophets silent by any means.

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Old Catalán Customs

IV. Sant Medir

According to an old legend, St. Medir, a Catalán peasant had his farmhouse near the road from Barcelona to San Cugat del Valles, the road that is now called la Rabassada. One day he was sowing beans when the prelate of Barcelona, St. Sever, passed while fleeing from his heathen persecutors. After some hours the pursuers reached the farm-house, asking Medir if he had seen the prelate. He answered that he had.

«He passed while I was sowing these beans,» he added, turning and showing them the plants which had, by a miracle, become fully grown in a few hours. The heathen thought he was making fun of them and killed him on the spot.

In that place a hermitage was built in remembrance of the martyr and an annual pilgrimage is made there on March 3rd, the anniversary of St. Medir's death.

About a hundred years ago the hermitage achieved greater fame when a pastry cook named Vidal, from the village of Gracia, now part of Barcelona, in order to be cured of some disease promised to make an annual pilgrimage to the place. He was cured. Afterwards with great enthusiasm and ceremony, he organized a pilgrimage every year for himself and his friends. Before starting out, he drove through the streets of the village in his carriage with drums and whistles to induce other people to follow his example and take part in the procession in honour of the Saint who, miraculously, had cured him of his pains. Soon the pilgrimage became a general custom of the people from Gracia because the pastry cook's enthusiasm spread to the whole village, and is still extant.

The people set out in parties an an early hour, going in carriages and accompanied by riders on horseback dressed in black. Each group has a flag and takes pride in the elaborate decoration of both horses and vehicles. Many come from surrounding villages on foot to see the procession and spend a day in the country. The pilgrims, after a ceremony at the hermitage, either picnic in the hills or lunch at a restaurant nearby.

A torchlight procession meets the returning pilgrims and takes them through the streets of Gracia.

The speaker discoursed for an hour on the discovery, history and development of Cuba, which received its nickname not only because of its ideal climate, scenery and physical resources but the character of the people as well.

The island's commerce, politics, and climate were described, and illustrated with personal anecdote, and the national game-jai-alai, the same as Basque pelota-was not forgotten. No doubt many of his hearers were surprised to learn that political prisoners are sometimes still lodged in the lower dungeons of the famous Morro Castle.



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The Spirit of the Enfermeria Evangelica

(Probably the greatest tribute to the work of this organization, next to the praise of former patients, is the enthusiasm which it has aroused among those who help support it. We have pleasure in publishing herewith a letter from one of them.)

was greatly pleased to read the excellent article by C.H.D.G. in The Spanish Times of January 29th, 1933, but I am rather sorry that more could not have been said in praise of the splendid work of this Institution, of which I have had intimate knowledge for many years. I feel sure that C.H.D.G. wished to include more information about the Hospital, but no doubt the lack of space available reduced the length of the article.

There are many who do not perhaps understand why this hospital is called the «Enfermeria Evangelica.» It is because that name was required by the donors in the original constitution in perpetuity A second reason is that the nurses are qualified Christian nurses who are devoted as Christians to their duty as such and carefully attend to the needs of patients day and night. Furthermore the name «Evangelica» does not exclude the hospital from taking in patients of different religious faiths (otherwise it would not be truly evangelical), or those who are not evangelical in faith. Many more nonevangelical patients have been taken in than evangelical patients. More Roman Catholics have been treated there than those of any other religious faith and practically all of the hundreds of patients cared for have nothing but praise for the skilled treatment given them there.

Mr. George Lawrence (the President of the Hospital), Miss Wilks (the English Matron, who is also a certified first class nurse), members of the Hospital Committee, including the writer, have received a great many letters from patients who have been treated there, desperate cases whose lives have been saved by skillful surgical treatment and constant, devoted nursing by certified and fully qualified nurses of long experience in many different hospitals and who speak several languages such as German, French, Spanish, English. We would be glad to publish some of the many letters received if space were permitted in your valuable

Suffice it to state that this hospital has never had an endowment fund but it has been wonderfully (I might say providentially) sustained by its friends of all nationalities who realize its great value, especially by the foreign colonies, since the year 1880, as stated. This hospital is one of the best in Barcelona and needs an endowment fund.

The nursing staff is compelled, for lack of funds, to live in the hospital practically 24 hours per day and 365 days per year, among sick people. Which one of us would be willing to do this? Would we not perhaps become despondent or even «loco» if we did? Yet these devoted Christian nurses are pleased to do their work, however unpleasant, because «the love of Christ constrains them» and that is one reason why it is called an «Evangelical» Hospital, because of the evangelical spirit of love which prevails there, and that is also one reason why this hospital has been so successful in

its treatment of all cases, both rich and poor who receive the same careful, conscientious treatment.

The nurses of the Enfermeria are poorly paid in remuneration for such skilled and devoted service. The hospital is in debt on account of improvements made during past years, such as the installation of hot water heating and baths, a first class operation room and table, adequate medical staff and nurses, etc., but we should like to clear this debt during 1933 and we believe it will be done if all members of our foreign colonies will do their part; therefore we appeal to all who may be interested in such a cause to contribute whatever amount they can. Would 50 centimos per day be too much for each of us to contribute when many of us spend much more than this amount on theatres, cines, tobacco, sweets and many other luxuries? Many of us could afford to give from one to two pesetas per day or say 50 or 100 pesetas per month if we would be willing to cut down some unnecessary luxuries. I do not wish to offend anyone by suggesting this, and I do not mean to boast when I state that my own contribution has amounted to at least two pesetas per day or more and I am glad of the opportunity of helping so little in such a worthy cause. It is money well spent.

We are sure that the supporters of the Hospital Enfermeria Evangelica will be glad to know that two members have been added to the Hospital Committee Board of Directors (subject to their approval) and that these two new members are well known ladies in the foreign colonies, namely, Mrs. Carl C. Long and Mrs. George Noble both of whom have taken always an active interest in the Hospital. We are sure that their support will greatly strengthen the work of the Committee as well as being of great assistance to the Matron and nursing staff of the Hospital.

It is kindly suggested that those who know little if anything, about the work of the Hospital should take the first opportunity of visiting it and I am sure the President or the Matron will be greatly pleased to show the entire plant and explain how patients are received and taken care of.

In conclusion, I would state that for every *new* subscriber giving 50 centimos or more per day, I will gladly contribute at least 50 centimos in addition to what I already give. I make this offer during the year 1933 in order to wipe out completely our Hospital indebtedness. This is a sincere challenge which I trust will be accepted by all those who wish to be «good sports» in helping a needy cause.

I wish to add that many Spaniards are loyal contributors to the Hospital.

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Street of Two Lives

PARCELONA possesses at least one Dr. Jekyli-Mr. Hyde dual personality. It exists in nothing more startling than a street but is is no less a doubleself, working a strange transformation every Saturday night from a luridly gay «white way» swarming with seekers after recreation among bright neonilluminated cafés, theatres, cinemas, cabarets and penny arcades, to a gently quiet second-hand book market no less thronged in the morning sunshine with seekers after recreation rummaging among, if not purchasing, countless books — from paper-backed Dick Norton, the Hero of the Far West, to magnificently-bound Don Quixote, sold at five centimos or ten times as many pesetas.

The street is the broad highway commonly called the Paralelo which has one end in the port and the Atarazanas barracks and the other in the Plaza España and the entrance towers to the Exposition grounds. In the days of the monarchy its official name was the Avenida Marques del Duero and the establishment of the Republic saw it changed to the Avenida Francisco Layret, but in spite of these transformations it was and still remains the Paralelo to most residents of Barcelona.

For seven nights a week the Paralelo is the center of the city's theatrical, music hall and sporting life. For as many afternoons its wide sidewalks serve as a playground, promenade and solarium for the young, old and sick who emerge from the dark, cold and damp slum quarter which it borders, to enjoy the warm sunshine. But from ten o'clock every Sunday morning until two o'clock in the afternoon it is Barcelona's library. Along a line of several blocks of makeshift stalls, tables and mere piles of books there is a steady parade of readers or collectors searching for printed matter to their

As in most large second-hand book markets, varied as these tastes are, they are almost sure to be satisfied. There are volumes in all languages from highly technical texts and scientific works to simple primary lesson books in languages, geography or history. There are bibles and catechisms, ribald tales, sensational novels and economic treatises. Mingled with social philosophy, pornography and picture postcards from bygone eras are year books, old calendars and railroad timetables. There are also magazines, English, French, German and American; opera scores and librettos, dramas, tangos and etchings. Among these three may also be found pencil sharpeners and stamps, the missing pictures for album collections, comic papers and flints for cigarette lighters. If they grow tired of literary pursuits, book-lovers may pause for a moment at the street corners to listen to the speeches of hawkers selling razor blades, umbrellas, toys, buns or canaries. For refreshment, moreover, there are churreria stands with heaps of potato chips and rings of churros, and hand carts with a grand variety of nuts and beans.

In existence for many years, Barcelona's big book market is, in a large measure, amadeur. The majority of its booksellers are workers or youngsters who collect or buy books or stamps or pictures or comic papers in their spare time and spend four hours of their Sunday selling or exchanging them. Much of their trade is

drawn from the city's working classes to whom the street library is a Sunday means of self-education. The stand-keepers, some of whom are regular book dealers, pay a small tax to the city for the privilege of using the sidewalk but the dozens of boys who carefully arrange their stock in trade on the ground manage to escape the payment.

The booksellers maintain an organization to protect their common interests. It is said that there is a movement now to move the market to some other site.

Stribling-Uzcudum Bout in Barcelona?

Ever since Primo Carnera and Paulino Uzcudum drew 80,000 spectators in Barcelona during the Exposition, the sponsors of such entertainments have been turning wistful eyes to this city as a potential harvesting ground. The belief that Barceiona would be a boom town for a big fight rests on a little more than the huge Exposition crowd that came to see Uzcudum and Carnera exchange their mighty blows. Paris has been favourably impressed with several Spanish boxers recently, and it is held that a country which produced them must also be keen on the sport.

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The New Films

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BARCELONA will be the only city in Spain which will see this year the screen version of Noel Coward's great success, Cavalcade. This unique spectacle will be shown here next month, and the emotion it arouses was given expression recently by Sydney W. Carroll in the Sunday Times.

Rackety Rax, the film which Fox has made from Joel Sayre's satire on big college football in America, came to the Femina yesterday to show Barcelona the comedy of sporting «racketeers» trying to capture the profits from university foot-

ball. Victor McLaglen, heading the cast, is fortunate to have a role even funnier than those he played in What Price Glory and The Cock-Eyed World. Greta Nissen, platinum blonde beauty, is cast as the «sweetie» of the racketeer. The action of the picture takes place in Broadway night clubs and football fields from the Yale Bowl to the Pacific

Coast. On the same bill is another Fox picture, Wild Girl, the Charles Farrell-Joan Bennett film which captures the colourful but elusive spirit of the California mining camps in the gold rush era. It is extremely well adapted from Bret Harte's Salome Jane's Kiss and was made in the giant forest of the Sequoia National Park.

Usually it is easy to interview authors; sometimes it is difficult to avoid doing so, but a talk with Robert E. Burns, who wrote I am a Fugitive from a Chain Gang was attended with difficulties, for he is really a fugitive with a price on his head. But not so long ago it was done. A long ride through darkness, three knocks on a suburban house door and there was the man who lives in hiding, in constant dread of extradition to the State from whose chain gang he twice escaped and of whose penal system he wrote the book from which War-

Burns, whose story forms the tragic plot of the film, has not seen it; he doesn't dare show himself in public. Hence the ride to a secret rendezvous.

A smallish man with glasses, he does not look like the man for whom Georgia is seeking that he may serve the remainder of a term of years for the theft of a few dollars. He talked of war days when he served as early as July, 1917, brigaded with the British Forces. He told of coming home to Brooklyn, his pre-war job gone. He escaped; he was an honoured and honourable citizen of Chicago for seven years; he married through blackmail, was betrayed by his wife, returned to servitude, escaped a second time and then came the years of hiding.

Suddenly there was a knock on the door. «I can't afford to take chances. I got to get out of here,» said Burns and away he went.

Antonio Nicolau

Antonio Nicolau is dead and Catalán music faces this loss when it has scarcely recovered from that of Vives. It is a loss indeed, for it was Nicolau who taught the people of Cataluña to understand and love the works of Wagner, Schumann, Mendelssohn, Weber and Beethoven.

Born in Barcelona in 1858, he left at the age of twenty to study in Paris, returning in 1886. In that year this city heard for the first time his three symphonic poems, El triumfo de Venus, Spes and Henora, which had met approval in Paris four years earlier. He devoted himself to raising the general standard of music in Barcelona, a matter of hard work and little gain. He produced parts of Wagner's Ring in 1896 and 1900 and with the Orfeó Catalá, which he organized, conducted Beethoven's Ninth Symphony. He was director of the Sociedad Catalana de Conciertos and head of the Municipal School of Music for over 31 years.

For the fourth time in that many years Madge Macbeth has come to Mallorca as a climax to her travels through Spain. Before the Península had been put on the map as the tourist's mecca, she started from her home in Ottawa with an order from the publisher of a Canadian magazine to do a series of articles on the land of Don Quixote.

Once in Spain, Mrs. Macbeth became so absorbed in the legends, history, customs and attitude of the Spanish people that she made an exhaustive study of these matters on her own. The result was an engrossing book called *Off the Gangplank to Spain*, published in Canada over a year ago.

Madge Macbeth has been writing ever since she can remember. (There's a story in her family that she started to rewrite the Bible at the tender age of three.) Her versatility in the literary field is seen in the number of subjects she has covered for newspapers and magazines as well as in the form of novels. Of the many books which she has to her credit, the one she enjoyed doing most was a novel, *Shackles*.
