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PALMA CELEBRATES 702nd EASTER SERVICE

New Kidnaping Fires Indignation as Police Follow Fresh Lindbergh Clue

A new and sensational kidnaping, carried on almost exactly in the same manner as that of the infant son of Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh fired the indignation of the United States.

The victim was a young woman of Lincoln, Nebraska, who was taken from her home while her parents slumbered peacefully nearby. Ransom of \$10,000 was demanded by the abductors.

Meanwhile police of the Eastern Seaboard states worked on a new and carefully guarded clue which they hope will develop into a definite informational background for the apprehension of the kidnapers of the Lindbergh baby.

No information other than the simple fact that a new clue had been discovered was given to reporters by the police. It was understood, according to latest wireless reports, that the police wish to

work this time without the benefit of publicity.

The entire United States, if not the entire world, anxiously was awaiting news of the development of the new discovery, and the press was cooperating to the extent of withholding any confidential information it might gain as to the latest maneuvers in the search for the missing child.

World News Briefs

BREMEN.—This city's chief enterprise, shipbuilding, may be stopped entirely in the near future. Notices of the termination of contracts were sent out to employes. The yard is the cradle of the famous North German Lloyd liners.

HELSINGFORS.—The Finnish Athletic Association presented its annual gold medal to the famous "flying Finn", Paavo Nurmi. The great long-distance runner receives it this year for the fourth consecutive time.

ATHENS.—The strange cruise of the Argentine Cruiser Choco wound up here. The captain of the craft tried to debark his carload of "undesireables" on Greek soil. Authorities of the port gave orders that not one man should be allowed to leave the ship, but when the Argentinian put out it was feared she would drop her cargo of political prisoners on some famous but unguarded little Peloponesian isle.

SAN ROSSORE, Italy.—King Boris and Queen Giovanna of Bulgaria arrived here to spend the Easter holidays with the Italian Royal Family.

PARIS.—It is stated on good authority that the French government has approved the final details for a loan to Poland making possible the construction of a railroad from Upper Silesia to the port of Gdynia.

ORAN.—The French aviators Bossoutroa and Rossi took off here in an attempt to beat the closed circuit long distance record, now held by their compatriot Lebriz, with 10,372 meters.

PARIS.—Officials of the Banque de France were warned to be on the lookout against the dissemination of several million dollars worth of counterfeit ten dollar bills reported to have been made in New York.

Ancient Ceremony Re-enacted Here At Old Cathedral

In accordance with a custom 702 years old, the Devout of Palma yesterday re-enacted the burial of Jesus of Nazareth.

For it was 702 years ago that Don Jaime of Spain—later named King Jaime I of Majorca—drove from their mosques the Moors and proclaimed this Island a Christian nation.

So yesterday, when the solemn ceremony of the burial of the image of Jesus was held in the Cathedral of Palma, none perhaps were so impressed as those who realized the tradition of seven centuries which permeated the sacred observance.

The Cathedral—started in the spring following the autumn in which Don Jaime and his forces of armed knights descended upon the Moorish occupants of Majorca and by steel and lance beat them into submission—the cathedral, witnessed once again the re-nactment of these most Holy of rites.

Hours before the time set for the observance, pilgrims from all parts of the Island had set their camp stools in a great U-shaped formation in front of the high altar. Those who came later ranged themselves within the hollow space and stood in reverent silence waiting for the services to begin. All of the pews had been removed.

Almost before anyone realized it, there came down from the steps of the High Altar a group of Seminary students. Each carried a lighted taper and held his hat upon his breast. Those in the front rank carried silken banners.

Next came the Cannons of the church some attired in formal garb similar to European or American evening clothes, and behind them came the priests and officials of the church in robes of black and crimson.

A deep silence pervaded the ancient cathedral as the procession wound its way down the aisle.

Then—as down the Altar steps came the Image of the Body of Jesus—there arose a chant, a lamentation, which filled the towering House of Worship with

TORNADO DEATHS REACH 400

U. S. Rushes Relief To Stricken Area In South

WASHINGTON.—Official reports received here from the tornado devastated sections of Alabama, Tennessee and Kentucky placed the death toll at 400. More than 1,000 persons were seriously injured

The report stated that the property damage in the 500-mile area, through which the tornado swept earlier this week, would run into the millions. Communication has been re-established with all but the remotest parts of the Cumberland. The mountain regions however, escaped the brunt of the storm.

A notion-wide appeal for funds has brought generous response and relief agencies reported they were able to carry on their work efficiently.

Starting with a list of 106 lives lost, the number of known dead and injured has increased each day as new communities were heard from.

Pestilence, due to lack of housing and sanitation facilities, left a trail of suffering in the wake of the tornado. Aided by airplanes, which dropped supplies to isolated sections, local health authorities have been able largely to check a spread of disease

a sweet and dolorous cadence of a despair.

Trembling—crystal clear and fresh as a drop of suspended water—the first notes carried beyond the confines of the great church, and spent themselves upon the sea and sky beyond.

It was the chorus of the Schola Cantorum—the young boy's choir.

To this sound was joined the heavy basso chants of the older men, and the baritone pronuciamientos of the Canons of the Church.

The Image of the Body of Jesus was borne on a funeral slab, draped in deepest black. To the rounded, reverberating notes of the funeral chant, the bearers of the funeral cortege slowly made their way between the isles of kneeling worshippers.

Arch-bishop José Miralles, Bishop of Palma, in splendid red and purple robes, followed the bier.

Once around the interior of the Cathedral the procession made its way and paused again in front of the High Altar. There the Image of the Body of Jesús was placed in a golden casket, where will repose until the ceremony of the Resurrection on Easter Morn.

At 6:30 o'clock Sunday morning in the Church of Santa Eulalia will be held the unique *Procession del Botet*, at which the Virgin Mary will dance with joy at the news of the resurrection of the Son of God. The Figure of the Virgin Mary will be made to dance as she is carried about the courtyard of the Church.

At 9 a. m. in the Cathedral will be the meeting of the Virgin and Jesus, and at 10:30 the Pontifical Mass, with its attendant ceremony and sacred ritual, will be celebrated.
