LEAGUE COUNCIL SESSION

(Associated Press)

M. LAVAL'S SAAR SPEECH

«DIFFICULT TASK»

GENEVA, Friday

M. Pierre Laval, the French Foreign Minister, was the first speaker in last night's session of the Council of the League of Nations after Baron Aloisi had presented the report of the Saar committee of three.

M. Laval pointed out that the Saar vote had been clear, and the wish expressed therein categorical, the Saar population having decided its fate by its own free will. The League of Nations, he acknowledged, was obliged to resolve the reincorporation of the Saar in Germany.

France, by taking measures anticipating the Council's decision, has proved her unflinching faith in the principle of the inviolability of treaties, according to her spokesman. He added that the League had once more rendered distinguished service to the cause of peace by solving this delicate problem, which might have been the cause of a conflict between two great nations.

«Task Not Ended»

«The League's task is not yet ended», M. Laval insisted. Important questions must be settled before the reunion of the Saar with Germany can be realised.

«The committee is confronted with a difficult task. It must propose, after due consultation with the two interested governments, the conditions under which the transference of sovereignty shall take place, as well as suggesting various forms of liquidating the present régime in the Saar.

The speaker then referred to the

CORPSE IN SEA NUDE BODY FOUND AT ALCUDIA

ALCUDIA, Friday

The nude body of a woman apparently about 40 years old has been found floating in the sea near Alcudia.

The body had been in the water approximately a fortnight, according to the statement of a physician who examined it. The long period of immersion will make identification difficult.

Circumstances, however, point to the conclusion that the woman is Dr. Agnes O'Leary, who committed suicide on New Year's Eve by jumping from the liner Voltaire off Dragonera, just after the ship had left Palma following a regular call.

Dr. O'Leary was 48 years old. She was Assistant Medical Supervisor in the Department of Sanitation of Dublin. She had no friends on the boat, and no reason for her suicide could be given. The Voltaire was stopped and turned around while a thorough search was made for her body, but it was not found.

It is believed that Doctor O'Leary was fully dressed when she jumped from the Voltaire. It is thought possible, however, that her clothes may have been torn off in the water either by herself or the buffeting of waves and rocks, or that they may have disintegrated through the action of the salt water.

An inquiry is being held today at the Ayuntamiento at Alcudia. Mr. George Saward of the British Vice-Consulate in Palma is present to assist in the possible identification of the body. In the event that no claim is made for the body and no identification is possible, a simple funeral and burial will be held at the expense of the local township.

SAAR'S RETURN TO REICH LEAGUE COUNCIL DECIDES

REPORT ADOPTED

GENEVA, Friday

The Saar territory will be united with the rest of Germany on March 1.

The Council of the League of Nations reached that decision unanimously at 8:50 p.m. yesterday, in accordance with the recommendations of the Saar committee of three for giving effect to the result of the plebiscite held last Sunday.

Baron Aloisi, chairman of the committee, and the French and German representatives came to an agreement yesterday evening on the various arrangements connected with the handing over of the territory to Germany, thus enabling the committee to submit its report to the Council. The latter body met to consider the report shortly after 8 p.m.

Baron Aloisi, as rapporteur, informed the council that the committee had taken cognizance of the fact that the Saar population had decided for reunion with Germany by a majority in all the electoral districts. The committee therefore recommended the reunion of the Saar with Germany as an undivided whole, and the fixing of March 1 as the date for the reinstatement of Germany as the governing authority in the territory.

Details Of Transfer

The committee asked the Council to authorise it, in conjunction with the French and German governments and the governing commission of the Saar, to decide what provisions are rendered necessary by the change, and also the manner in which the special obligations entered into by the French and German governments in connection with the plebiscite shall be carried out. In case no agreement on these provisions has been reached by February 15, the Committee of three is to make further proposals to the Council.

The Council will then make the necessary decisions in accordance with the appropriate paragraphs of the Treaty of Versailles and the special obligations entered into by the interested powers.

The Council unanimously passed the resolution adopting the committee's report without chan-

ROYAL CRUISE DUKE AND DUCHESS OF KENT

LONDON, Friday

The Duke and Duchess of Kent are to sail on a cruise to the West Indies a week from today.

Their Royal Highnesses, who had been staying at Buckingham Palace for the last two days, left London for Sandringham yesterday afternoon. The purpose of their journey was to bid farewell to the King and Queen before leaving on their cruise, and they are expected to return to London during the weekend.

The Duke and Duchess will sail from Southampton on January 25. Their voyage will last 48 days.

Jamaica, Trinidad and the Bahamas are among the places listed in the liner's itinerary. The Duke and Duchess will travel as ordinary passengers, and their tour is of a strictly private character.

The announcement of the royal couple's intentions was a surprise, although it was known that they contemplated travelling abroad after the New Year. It had been thought however that their choice would fall on Europe or the Near East, and several Mediterranean resorts had hoped to welcome the distinguished travelers.

One of them was the Island of Mallorca, which the Prince of Wales visited last summer on board Lord Moyne's yacht Rosaura. The Prince made a short stay at Formentor before the yacht left for the Riviera, and it is understood that he was exceedingly pleased with his visit to the Balearics.

Other candidates for the attention of the Duke and Duchess of Kent included the Principality of Monaco and several places on the French Riviera. They are assured however of a warm welcome in the West Indies, especially in the islands which form part of the British Empire.

MURDER AFTER ROAD ACCIDENT

GIBRALTAR, Friday

Enrique Abendoray died yesterday because of a motor car accident in which he had no part, and which took place at La Linea, just across the line from Gibraltar.

The car, which was from Gibraltar and bore a Gibraltar number was being driven by the chauffeur, Jose Vito. It was proceeding at a reasonable rate when it struck a seven-year-old child, Maria Espinosa.

The child was not badly hurt, but before that could be ascertained Maria's brother caught sight of her under the wheels. The brother Juan, 16 years old, became enraged at the sight and rushed to the car.

MR DAVID LLOYD GEORGE STARTS CAMPAIGN AT 72

LONDON, Friday

HIS «NEW DEAL»

The Right Hon. David Lloyd George yesterday celebrated his 72nd birthday by opening a political campaign in a speech at Bangor, in his native Wales.

Mr Lloyd George has proposed a bold and comprehensive plan for reviving industry and relieving unemployment. They are popularly described as his «New Deal». The proposals were outlined in public for the first time in yesterday's speech at Bangor. The speech is to be followed by a series of others to be made at various points in different parts of the country, in which the scheme will be advocated and explained in detail.

Banks Attacked

The kernel of Mr. Lloyd George's proposals is to limit the power of the bankers, whom he picturesquely describes as «The Pengolons». He holds the view, shared by several members of the Labour party, that several eminent economists, the ultra-conservative bank of Britain are cramping industry by neglecting opportunities of accumulating and assisting enterprise and piling up unused and unnecessary reserves.

His campaign is expected to develop into a crusade against the bankers, similar to that which was waged against the landlords of the first decade of the century, and in the course of which he made his famous Limehouse speech. That utterance has become one of the classics of English political oratory, and found its

JUDGMENT IN SOVIET TREASON TRIAL

MOSCOW, Friday

Soviet Russia's latest sensational trial is over, and the sentences have been meted out to the culprits. Zinovieff, Kameneff, and 17 others accused of complicity in a counter-revolutionary conspiracy against Stalin were found guilty.

Zinovieff was given a sentence of 10 years imprisonment. Kameneff received five years, while lesser terms were meted out to the others.

The temperance shown in the sentencing of the men surprised all who were watching the progress of the trial. The sentences, considering the accusations, are the smallest yet to be given in a major Russian trial since the Revolution.

According to one report, prisoners in the cells in the buildings in which the trial was carried out,

upon hearing of the decision and sentences of the court, agitated to demand that the accused receive the death sentence, which is the least that any observer expected would be handed the counter-revolutionaries. The clamour in the prison was however disregarded, on the grounds of policy.

A confession of guilt in the murder of Kiroff, the high Soviet Commissar, was previously made at the trial by Yevdomikoff, who also managed to implicate everyone else concerned. His statement that «We are all guilty of stirring up the masses against the Soviet government and Stalin and must shoulder our responsibility accordingly» was taken at once to mean that he expected the death sentence for himself and the others, and that they would get it.

THE GERMAN MARINE

The laying down of two more keels to follow the recently launched Potsdam of the Hamburg-Amerika Line into the Far East service marks a step forward for the German mercantile marine just at the time when it appears that British shipping is slipping backwards.

Although no definite confirmation has yet been received, it is reported that the Bernstein Line of Hamburg is contemplating the purchase of the Red Star liners Pennland and Westernland.

These two ships fly the British flag and are owned by a British company, although they are financially controlled by American capital through the International Mercantile Marine Company of New Jersey.

The sailings of the Atlantic Transport Company have ceased, and now it seems that the last of the Red Star Line and Leyland ships is within sight. It is an unhappy phase for British shipping.

But the spectacle of shipping companies and governments falling over themselves to send good money after bad in an effort to bolster the national pride by preeminence on the high seas, despite the economic rocks and shoals, still continues.

Although Germany is launching three large new ships within the next few months, that is no evidence that the Reich is not having difficulties. But a week or two ago the merger of the lines which was ordered two years ago by the government was ordered rescinded, due to the lack of success of the plan.

The Queen Mary was launched by Great Britain despite the hard times, and the French government helped to create the Normandie for the purpose of upholding French prestige despite repeated financial setbacks.

All of the major powers are in the uneconomic and foolish race for prestige on the high seas. England is feeling the pinch keenly now, and it is to be hoped that the sale of the Pennland and Westernland will prove an eye-opening lesson.

PRISON CAMPS IN SPAIN

MADRID, Friday

Details of the proposed concentration camps for relieving the pressure on prison accommodation in Spain caused by the application of the vagabondage law are known here today.

One of the most important will be established near the famous Deuso prison. It will consist of streets of waterproofed tents containing the sleeping quarters and other installations for the prisoners, and will be surrounded with wire fences, ditches and watch-towers.

No less than 400,000 convicted rogues and vagabonds will be housed in this single establishment. They will be employed in draining the nearby marshes and cultivating the ground thus reclaimed.

The «workhouse» at Alcalá de Henares, another recently created place of detention for undersirables, is to be extended by the addition of a metal work shop. A school of arts and crafts is also to be established there, in accordance with the government's policy of attempting to make useful citizens of those found guilty of living by crime or begging, or of having no legal means of support.

A further 200 internees are to be the guests of the government in the agricultural colony at Burgos. Land for the establishment of other penal colonies is to be acquired soon in the Las Hurdes district and on the islands of Fuerteventura in the Canaries and Onis.

WORLD EVENTS IN BRIEF

LONDON, Friday

In an address to the Royal United Service Institute yesterday, the Director of the Shell Transport Company, Mr. Agnew, said that the crux of the problem of the maintenance of the Empire's oil services was an adequate and efficient tanker fleet, and stations and a navy to protect it.

BOMBAY, Friday

German chancellor's address to the inhabitants of the territory on Wednesday, urging discipline and telling them that their return to Germany must be unblemished.

«With these words, I am sure,» M. Laval declared, «Herr Hitler expressed his desire that all reprisals against those who have exercised the rights of free speech and voting given to them by treaty shall be avoided.»

«Reasons of humanity» he went on «deter France from closing her frontiers to any refugees who may seek asylum in her territory after the plebiscite; but it must be clearly understood that the problem of Saar refugees, if and in the degree that it arises, is a matter of international concern, which it is the task of the League of Nations to settle.»

M. Laval then noted Herr Hitler's statement that Germany now has no territorial demands on France. «It is a fact,» he commented, «that the reconciliation of our respective countries is one of the most essential conditions of European peace.»

«France is peaceloving, but she has been taught by history that she needs security. Other nations have the same right, and therefore none should hesitate to take part in the formation of pacts which are one of the elements for providing such security by assuring each signatory of indispensable reciprocal guarantees.»

He is no longer attached to any political party, but forms an independent parliament group with his daughter Megan and his son, Major Gwilym Lloyd George.

Since the sentences followed the shooting of hundreds of suspects who were given only summary trials during the last few weeks, it is supposed that the trial of Zinovieff and Kameneff was really a propaganda trial, which the Soviet has staged before with great success for the purpose of terrorizing the people.

ELECTIONS IN SPAIN

MADRID, Friday

The possibility of a general election in April is the subject of rumours circulating in political circles here today.

The C.E.D.A., the powerful Right wing bloc which is the largest single parliamentary force among the government's supporters, is known to favour such a step. The deputies of the Right also desire a re-organisation of the cabinet to precede the appeal to the electorate, and it is said that they will force a crisis for that purpose when Cortes reassembles next week.

The revision of the electoral law is listed as one of the first matters to be dealt with by parliament when it recommences its labours. The present law, which is designed to magnify a slight majority in the country into a working majority in the house, has been criticised on all sides as unfair and as misrepresenting the sentiments of the people as a whole.

Another bill which is to be given preferential attention by the legislators is the municipal law. Whether parliamentary elections are held before the present house exhausts its mandate or not, it is certain that the political parties of Spain will face a trial of strength in the Spring municipal elections.

The revolts of last October in Barcelona and Asturias have brought about a situation which makes the holding of elections in Spanish towns and provinces imperative. Many local corporations, including the municipalities of Madrid and Barcelona, have been replaced with government appointees as the former councillors were implicated in the revolutionary movement or suspected of disloyalty to the government, and it is considered necessary to replace the appointed councillors by elected ones as soon as possible.
