PARIS, Tuesday. - The new Paul Boncour cabinet meets its first test when it faces the Chamber of Deputies Thursday.

The premier will read his declaration of policy, after which the subject will be brought up for debate by the deputies. It is expected that the debate will result in the government's being given an easy majority.

## Wheat Price Still Scraping Bottom

prices continue to scrape bottom in the world's great markets and experts on commodity trends see no hope of a recovery for some time to come.

During the past eight years the value of wheat has dropped 77 per cent, directly causing the present crisis among the farmers, particularly in America, where the agricultural sections are all more or less specialized and not self-supporting.

In his speech to Congress, the A panic was narrowly averted first since the December 15 deadline for payment of war debts to the United States, the Presi, regarding the three-barrelled subject of debts, international economic collaboration and disarmament.

> He proposes appointment of a delegation, consisting of both Democrats and Republicans, which would serve at the disarmament conference and at the same time be handy to negotiate on debts, now the largest question on the international political horizon.

> Discussions regarding revision, he pointed out, are not to be neld with all debtor nations but only with those which have not defaulted.

In this statement political observers see trouble as it is bound to meet with antagonism from the French who have defaulted and elected a new cabinet presumably more hostile to payment than the old. On the other hand support of Britain is assured as she has paid but with the understanding that the sum be considered a part of any future Gifts, both for Christmas and settlement which must come about by next June.

That President Hoover is bent upon getting his own way at least in some matters was seen in his statement regarding the refusal of Congress to appoint a debts commission as Hoover requested. # To Break Atoms

BERKELEY, Cal.-He's little, but plenty tough, is this fellow, Lithium Atom.

So tough, in fact, that Dr. M. Stanley Livingston, of the University of California, had to design machinery weighing tons to smash him.

Shooting atomic bullets from Henry Ford is, as usual, the Dr. Livigston's machine with an energy of more than 700'000 electron volts, three University of California scientists, Dr. Livingtoms of helium gas.

This confirmed work done by British physicists, who used low protons shot at litium atoms combined with them and releas ed energy.

Not satisfied with handing the atom such a jolt, Dr. Livingston annunced he had a larger machine containing one of world's largest magnets, which is now producing hydrogen molecule ions with an energy oi 3,600-

The earliest possible date on which the paper pound sterling will again be redeemable in gold is probably July 1, 1933, but it is more likely that the return to gold will not be made until long after that

Present directors of Britain's financial destiny, Chancellor of the Exchequer Neville Chamberlain, Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald, whose official title is First Lord of the Treasury, and the mystery man of the Bank of England, Governor Montagu Nor man, all agree that Britain's currency must at some future date again be linked with gold, as the most satisfactory medium of exchange hitherto discovered.

They are practically certain, also, that when the pound sterling is again stabilized on a gold basis it cannot be at the proud old parity of approximately \$4. 86 to the pound. It will have to be at some lower still undetermined level. It may be between \$3 and \$3.50, or it may be higher or lower. Future events will determine the exact future parity.

«Just the Other Day» is an intormal history of Britain since the war, and is described as the «Only Yesterday» of England. It is the work of John Collier and lain Lang, and is issued by Har-

This reviewer thinks it could have been much more interesting, and that the authors went about their work with a British lack of humor. It Frederick Lewis Allen never had written «Only Yesterday,» it might enjoy a great success in America, but it never can hope to achieve the sale of his fascinating book.

In these pages you will find Llody George, the rise of the Labor Party, the Irish revolution with its Black and Tans and Sinn Fein, the coming of Ramsay Mac-Donald and Stanley Baldwin, sidelights onvarious Britishers from the Prince of Wales to Bernard Shaw, and a flashback to the career of «Colonel» Barker, the woman who posed as a man so successfully she married a girl and lived with her five years before her fraud was discovered.

There seems to be a widely accepted opinion that nobody is going to give Christmas presentr this year. But it's time to be talking about gift books, anyway. There came this week from the Oxford University Press a new translation of Homer's «Odyssey.» It is the work of T. E. Shaw, more familiar to American readers as the Lawrence of «Lawrence in Arabia» and «Revolt in the Desert»
