VATICAN CITY, Wednesday-Although negotiations are well under way for the signing of a concordat between Germany and the Vatican the final move must be made by the Berlin government, according to high papal authorities. The report here said that Chancellor Adolf Hitler is now considering the question of the feasibility of permitting the reorganization of certain Catholic societies, which were dissolved at his order.

The Vatican is particularly anxious that the Hitler government should allow certain societies to resume activities. These organizations are regarded as vital to the welfare of the church in the predominatel protestant atmosphere of Germany.

For such a concession the Vatican is prepared to sacrifice such political affiliations as were previously held in Germany.

Franz Von Papen, vice chancellor of Germany and premier of Prussia was given an audience

SPAIN MAY ACT TO Unfavorable Weather **STOP IMMIGRATION OF GERMAN JEWS**

Fear Of Competition In Legal And Medical Professions, Not Prejudice Against Race, Starts Movement.

MADRID, Wednesday-The Jew today again seems destined to «pick up his accustomed staff» and seek new and more hospitable lands.

Spain, since the anti-Jewish activities of Adolf Hitler, has received within her frontier countless German Jews who are no longer safe in the nation of their birth.

Now, there is a growing opposition to the admission of the exiles in the Peninsula.

The opposition is not based or race prejudice, but on the purely practical grounds of the competition the influx will put up against Spaniards.

Both the Madrid Bar Council and the General Medical Council have held public meetings to consider the danger to their members if professional Jews are admitted to Spain without restriction.

The point has been raised that, while Spanish law can prevent German Jews from embarking on medical or legal careers in this country, if the immigrants are refused permission to practice

Conditions Prevent Balbo's Ocean Flight

BELFAST, Wednesday. - Unfavorable weather conditions preventd General Balbo and his Italian air armada from taking off today on their flight to Chicago where their arrival is awaited anxiously as one the most spectacular features of the «Century of Progress» exposition.

General Balbo hopes that his fleet of 23 seaplanes will be able to continue its journey not later than Friday.

Autogiro At Chicago **Attracts Spectators To Spanish Display**

CHICAGO, Wednesday - Spain's exhibition at the Century of Progress Fair is the center of attraction today as a result of publicity given to Juan La Cierva, Spanish inventor of the autogiro.

La Cierva, inventor of the first lighter-than-air machine capable of descending vertically, was honored when 10,000 inventors of all nationalities gathered to witness the award to him of the Guggenheim medal.

The Spaniard was given the medal in recognition of his contribution to the cause of safety in the air.

Spaniards present at exposition are rejoicing over their nation's sudden leap to the fore; hitherto, most of the credit for aviaton exhibits had gone to the Italians, whose painstaking efforts resulted in a marvelous display of progress in aviation.

As the American public, besides being interested in the Italian showing, is closely following the transatlantic flight of General Italo Balbo's 24 airplanes, it was difficult for another nation to cut in on the glory of the Italians.

When the Guggenheim medal was awarded, it was pointed out that La Cierva's machine is entirely his own invention, and not a helicopter, as many people believe.



GENEVA, Wednesday-For the the depression, employment is showing signs of decreasing, statistics released today by the International Labor Office reveal. According to the labor office, England in the year ended June, 1933, reduced her army of jobless by 6.6 per cent, Canada by 7.7 per cent, France by 2.5 per cent, Ger-

many by 9.8 per cent, Finland by 29 per cent, Bulgaria by 21 per cent, Poland by 23.9 per cent, Rounania by 21.2 per cent, Chile by 10 per cent and Japan by 8.6 per cent.

Unemployment increased in the United States during the same period by the tremendous figure of 35.8 per cent and in Sweden, where the nighest increase was recorded, by 65 per cent.

The Swedish increase was due largely to the collapse of the Ivar Kreugar match industries.

Although unemployment in Switzerland and Czechoslovakia increased by 36.8 and 50 per cent, reductions more than compensate the increases.

When the former governor was summoned before the board investigating the conspiracy, he embarrassed Mizzi by expressing surprise that a Maltese statesman had witheld his knowledge of the plot so long a time.

Now the board of inquiry must find out why Mizzi failed to pass on his information at the time he was approached by the police officer.

In the opinion of the board, either the nationalists, who were undoubtedly against the British régime at the time of the controversy between England and Malta, are still unreconciled to the present government; or another party of sufficient power to influence Mizzi throngh inspiring his fear is still working through underground channels to consummate a break with Great Britain.







MADRID, Wednesday-In spite of a number of difficulties that remain to be thrashed out by the government, organized labor and captains of industry, calm rules in Spain today, according to Señor Casares Quiroga, cabinet minister, in a recent statement to the press.

The law of public order, however, remains to be approved before the members of parliament leave for their vacations. This, in the opinion of Señor Cosares Quiroga, will be accomplished.

The minister, referring to disturbances at Zaragoza, took occasion to contradict reports that the affair had been mishandled by the autorities and praised police officials for restoring order.

Recent activities of parties of the extreme right, particularly the Traditionalistas, were mentioned by Señor Casares Quiroga, who predited that the press would, for the most part, refrain from giving their propaganda too much credence.

The statesman handed the journalists some nice compliments and remarked on the prestige of their profession, but concluded with the pointed remark that before anything else, the prestige of the republic must be maint ained.

Preachers Partook Of Election Wine Dinners

NEW HAVEN, CONN.-Election Day dinners, at which great quantities of wine were served at state expense, were the order of the day in Connecticut prior to 1820, according to Dr. Jarvis Means Morse, of Brown University, writing in «A Neglected Period of Connecticut History.»

The book has just been published by the Yale University Press.

The custom was ended in 1820, when a member of the legislature protested because there was a \$3 overcharge in the wine bill. 
