Negotiations for the purpose of clearing up certain financial problems raised by the reincorporation of the Sarr territory in Germany began here over the weekend under the chairmanship of M. Jacques Rueff, leader of the French delegation.

The question of the exchange of the French francs now circulating in the Saar for Reichsmarks was one of the chief subjects of discussion at the first meeting. The liquidation or transfer of obligations undertaken by the Saar Governing Commission is another important subject on the agenda.

Other matters to be settled are technicalities connected with the change in the customs administration, questions arising out of the change of control over the railways and coal mines of the territory, and the effect of the return of the Saar to the Reich on private agreements and contracts.

A communiqué issued at the close of the first session stated that negotiations between the representatives of the French and German governments and the Saar Governing Commission, together with a member of the Financial Committee of the League of Nations, had led to the conclusion that the handing over of the separate departments of the Saar government to the German authorities lay outside the competence of those assembled here.






