JAIL SUBSTITUTE FOR JOB

APPEAL AFTER 3 YEARS

BOGUS CONFESSION

WARSAW, Saturday

Two events vividly illustrating the distress caused by unemployment in Poland are attracting general attention here today.

The appeal of a man named Lewandowski against a sentence of penal servitude for life passed on him three years ago was granted in the city of Graudenz yesterday. The sentence was given for robbery with violence, to which Lewandowski pleaded guilty.

The appeal hearing however revealed that the alleged robbery was purely fictitious, and that Lewandowski had made a bogus confession in order to get himself imprisoned, because he was unemployed, homeless and starving. The conviction was quashed and the prisoner released.

Hunger Strike

The city of Bromberg has been the scene of a singular hunger strike since Monday. On that day thirty-six unemployed members of the political association known as the «Polish Insurgents» marched in serried ranks into the club house of the Bromberg branch of the association, and declared that they would neither leave the premises nor take food until they were given the opportunity of obtaining work.

They have carried out their threat, with the result that most

ARMS TRAFFIC ADJOURNMENT AT GENEVA

GENEVA, Saturday

The Committee appointed by the Disarmament Conference to devise means for the control of arms manufacture and the traffic in arms adjourned here yesterday and is to meet again on Tuesday.

The intermission is designed to allow the delegations of the countries represented on the Committee sufficient time to draw up and submit amendments to the American proposals. During the general discussion which ended yesterday most of the delegates declared themselves in agreement with the principle of the proposals, but expressed doubts as to their practicability.

The American plan proposes to make all manufacture and sale of arms dependent on the granting of special licences, whether the weapons are made by private or public concerns and whether they are intended for export or for sale in the country of origin. Mr. Wilson, United States delegate, laid the plan before the Committee when that body reassembled here on Thursday, and succeeded in having it accepted as the basis of discussion.

The first attack on the proposals was made by Lord Stanhope, Undersecretary of State for Foreign Affairs and leader of the British delegation. He declared that the system of export licences was open to abuses, and that the whole scheme was unsuitable.

After explaining that Britain wanted something simpler, he promised to submit alternative prop-

GERMANY AND AIR PACT REPLY TO LONDON PROPOSALS

PLAN WELCOMED

BERLIN, Saturday

The text of the German Government's reply to the Franco-British communiqué, which followed the London conference and summed up its conclusions, was published simultaneously last night in Berlin, London and Paris.

The reply begins by stating that the German Government is at one with the British and French Governments in their sincere desire to promote peace, the preservation of which is as much in the interest of Germany's security as in that of the security of other European states. The German Government therefore welcomes the spirit of trustful discussion between individual Governments which finds expression in the communications of the British and French Governments.

Arms Race Danger

The German Government, states the reply, «will submit the whole of the complex European questions raised in the first part of the London communiqué to careful examination, which will be inspired as much by the spirit of sincere will to peace as by consideration for the security of the German Reich, having regard to her exposed geographical situation in the heart of Europe. Especially will the German Government examine the question of what means henceforth are best adapted for avoiding the danger of an armaments race, which is attributable to the heavily armed states having renounced the disarmament provided for by treaties.

«The German Government is convinced that only in that spirit of freely negotiated agreements between sovereign states which finds expression in the Anglo-French communiqué can durable international settlements, in the matter of armaments be attained.»

The reply goes on to say that Germany welcomes the proposal to increase security against sudden air attacks by a convention, to be concluded as soon as possible, providing for direct intervention in favour of the victim of an unprovoked direct intervention of all the signatories. The German Government is prepared in principle to use its air forces as a deterrent against disturbances of

SAAR COALMINES FRANCE MAY PUT QUOTA ON COAL

PARIS, Saturday

The return of the Saar Territory to Germany will, if a parliamentary recommendation is passed, cost the mine owners of the valley dearly.

It was recommended in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday that the Saar, now that it has voluntarily severed its connection with the League of Nations and walked out of its customs union with France, should be considered as any other foreign country.

If the recommendation is passed, the tremendous coal output of the rich valley will automatically fall under the French quota system and there will have to be a scramble for new markets to absorb coal remaining after the quota has been filled.

Germany has always taken as much of the coal as she could use. No new field will be found in that direction. To the East, prospects are somewhat brighter.

If the Saar finds her coal output hampered by a French quota, the mine operators and the Reich will have a difficult problem ahead of them.

The Reich already has agreed to pay France for the Saar mines themselves.

Once free entry into France is stopped and, not only may there be an insufficient profit to pay off on the mines, but there may be no profit at all. The Saar Valley, long the last stronghold against the depression—as long, in fact, as the territory was under the friendly aegis of the League of Nations—may become to European focal point of the industrial crisis.

It is felt here that the parliamentary recommendation, far from being unjust, is a gesture of fairness to other countries already under quotas and that any other arrangement would be impossible.

ETHIOPIA STATE HER CASE

WALWAL INCIDENT ENLARGED UPON

ITALY TO REPLY

ROME, Saturday

A complete statement of Ethiopia's side of the dispute about that African Empire and Italy has been received here from Addis Ababa.

The communiqué is surprisingly sharp in its implications that the Walwal incident of December has been Italy's.

Ethiopian troops, the communiqué declares, have been kept out of Walwal territory ever since the incident in order to prove Ethiopia's confidence in the ability of the men of the two nations to settle the matter peacefully.

Italy, on the other hand, has taken an aggressive and military attitude to the affair, sending several thousands of soldiers to the troubled zone, charged.

Confidence Lost

The Italian action, the communiqué maintains, does nothing to restore the confidence of the Ethiopian statesmen and makes it impossible to believe that Italy wishes a peaceful settlement by negotiation.

At present, the statement continues, Italy's security in the Somali land is in no way threatened by Ethiopia, while Ethiopia is forced to consider her own security threatened by the arrival of fresh reinforcements of troops already stationed in the area.

The statement has caused considerable stir here and is being criticised for its sharp tone.

DEPUTY'S «SOVIET VENGEANCE» STORY

THE HAGUE, Saturday

Soviet Russia is taking vengeance on the states which worked against her admission to the League of Nations, according to Deputy Moller of the Dutch Parliament.

The Netherlands were one of those countries. Hence Deputy Moller's alarm, which is expressed in an interpellation which he has presented in the Second Chamber.

The interpellation asks the Government «whether it is aware that Soviet Russia is now seeking to place those states which opposed her entry into the League at a disadvantage by withholding from them raw materials necessary to their industries.»

Mynheer Moller goes on to allege that the Soviet Government has placed an embargo on the export of Russian flax to the countries in question. The existence of several Dutch textile industries is thereby endangered, he declares.

The deputy concludes by asking whether the Government of the Netherlands is prepared eventually to take the necessary steps with the League of Nations to frustrate the vindictiveness of the Soviet Union.

Deputy Moller's allegations are not taken too seriously, except in so far as they are symptoms of an advanced stage of Russophobia. Nevertheless, the Government's reply to his questions is awaited with interest.

FILMS IN ENGLISH

The Teatro Lirico, which is the outlet in Palma for the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer motion pictures, is considering a plan whereby every feature picture shown at the theatre would be put on the screen once in English.

Officials of the theater are about ready to give the new plan a try-out. Whether or not they continue will depend entirely on the reception given the films by the members of the English and American colony.

Within the past year and a half, an increasing number of pictures either made with Spanish casts or «dubbed» in Spanish has almost cut off the local supply of English-language attractions.

Although this gradual improve-

ment in the Spanish film has been hailed with delight by the Spaniards, it has won hardship on Palma's English-speaking screen fans.

The project now being considered by the Lirico management involves a considerable expenditure which will not be possible to carry out unless a fairly large amount of money from the foreign colony is available.

The following are some pictures that will be shown in English if the plan is adopted:

PRINCE'S BAGPIPE MARCH

«MALLORCA»

The Illustrated London News publishes a photograph of the score of the bagpipe march «Mallorca», composed by H. R. H. the Prince of Wales.

Another picture on the same page shows the band of the Scots Guards rehearsing the march under the direction of Bandmaster J. Robertson. The accompanying text explains the genesis of the composition, the first audition of which was recorded in The Palma Post recently.

The Prince of Wales, it explains, learned to play the national instrument of Scotland—and of Mallorca—from Bandmaster Forsyth, the King's piper. «Mallorca» is a slow march for pipes, and recalls the Island which the Prince has visited more than once.

The march was offered to Bandmasters Forsyth and Robertson, both of the Scots Guards. They were delighted with it, and the Scots Guards band is rehearsing it in order to play it at the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace.

The march was played for the first time in the Tower of London. It was heard in public at Grosvenor House on January 25, when Piper Taylor of the Royal Caledonian Schools played it at the fire anniversary celebration, and has also been heard at the annual dinner of the Brighton and Hove District Association, at Brighton.

«Mallorca» is described as a fine melodious march with a merry and moving lilt.

The Illustrated London News does not mention that the instrument for which the march was written is the traditional and characteristic music-maker of Mallorca. It is more surprising that none of the Spanish newspapers which have chronicled the event has mentioned the Mallorquin pipes in that connection.

WINTER SPORTS

SKIING ON PUIG MAYOR

Mallorca promises to add the attractions of a winter health resort to its other charms, if the plans now burgeoning in the minds of local sportsmen, both Spanish and foreign, yield the fruit that is expected of them.

There is talk of founding a winter sports club in Palma next season, if indeed it cannot be done before the present snows on the mountains disappear. Sóller intends to have a similar organisation, which would work in close cooperation with that in the capital.

The local newspaper *La Voz de Sóller* publishes an account of a skiing expedition on the slopes of the Puig Mayor, which took place last Sunday under the leadership of Herr Josef Kunzler, the Austrian photographic artist and sportsman. He was accompanied by eleven other members of the foreign colony, all experienced snowmen, and several local youths anxious to sample the exotic game.

The excursionists found about a metre of snow on the Puig, and were delighted with the nature of the ground, which they found ideal for skiing. The steep slopes locally called «seregays» were found excellent, particularly that of the Pla de N'arbona.

A suitable field of operations for beginners was found at the Vinya de Bonnaber. There the prentice skiers received their «baptism of snow» and their first lessons in the management of skis and sticks, a ritual solemnised with the number of falls usual on such occasions.

Herr Kunzler and his companions expressed surprise on their return that no one had thought of skiing on the Puig Mayor before. They pronounced it a spot exceptionally well adapted for the purpose.

COMING EVENTS IN MUSIC

NIN-CULMELL RECITAL

«MESSIAH»

A series of concerts of varied appeal will take place at the historic Almudaina palace during the next few weeks.

The first, on Tuesday, February 19 at 6:30 p.m., will be a piano recital by Don Joaquín Nin-Culmell. Señor Nin-Culmell, who makes his home in Paris, has visited the Island before, and has won the esteem of local musicians and music-lovers by his previous performances here.

He is just back from Cuba and New York, where he is reported to have won both the critics and the public. His visit to Palma is a prelude to engagements in Copenhagen, Paris and London.

The Trio de Mallorca's next concert is slated for Friday, February 22, at 6 p.m., when Mozart, Schubert and Brahms will be on the programme. And then on Sunday there will be the Haendel festival concert by the Capella Clásica, the time of which is to be announced later.

The Haendel concert is to celebrate the 250th anniversary of the birth of the composer, which took place in February of 1685. It will consist of a selection from the famous oratorio «Messiah», including arias, recitatives, choruses and organ solos.

The Capella is to sing on that occasion several parts which were omitted from the choir's two renditions of the oratorio last year. They include the aria «The trumpet shall sound» and the two final choruses, «Worthy is the Lamb that was slain» and «Amen».

Alice Ehlers, who has the reputation of being Germany's best clavichinist, will give two recitals in Palma on March 7, drawing on J. S. Bach, Haendel and Scarlatti for her programmes. Fraulein Ehlers, who has given concerts in most European capitals, comes to Palma straight from fresh triumphs in Budapest and London.

She is coming to Spain to fulfil engagements with the Asociación de Música de Cámara, of Barcelona, and the Sociedad Filarmónica, of Valencia. She plans to take advantage of being in Barcelona to visit her family, who live in Génova, and the concerts at the Almudaina palace will be given during that visit.

Although only the Haendel festival is organised by the Capella Clásica, subscribing members of that body will be able to attend all four concerts on the same terms as for the Christmas concerts. Programmes and tickets are to be obtained at the Almudaina palace, opposite the Cathedral, any day between 10 a. m. noon and between 4 and 8 p.m.

GIRONÉS - MILLER

BULLFIGHTING IN BARCELONA

BARCELONA, Saturday

The long-postponed boxing festival in which Freddy Miller, world fly-weight champion, and Gironés, Spanish and European champion of the same category, are to meet is billed to take place tomorrow at the Monumental bullring here.

The event has aroused considerable interest, but its importance is eclipsed for the regular habitués of the Monumental ring by the fast approaching opening of the bullfighting season. The first fight, a *novillada* in which *novilleros* of importance will be seen, is billed for tomorrow week, Sunday February 24.

Another *novillada* is scheduled for March 3. The first full bullfight of the season will follow on March 10.

Valencia II, who has been absent from the sanded circle for two years, is to make his reappearance on that occasion. His retirement was due to a horn wound received during one of the fair *corridos* at Albacete, which rendered a delicate operation and a long convalescence necessary.

He will alternate with Marcial Lalanda and Villalta when he makes his return to the arena here. It is reported that he will enter the ring determined to give a show which will recall the best he has ever given, and force the front rank *diestros* who are appearing with him to give of their best or be eclipsed.

Two more fights are billed for March, and the succeeding month will be raised to tauromachic prominence by those which will grace the Gastronomic Week and the festivals commemorating the foundation of the Republic. Competent critics are looking forward to a series of spectacles comparable to the annual fairs of Seville, Bilbao, Valencia and Saragossa.

Señor Balañá, impresario of the Barcelona bullrings, returned not long ago from his annual tour, and the contracts with both bullfighters and breeders which he brought back with him promise a season upon which *aficionados* will look back with nostalgic longing.

PRINCE RENEWS OLD ACQUAINTANCE

LONDON.—The most interesting event during his trip to Europe, according to Lieutenant Hernández, of the Chilean Carabineros, was his visit to St. James Palace for an audience with the Prince of Wales.

When the Prince visited South America in 1931, Lieutenant Hernández was assigned to guard him when he reached the Bolivia-Chile border. The Prince was struck by Hernández's knowledge of English, which is exceptionally good. Hernández, on the other hand, greatly admired the Prince's knowledge of Spanish, which he had acquired purposely before he left for South America. At Saint James's Palace, the Prince chatted with the Lieutenant for ten minutes in English, then switched to Spanish, which said Hernández, he spoke remarkably well.

When Hernández arrived at the Palace he was ushered into a waiting room two doors away from the Prince's study. The Prince, seated on a sofa, arose as soon as he saw the Lieutenant and walked across the room to greet him. He smiled and extended his hand. The Lieutenant replied by presenting the compliments of his chief, General Arriagada, to which the Prince responded immediately by asking numerous questions concerning the force. There followed a conversation on the subject of police problems all over the world upon which the Prince, said the Lieutenant, displayed a remarkable inside knowledge.

Recalling his visit to Chile, the Prince spoke of well-known Chilean personalities he had met there, including President Alessandri and Finance Minister Ross. He spoke of the improvement in Chile's economic situation, which, said Hernández, he evidently had followed quite closely. He expressed the hope that he would be able to return to Chile at some time.

During the part of the conversation which the Prince decided to carry on in Spanish, he punctuated his sentences with such well-known colloquial expressions as «Yo también,» with an occasional «como no,» indicating a thorough knowledge of the language, which Hernández admired considerably.

LIQUOR TAX PROTEST

LONDON.—British distillers claim that excessive government duty on spirit liquors is responsible for the great decline in consumption of whisky, gin, etc., in the past decade.

In 1933-34 a new low level in consumption in Great Britain was reached, just over 8,500,000 gallons of proof spirit being consumed as compared with nearly 13,000,000 gallons over a similar period ten years ago.

It is pointed out that before the war excise duty on spirits was \$3.75 per proof gallon. The duty now is \$18 per gallon. This rate of duty was imposed in 1920, since when statistics have shown a steady decline in government revenue from this source.

Before the war there were 133 distilleries going at full tilt in Scotland, but today there are only about 40 or 50. Although the Scottish distillers have undertaken to buy as much Scotch barley as possible the plight of the barley growers still is grave.

Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, has estimated that a reduction of the duty to \$12.50, while increasing consumption by 15 per cent, would involve a loss in revenue of \$30,000,000. The distillers, however, urge that even if a loss were incurred in the first year there would afterwards be an increase in revenue.

A deputation from the Scottish Licensed Trade Defense Association recently visited Walter Elliot, Minister of Agriculture, when he was in Glasgow and stated how seriously the high duty had affected the use of Scotch barley. They also claimed that the high price of genuine Scotch whisky, due to the duty, was encouraging the use of injurious substitutes.

CAMBRIDGE - OXFORD BOAT RACE

LONDON.—Faced with the possibility of practically a clean sweep by Cambridge in the intervarsity contests, Oxford is making strenuous efforts to win the most important of the lot—the boat race over the Putney - Mortlake stretch, April 6.

Cambridge teams already have sprung surprises by winning the rugby match easily, the association match, the cross-country run and the relay track meet. They almost are certain to win the track and field meet in March, but Oxford's chances of winning the boat race never were better.

The Dark Blues already have established a couple of records for the race. They started their training back in October, earlier than they have ever done before. And in the third week of January they

went straight to Henley, instead of putting in a month on the water below the university. This is unprecedented.

It is too early as yet to compare the merits of the rival crews. In fact both universities still have two eights in training from which the final boat will be selected.

But what makes the experts think that Oxford stands a better chance than ever this year, is the fact that the Cambridge coaches have gone over en bloc to the Dark Blues. Peter Haig - Thomas, who has trained Cambridge through most of its record succession of eleven wins, has been «loaned» to Oxford. He is now coaching with Doctor J. M. Peck and Jerram Escombe, two of the Light Blue coaches, to assist

In his squad at Henley he has five members of last year's crew which although beaten by Cambridge lengths was also inside the previous best time. They are Mr. Mosley, president, A. V. Sutcliffe, J. M. Couchman, P. R. S. Ball and P. Hogg.

There is a possibility of a new American rowing in the race the first time for several years. It is R. E. Pflaumer, a Rhodes scholar from New Jersey, who was in the 1933 Princeton boat. Pflaumer has been in the Oxford squad since he first started training on the Cam River, only just wide enough for one shell at a time. So far he has only three members of crew which put up a record of 18 minutes, three seconds for the 4 1/4 mile course last year.

THE LINDBERGH TRIAL

Seldom has a more disgraceful
sight been witnessed than the
trial for murder of Bruno Haupt-
mann, kidnapper and slayer of
the baby son of Colonel and Mrs.
Charles A. Lindbergh.

During the trial, Americans man-
aged to display every unpleasant
trait they possessed, while what-
ever worthwhile qualities they may
have owned were completely sup-
pressed.

From the very moment of Haupt-
mann's arrest betting commission-
ers all over the United States re-
ported a lively interest in placing
money on the accused man's con-
viction, and even on the chances
of his drawing a death sentence.

In one case, a horrified commis-
sioner refused pointblank to have
anything to do with bets on the
trial—and betting commissioners
have the reputation of being so-
mewhat hardboiled.

As for the trial itself, it was con-
ducted—though no fault of the
judge or others connected with
the actual procedure—along the
lines of a three-ring circus.

Property owners near the cour-
thouse set up «hotdog» and soft
drink stands, or rented their land
to others who used it for a similar
purpose.

The whole atmosphere was one
that was not designed to lend dig-
nity to one of the most important
criminal trials in the history of
America.

Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh,
themselves forced to undergo an
ordeal that would have shattered
the nerves of less stolid people, had
also to contend with the horror of
seeing great tragedy turned into a
profit by the callous moneygrab-
bers of the countryside surround-
ing Flemington.

The trial is now over, but it
will be followed by a second, in
which the verdict against Haupt-
mann will be appealed. In the in-
terim, it should behoove the au-
thorities to see that the ghoul-like
activities of the Flemington prop-
erty owners and concessionaires
are not repeated.

Out Of My Head

M. Auguste Escoffier died in
Monte Carlo a few days ago. The
name needs no explanation to any-
one interested in gastronomy, for
as most of the world knows (and
that includes mere eaters as well
as gourmets) M. Auguste Escoffier
was the foremost culinary artist
in the world during the last half
a century.

He served as the royal chef of
that dyspeptic and nervous man,
the former Czar of All the Russias,
Nicholas II, and he was the man
who caused Wilhelm to twirl his
mustachios with special gusto
when Escoffier was master of the
ex-Kaiser's kitchens.

Escoffier it was who invented
the famous «Pêche Melba» for that
singer when she was in her hey-
day, and for no particular reason
except that he liked her.

He used to boast that he had
affected the politics of the world,
or at least of Europe, on one ausp-
icious occasion. It was when he
was serving as the ex-Kaiser's chef
on board the Imperial Yacht Hoh-
enzollern.

Wilhelm had anchored his ves-
sel (well, actually a few of his sail-
ors had done it for him) off Kiel
during the formerly splendid and
famous Regatta Week. He invited
a group of royalties and import-
ant statesmen to dine with him,
and he discussed politics during
and after the meal, which could
not be exactly described by the
word frugal.

Naturally, for that dinner Esc-
coffier tried to outdo himself. Every
time there was something extra
special expected of him he invent-
ed a dish out of his head—or rath-
er out of his pots and pans.

This time he invented a salmon
salad which was so exquisite, so
heavenly, so absolutely divine that
the assembled crowned heads and
statesmen forgot their politics in
their ecstasy over Escoffier's crea-
tion. They had met, Escoffier after-
wards said, to discuss a war and
when and how it should be declar-
ed.

Escoffier was also famous in his
later years as a professor of his
favourite art. Many a chef was
trained by him, to go forth and
hold positions in the most famous
hostelries (and the most costly) in
the world.

The story of the life of Escoffier,
which is now being told in a great
many newspapers, stops short at
his retirement. But that leaves out
what is to me the most interesting
part.

For I am anxious to know about
the chef who served Escoffier in
his declining years—he was 90
when he died. What did Escoffier
eat, and what did he say to his
chef about it? Probably, if the
truth be known, the greatest culin-
ary artist of his age lived during
his last years on dry toast.

SURVEY SHIP'S LAUNCH

MADRID, Saturday

Señor Alcalá Zamora, President of the Republic, left last night for Valencia to be present at the launching of the Artabro, the ship which has been specially constructed in the Astilleros de Levante for the Iglesias expedition to the Amazon.

The cruisers Méndez Núñez and República will be in the harbour at Valencia to salute His Excellency on his arrival. Two flights of military aeroplanes, which are to take part in the ceremonies, have already arrived at Valencia.

The Artabro is to be used on other scientific expeditions after the Amazon expedition, which is expected to start in September, and also as a survey ship for the Spanish navy. She has been specially built as a floating laboratory to specifications drawn up by Captain Iglesias, as the leader of the expedition to Brazil, in the light of his previous experience of exploration.

A feature of the design is the arrangements for carrying, launching, repairing and refuelling the seaplanes which will be carried, and which are expected to render valuable services by supplementing the investigations of the scientists in the surface craft. The latter is so constructed as to be able to make the Atlantic crossing as well as navigating in shallow inland waters, and her hull is strengthened in the bows with a view to possible Polar exploration in the future.

The Artabro will probably make a cruise in the Mediterranean during the summer, in the course of which everything on board will be tested under service conditions before the voyage to the Amazon commences. Captain Iglesias is now in Spain completing the arrangements for the expedition, and the other members of his party are engaged in exploration work in Spanish Guinea and in the colony of Ifni.

DRS. PEÑARANDA HONOURED

For the second time in a year, the Clinica Peñaranda was honored when, last Sunday, officials of La Igualdad, the shoemakers' union, went to the private hospital in a body to present the proprietors, Don Virgilio and Don Vicente Peñaranda, with a plaque commemorating the occasion, over two years ago, when they saved the life of Señor Pons, a fellow shoemaker.

The plaque, a handsome bronze piece bearing an inscription to the doctors, was presented by Señor C. Pons, president of La Igualdad. With the president were a large group of officers of the union.

It had originally been planned that the entire membership of the union be present for the presentation, and it had been arranged that the members should march in parade from Palma to the clinica, which is in the Carretera de Soller.

The parade and mass meeting at the clinic had to be called off owing to the restriction imposed

upon such demonstrations by the state of alarm, under which the province is still being governed.

Señor Pons, whose life was saved by the Drs. Peñaranda, had been pronounced incurable elsewhere and is now enjoying the best of health, thanks to the efforts of the two surgeons.

Just a year ago, Don Virgilio Peñaranda was decorated with the Cross of the Legion of Honor for saving the life of a French naval officer who had been stricken with a serious internal disorder while aboard his destroyer. His case had been given up as hopeless by the naval surgeon who had been handling the case.

The French naval officer was restored to regular duty with his ship only a few months after he had been pronounced incurable and on the verge of death. In the interim between that pronouncement and his restoration to duty he had submitted to a delicate but successful operation at the Clinica Peñaranda.

SNOW BLOCKADE BROKEN

SANTANDER, Saturday

Railway communication between Santander and Madrid, which has been suspended for several days owing to heavy snowfalls in the Cantabrian Mountains, has been reestablished, and trains are running again today.

The Madrid express which left yesterday was the first train out of Santander for three days. It found the track clear at Reinosa and Santander, where pilot locomotives and gangs of workmen had been employed removing the drifts, and made the trip with but slight delay.

The weather has improved in the Reinosa district, which on account of its altitude suffered worst from the blizzard. Accumulations of frozen snow however continue to block the streets of the town, some of which are completely impassable, while the others are difficult to negotiate for pedestrians.

The cold wave has caused a marked increase of unemployment by forcing the suspension of all outdoor work. Cattle raisers also are in difficulty, as fodder is scarce and melted snow is the only water available for the beasts.

The Governor General of Asturias, who has jurisdiction in the part of Santander province most affected by the storms, has announced that 50,000 pesetas are being sent to relieve the distress caused by the inclement weather. A further 10,000 pesetas have been allocated for paying shovel gangs to clear the main roads of the region.
