## Rumor Hums Round Sir John Simon At Cannes

### GOVERNOR GENERAL PREPARES TO TAKE OVER IN CATALONIA

Madrid's Appointed Ruler For Barcelona Is Former Civil Governor, Minister Primo Overthrew.

BARCELONA, Monday — Don Manuel Portela Valladares, whose appointment as governor general of Catalonia has been announced by Premier Lerroux and is to be published in the official gazette as soon as the law regulating the government of the region appears, is in Barcelona today and had a long interview with Señor Carreras Pons, delegate of the central government in the autonomous region.

Señor Carreras told reporters after the interview that he believed that as soon as the new governor takes charge he will take action under the powers given him by the law to nominate temporary commissions to carry on local administration until the elections, which are to take place as soon as the state of war is lifted. He added that he had been able to confirm the impression that the new governor is exceedingly well informed on Catalonian affairs.

Señor Portela was born at Fuen-

### Birthday Of London Times Is Cause Of Lashing By Germans

BERLIN, Monday — Germany has taken notice of the impending hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the London Times, but not in an altogether approving manner. That sedate journal, it is charged, nowadays indulges frequently in attacks reminiscent of Northcliffe and the «puffing methods» of the popular press.

Those hard words appear in a leading article in the Catholic journal *Germania*. The paper points out that while the Times, apart from some brief intermediate periods, has been always an organ of the government, it has never descended to the tactics of some other papers.

After citing the fine British example of giving the opposition a chance, a principle which the Times has translated into practise, *Germania* goes on to say that England's government and public opinion is fortunate in possessing in the Times an organ linking up the Empire's world wide interests and connections, and an efficient instrument for the reflection of Downing Street's policies.

Although *Germania* envies Britain a little wistfully for its possession of an institution like the

### FLANDIN SAYS 1935 WILL PROVE YEAR OF FATE FOR PEACE

French Premier Holds Europe Will Weather Storm; Saar Menace No Longer Mars Concord With Reich.

PARIS, Monday—Nineteen thirty-five will be a crucial year in European politics, above all as regards the maintenance of peace, according to Prime Minister Pierre Etienne Flandin.

Flandin made that declaration in an interview which is published in *Le Petit Parisien*. At the same time he expressed the belief that the storm will be successfully weathered, and characterized European war as a crime against humanity.

«The Saar plebiscite,» said the premier, «no longer presents the danger to Franco-German relationships which it appeared to do a few months ago, thanks to the measures adopted by the League of Nations. A great step forward will have been made in the restoration of confidence between two great nations, which must make every effort to achieve more and more cordial cooperation in the interests of European peace, if, as we hope, the result of the Saar plebiscite is respected by both parties and the mutual obligations faithfully carried out.»

Flandin next referred to the forthcoming visit to Rome of Foreign Minister Pierre Laval. He expressed the hope that that journey would result in Franco-Italian relationships returning to «the normal channels they never ought to have left.»

Affirming his belief that 1935 would be a great year for wiping out the mistakes made in the ec-

### President To Urge Social Legislation In Annual Message

WASHINGTON, Monday—When the 74th congress meets Thursday it will have its work cut out for it, and the pattern will be drawn by President Roosevelt in his annual message.

The president is expected to urge legislation along the main lines of relief work and public works activities, including housing, the consolidation of lending and relief agencies, the reorganization and broadening of the NRA, and the control of the munitions industry.

Coupled with this program will be suggestions for «taking the profits out of war» and the erection of permanent machinery for wartime mobilization.

The question of the 30 hour week and of future naval building will be subjects on which much debate is expected, and which are holdovers from 1934.

It is stated in official circles that President Roosevelt is convinced that a dole for the unemployed is fundamentally unsound. Under the scheme now being considered it is suggested that those who because of age or ill health are unable to earn should

### HIGH OFFICIALS SEE BRITISH MINISTER ON VACATION JAUNT

Foreign Secretary Evasive On Rumored Plan To Palaver With Duce As Laval's Trip To Rome Looms.

PARIS, Monday — The fact that Sir John Simon, the British foreign secretary, has just been joined at Cannes by two high officials of the foreign office is arousing much speculation here today.

All knowledge of any proposed meeting between Sir John and Mussolini has been disclaimed by Italian official circles, according to reports published here in Saturday's papers. Simon himself, who was asked for confirmation of the reports by the special correspondent of the *Matin*, evaded the question.

He said that he was on vacation, and would go on to Monte Carlo soon. The arrival in Cannes of the two high officials of his department however is considered to remove some of its vacation character from the British minister's sojourn in the south of France.

Informed opinion here tends to connect it with the negotiations for a Franco-Italian agreement which are taking place in Rome.

### Daring Young Man On Flying Motor Car Makes Thrilling Rescue And Stops Runaway Horses

BERLIN, Monday—A daring young man on a flying motor car accomplished an unrehearsed circus act complete with all the thrills late Saturday when he rescued the occupants of a runaway carriage and pair.

The car was going along at a reasonable rate at Madeburg when the carriage, containing four persons, three of whom were children, passed it at breakneck speed. It was heading straight for a dangerous curve near a riverbank.

Without stopping even a moment as to think of the words of the famous song about the daring

young man, the driver of the motor car speeded up his vehicle.

Within a few seconds he had brought his car abreast of the runaway horses. Turning over the steering wheel to his companion, the driver climbed onto the bonnet of the car and with one spring jumped to the back of one of the horses.

A short struggle then ensued, and within a moment or two the terrified horses had been pulled up, just short of the curve on the road. Thus were the occupants of the carriage saved from certain

### Palma City Celebrates Conquest Of Island By Jaime I, Salutes His Standard In Plaza De Cort

December 31 was celebrated in Palma, in accordance with ancient custom, as the anniversary of the conquest of the Island from the Moors.

On that day in the year 1229 the banner of King Jaime I of Aragon was planted on the highest tower of the Almudaina palace, till then the residence of the Moorish emir, after a year-long siege. Jaime himself entered the city on the following day.

The conquest of the rest of the Island was not found too arduous a task, but the Moors still held out in the other Balearic Islands,

and Ibiza will celebrate the seventh centenary of its conquest during 1935. The archipelago was combined with Rousillon, Cerdagne and the barony of Montpellier to form the Kingdom of Mallorca.

The original staff of the standard of James the Conqueror, king of Aragon, Mallorca and Valencia, count of Barcelona and of the Principate of Catalonia, was brought forth from its resting-place in Palma city hall yesterday and placed in the socket provided to receive it in the pavement of the Plaza de Cort. The king's

### Lawyer Detectives

Mayor LaGuardia of New York came into office at a time when the city was sorely in need of good government and reform. It was a golden opportunity, and Mayor LaGuardia has done his best since he was sworn in.

At times that best fell somewhat short of the requirements, but at all times the effort was there. And to prove that the effort is still not lacking, the mayor has just presented a new idea with a triple attempt to relieve conditions.

The idea is to offer jobs to all lawyers and law school graduates as municipal magistrates. But there are several provisos to the offer.

The young men must be willing to enter the police department as career men and work their way up through the various grades. Under the new plan, whereby all city magistrates would be appointed from the police department, a special examination would be given to all members of the bar who are physically fit and willing to put in five years learning the ropes.

Candidates would be required to serve a year as ordinary patrolmen, two years as detectives, six months attached to the Corporation Counsel's office, and two years with the District Attorney's office. After that, they would return to desk duty at police stations, and then be raised to the rank of city magistrates.

They would be disqualified from running for office within two years after leaving the bench, thus frustrating attempts to sway magistrates through promises of political preferment.

If adopted the plan will make it possible for a great many young lawyers to find jobs they otherwise would be without, and it would provide the city with magistrates who would know their work. In addition, politics would be removed from the police courts.

All of these benefits are sorely needed, and all would be the result of a little constructive thinking on the part of the mayor. He is to be commended, and other mayors of other cities might do well to make a few observations of him and a few notes on their cuffs.

## Italian Babies Become «Sons Of The Wolf» At Birth, From Then On Continue Military Training

ROME.—Italian babies will discontinue play at being «soldiers»—they actually will be soldiers.

As soon as they can march they will have a regular uniform and a big stick, at once becoming members of Italy's citizen army or navy.

Besides, the whole nation is being organized along military lines. The industrial worker is as much a soldier as the man with a gun in Italy. He must be ready to cooperate, obey and sacrifice the same as a soldier does. The peasant, the banker, the doctor, the teacher must feel that he is at the call of his country, ready to share the dangers and sacrifices if necessary.

In order to realize this gigantic militarization, every Italian, able-bodied or not, must start at eight to feel that he is an integral part of Italy's army. Up to the present he could begin this training at the age of eight and become a ballila which might correspond to a boy scout organization. At 14 he becomes an «Avanguardista» at 18 he begins learning military tactics under the name of «Young Fascist.» When 21 he must do his military service in the regular army. When it is over he is a reserve soldier. Only when he is 55 does he cease to be a soldier of

Italy.

All boys at birth now are enrolled. Hitherto his birth registration was used as the register to call him for conscription. Now, as soon as a boy can walk he becomes a «Son of the Wolf.» He has the right to wear a uniform, carry a big stick and call himself a soldier.

The organization of the «Sons of the She Wolf» teaches the young boy to work in group-formation, to obey, to work with an altruistic aim. Egotism and individuality are to be deprecated.

The Ballilas are taught to build their moral character. They learn the parade of being soldiers. The adolescent Avanguardista must above all be a sportsman, an athlete, and his physical as well as mental development is to be carefully looked after.

The «Young Fascist» is but the prelude of being a soldier. He is learning theory which he must later, under his military service, put into practice. From then on till he is 55 he may be called into active service.

It is compulsory to become a member of one of these organizations if one wishes to be a citizen of Italy.

This will mean that Italy will have an army of over 6,000,000 men, prepared and trained as the Spartans of old like soldiers to obey and to fight.

## Eight Drowned When Fishing Vessel Sinks

Vigo, Monday—The fisher folk of northwestern Spain today are in mourning for eight of their comrades, drowned when the trawler Nueva República was wrecked near here.

The trawlers Nueva República and Republicano were working together in stormy weather when the first named vessel got her propellor tangled in her net. The Republicano took her in tow and headed for port.

The towing cable broke when they arrived at the northern mouth of the ria, opposite Punta Saborido, and the Nueva República was hurled against the rocks. The nine members of the crew were obliged to swim for their lives.

One of them was washed against a rock, clung to it and was able to struggle ashore. All the others perished, and attempts to find their bodies have so far been unsuccessful.

and the probable early visit of Pierre Laval, the French foreign minister, to that capital. It will be remembered that when Premier Flandin and Laval met Simon in Paris on December 22 the Franco-Italian negotiations were among the subjects they discussed during the course of a general review of the European situation.

Laval's expected journey and the substantial progress towards an agreement reported from Rome and Paris have created an excellent impression in London. British diplomacy, as is well known, has been directed for a considerable time at facilitating by all the means in its power the achievement of an understanding between France and Italy as one of the essential factors in the stabilization of the European situation, and therefore special interest is taken in the present parleys.

The nature of the French compromise regarding the Italian proposals is stated by the Paris press to consist essentially in the division of central European organization into two parts.

Rome is said to envisage a plan to guarantee Austrian independence, to which Italy, Germany, Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Jugoslavia are to subscribe. In the case of Germany and Hungary not signing the protocol simultaneously, their places would remain vacant, but the agreement would nevertheless become valid immediately.

That first diplomatic move would be followed by a second, consisting of the conclusion of a sort of central European guarantee pact. It is to be modeled on the pattern of the Balkan pact, but would also be signed by France and Rumania.

Italy and the Little Entente countries would thus reciprocally guarantee their frontiers, which is the chief aim of French diplomacy.

sagrada, in the Galician province of Pontevedra, and qualified as a lawyer at Santiago university, but he has long been connected with the public life of Catalonia. He was twice civil governor of the province of Barcelona before the four Catalan provinces were united.

Señor Portelas's first governorship, under the Canalejas government, was marked by his success in restoring peace and order in a period in which strikes and conflicts of every kind abounded. After graduating to cabinet rank he returned to Barcelona as governor in 1923, appointed by the Garcia Prieto cabinet.

He left the second time to become minister of education in the cabinet which was overthrown by General Primo de Rivera's coup d'état. The minister was on his way to Barcelona to open an exhibition, a few days after his appointment, when the dictator's emissaries forced him to leave the train at Saragossa.

Señor Portela's political activities ceased with the establishment of the dictatorship, though he continues to be a member of the Radical party, of which Premier Lerroux is leader. He has spent the last years of the monarchy and the first of the republic attending to his various business interests in Barcelona, where he has many friends in all political sectors, being married to a member of an aristocratic Catalan family.

become subject to Federal relief. Of twenty million people now dependent, this would affect four million, but there is a growing feeling in the government that relief money should only be paid for labor on public works.

A commission composed of some of the foremost men in the United States is now studying social and economic question under the chairmanship of Frank P. Graham, president of the University of North Carolina, and it is expected that their recommendations will be submitted to Congress and become law within a few months. The Commission was appointed by President Roosevelt.

The outlook for the New Year is some what better than at the same time last year, for there is an optimistic feeling abroad. The reorganization of the NRA and the settling of broad social problems will occupy most of the legislator's time, it is expected.
