> tition for clemency. The petition requested that the prison terms of MacDonald and Thornton be commuted to banishment from the U.S.S. R., the same sentence passed on three other Vickers workers following their trial.

Whether the decision of the O. G. P. U. and the Central Executive committee is final is of course questionable. At any time a new petition can be submitted to it requesting commutation of the prison terms or asking that they be made shorter. In some quarters it is believed that Mac Donald and Thornton will be released before they have finished serving their sentences. This would depend on the political and economic relations between Great Britain and the Soviets.

> Roosevelt, MacDonald In Agreement On Matter Of Madrid Count Shows 120 Syndicalists Arrested; Polish Corridor Menace

WASHINGTON, Wednesday The Versailles Treaty and its possible revision take the place of the currency situation in the conversations in which President Roosevelt and Prime Minister MacDonald are engaged.

Both the president and Mac-Donald are reported agreed that the Polish Corridor, as it now stands, is a menace to the peace of Europe, but Roosevelt is not believed ready to assent to Mac-Donald's suggestion that' America lend its moral support to British schemes for changes on the continent.

VERSAILLES TREATY Armed Police Patrol **Streets Of Barcelona To Prevent Disorder**

Opposition Gaining

MADRID, Wednesday- Defeat of the government is indicated almost unmistakably by returns from the municipal elections, held last Sunday, which show the opposition still gaining.

The returns account for 16,000 out of a total of 19,000 seats in the governmental bodies of the Spanish capitals.

Of the 16,000 seats, the government has obtained only 5,-

Parties of the Right Wing, which is largely anti-republican, managed to gain 4,745 seats, with almost 3,000 of these going to the Agrarian sections.

The Communists, in spite of the propaganda that has been spread recently, were able to gain no more than 58 seats, indicating that the strength of the desciples of Lenin has been greatly over-estimated.



NEW YORK-Roller skating is the latest juvenile sport to provide a fad for smart society.

After borrowing such nursery pastimes as table tennis, parchesi, jig-saw puzzles and bagatelle all winter, Park Avenue debutantes formed an exclusive roller skating class in Central Park with the first sign of spring. Within three months, a million adults have bought roller skates, gining the toy industry a business boom, rivaling the jig-saw craze. All the roller skate manufacturers are running their factories on a 24-hour schedule to meet the new demand.

Roller skate polo, a pre-war favorite, has been revived in enthusiastic competition. Stores are featuring special costumes for roller skating. Roller skate speed races are popular park sporting events.

About six million pairs of roller skates are sold annually, according to manufacturers' estimates. But adult enthusiasm for skating is expected to increase the 1933 total.

Fomento Forms Plan To Check Unfair **Hotel Charges**

The Fomento del Turismo has formed a new plan for checking unfair charging on the part of hotels, Gelston Hardy learned when entering a complaint that he had been presented with a bill several times a just amount by owners of a small fonda in one of the out of the way towns. METRO COLDWYN MAN Mr, Hardy, on presenting his complaint, together with his re ceipted bill, was informed that a representative of the Fomento would visit the hotel at once and try to gain a refund.

The Fomento pointed out however, that Mr, Hardy would stand a sitll better chance of recovering part of his money had he known of the latest scheme evolved by the officials.

The scheme is that the person who believes he is being overcharged should write his complaint in the hotel's guest book in any language convenient to him.

The Fomento official who makes an investigation, then, can present the hotel owner with the receipted bill, the complain to the tourist office, and demand to see the guest book as well. If all three show the customer to be in the right, he gets his retund, unless the hotel owner chooses to flout the Fomento which he can do if he is so minded, but which not apt to happen.

The plan also has an advantage in that the complaint, once in the book, is there for others to see, and the hotel owner is pretty certain to do everything possible to avoid such bad publicity.


