The Negroes as a race are not n a level with their White brothers. Their condition of servitude and lack of advantages, which lasted for centuries, is the reason. But every sane person will agree that there are Negroes, and many thousands of them, who are in every respect on a par with the best of the White races.

Why, then, if most intelligent White people realize this, are the Negroes not let alone? Do they always start all the trouble? Are they entirely responsible for the infamous lynchings of the South, which are increasing as the years roll on and civilization supposedly advances?

The Negroes are not solely responsible. The unintelligent and the badly educated Whites of the South are also not wholly responsible. But human passion is—human passion of the worst sort, of the type which has no basis in reason.

Nor is that kind of senseless passion confined to the Southern nces states. The lynchings and atrocities take place in the South, but laim the rest of the United States raises its hands in horror—and does

There is, then, no particular reason to be surprised that occasionally Negro passions will become inflamed and a sense of the immemorial injustice of their position lead to mass action and rioting of the kind which took place in New York, But there is reason to be surprised and disgusted that the causes of such happenings can be allowed to remain comparatively untouched by a Deople who believe themselves su-Derior and civilized.
