## CIVIL GUARD KILLED <br> BATTLE WITH BANDIT

## GRENADES USED

Malaga, Tuesday
Civil Guards operating in the Sierra de Camorra in the province of Málaga have succeeded in cap turing the bandit known as «Almirez» after a battle in which Civil Guard José Pendón Pastor was killed.
When the wanted man was known to be hiding in the Sierra, a general search of the hills was undertaken by parties of Civil Guards under the general direc tion of Lieutenant Colonel Rosas. A pair of guardias ran their quarry to earth in a cave at nightfall on Monday.
Fearing to expose themselves to the fire of their hidden opponent, they sent for reinforcements and waited. «Almirez» slipped past them under cover of the darkness, and took refuge in another cave at a place called Acebuche.
Constable Pendón Pastor and other guardias found his new retreat and approached cautiously. Constable Pendon however showed his hea $a_{d}$ above a rock in attempting to see into the cave mouth, and received a bullet through his brain.

## Siege Of Cave

The killer dragged his victim's body into the cave to obtain the dead man's Mauser rifle and cartridges, and continued firing through the opening, which was barely large enough for a man to pass through. Lieutenant Colonel Rosas arrived with reinforcements, which he placed so as to comman ${ }_{c}$ all the approaches to the cave.
Hand grenades were thrown to enlarge the opening, and «Almi-

## BEY FORCED TO USE FISTS

According to despatches to the Royalist journal Action Francaise today Communist agitators in Tu nis are making things extremely difficult for the government there The French paper demands action from the home government.
The report states that when the Bey of Tunis was paying his state visit to the Mosque during the Feast of Ramadan, he was the object of hostile Communist demonstrations, in the course of which he was denounced as a «renegade and «a hireling of France.»
During New Year's Eve, accordng to the allegations in the $\mathrm{Ac}^{t}$ on, Communists surrounded the Bey's suite and compelled them to isten to inflammatory speeches slavery», as well as the return of certain natives who had been expelled for political reasons from Tunisian territory.
A scuffle took place when the Bey left the Mosque later, and the ruler was obliged to use his fists in order to defend himself until French gendarmes cleared the street.
The Action Francaise criticizes he attitude of the French authorties in Tunis, whom the paper accuses of remaining passive in the face of such grave provocation. What the Royalist journal doe not add is that such manifestat ons are not unusual, and are the efore put down and forgotten by the local government as they ar ise.
The Bey is also merely a figur head, who must obey the demands of the French Governor. He is important as the head of the Mosms in the territory, and not a he head of the government

He adds that extensive reconstruction of the Cabinet would become inevitable in order to find a place for him in it.
Mr. Lloyd George, according to he «Morning Post» writer, has large sum of money at his dispo sal for election purposes. He intends if need be to put up his own candidates in support of his poli-

Passion Island, I see by the pap-er-this paper, if you must knowis being formally taken over by the government which owns it. Passion Island belongs to the French. It, as the office commentator promptly commented when presented with that fact, would.

I have also come across a story which intrigues me. Actually it is an authentic news item, and it was received through the regular press channels. All the men who work for the service which sends out the news stories received by The Palma Post, among other papers, have long white beards and habitually work with one hand resting on an open Bible. Therefore their stories can be accepted as Gospel truth.

This particular news story concrns an inmate of the Puy de Dome prison in Paris who committed suicide.
What, you may well ask, of it? A prisoner's lot is not a happy one. Well, it wasn't the fact that he decided to commit suicide which is unusual, but the means whereby he did it.
It seems that the prisoner, who was serving a seven-year sentence, had distinguished himself by his exemplary conduct during the time he had already served.

A model prisoner, he did not seem exceptionally sad, even if he didn't go around the prison corridors whistling like a bird. Prisoners are not encouraged to whistle like birds in prison corridors. But one would not have picked him out as a man whose life was particularly blighted.
Not, that is, until he received news a day or two ago that his wife, whom he loved with all his heart, had obtained a divorce from him and had also been granted the custody of their children.

Then the change in him came, and came suddenly. If he had been whistling like a bird, the whistle would have changed to a forlorn cheep. His wife's perfidy preyed on his mind to such an extent that he finally decided to end it all.
So he committed suicide-by plunging into a cauldron full of boiling soup. What is more, he achieved his end in both senses.

It is then, in his recital of the facts, that the gentleman with the long white beard who sent out this particular news story rises to the heights.
«The contents of the cauldron,» he says, "were to have furnished the midday meal of the prisoners, and the authorities were thus placed in a most embarrassing position.s

Not, you think, particularly funny? No, but then think of the cook's face when he saw his soup.

## CHANGE AT THE ALHAMBRA

Granadá, Tuesday

The famous court of the Lions the favourite haunt both of tourists and of visiting artists and the most photographed part of the Athambra palace, is wearing an unfamiliar aspect today.
The hemispherical cupola which covered one of the two templete which project into the court from its surrounding colonnade is missing, and in its place is a roof o kiosk shape similit to that already existing on the other side of the court. The change is a part of the careful restoration being carried out by the architect of the A1hambra after consultation wit artistic and technical experts.
The Patio de los Leones was constructed by the Moorish architect Aben-Cendid, and dates from the year 1377. It has undergone a number of renovations and alterations since the sixteenth century, all of which were carefully studied before the present operations were put in hand.
Several theories exist as to the authorship of the quaint stone beasts supporting the central fountain, which give the court its name, One is that the Koranic prohibition of making graven images was circumvented by giving the task to Christian prisoners, who did their best, or possibly their worst, in return for the promise of freedom.
