A TRIP TO MENORCA.

THE S.S. "Delfin" leaves Palma each Thursday night, returns early on Saturday morning, and allows the visitor sufficient time to see Mahón and Ciudadela, the new and old capitals of the Island, and to visit several of the prehistoric remains, for which Menorca is so famous.

The passport is necessary—on the occasion of my first landing at Mahón I was immediately pounced upon by a most important personage, and in the absence of my passport was rushed off to the house of the British Vice-Consul.

Menorca holds many associations with the British. It has been occupied by Great Britain on three separate occasions and the harbour formed one of the great bases of the Mediterranean fleet.

As one enters this wonderful harbour which, in places, is not more than a hundred yards wide, and cuts its way for some three miles through the hard rocky shores, one is struck by the natural strength of its position as a naval base. All along the shores the old dismantled and crumbling forts are still to be seen the neat white houses come down to the waters edge whilst every small elevation is crowned by houses of greater pretention.

One of the largest and most impressive of these houses is that of San Antonio, or The Golden Farm, where Nelson lived from 1798 to 1802.

The house is now occupied by Señor José de Vigo—a Spanish gentleman who speaks remarkably good English. He is most kind in showing visitors over the house where our most famous Admiral once lived with Lady Hamilton. Many of the rooms are said to be in much the same state as they were 130 years ago. The house is full of furniture of the Queen Anne and Gorgian periods—there is the well stocked library and the magnificent fourposted bedsteads and other furniture which, report says, were in San Antonio in Nelson's days. In the library is a large "Visitor's book" in which may be seen

the Signatures of Queen Victoria and other then reigning monarchs, as well as those of other famous men and women. The Golden Farms stands on a hill on the opposite side of the harbour to Mahón and commands views of the whole length of the harbour.

One has only to close one's eyes and open them again and there on the large balcon one will see Nelson seated, gazing out to sea through the "Dolland" telescope that he left behind him.

The streets and houses of Mahón are clean and well kept. There is much more air, much more sunlight, than is frequently met with in other old Spanish towns.

It may be for this reason that Tuberculosis seems to be less common than in other parts of the Balearics—or, again, it may be that the British introduced a superior form of sanitation, which has had a lasting effect.

As might be naturally supposed the seventy years during which the British occupied the island have left traces on the inhabitants and their language. Some facetious written has explained the presence of so much red hair amongst the Menorcans as having been due to a Scotch regiment being quartered for so long in the island—but of this there is no documentary evidence. At the same time the English seem to have made themselves very popular with the inhabitants and, even to day, it is an asset in one's favour to proclaim one self of English origin.

The Menorcans have their likes and their dislikes, they prefer the rest of Spain to Cataluña, and there seems to be a great rivalry between Menorca and the larger Island, Majorca. The two islands and their people cannot well be compared—they differ so much—each island has its own special charm, so, too, have the islanders.

One might just as well compare the fish of the two islands as the islanders themselves, and it is more than astonishing to find that the few miles of

sea that separate Majorca from Menorca make so great a difference in the species of fish that one meets with in the markets of the two islands.

One of the reasons why Menorca is not more frequently visited is the absence of up-to-date Hotels. There are very few English residents on the island, and yet, it is full of interest and is most attractive; living, too, is remarkably cheap.

The steamer's visit allows time for the visitor to take a trip across the island to Ciudadelá. He will be struck by the good condition of the roads, the amount of stones every where, and of the evidence of the north wind. The branches of a great number of the trees are all turned southward by the strength of wind from the north.

On the journey the town of Alayor is well worth a hurried visit, and Ciudadelá itself, the old Roman Capital of the island, deserves a lengthy stay and special description. Here is another harbour, similar to that of Mahón, but on a much lesser scale.

Many houses remain just as the Romans left them 1500 years ago, and one street is almost entirely Roman.

The visitor will only have time to make but the shortest of inspection of the prehistoric Talayots and Naus with which the island is dotted. One cannot but marvel how, in these far-off days, the inhabitants were able to move such enormous masses of stone, and the numerous Stonehenges -in- miniature bear witness that religion entered deeply into the lives of these primitive men.

The return journey from Mahón is generally made at night, but if one is so fortunate as to be held up by bad weather, as is occasionally the case, and to make it during the day time, one is rewarded by seeing a part of the Majorcan coast that is seldom seen by the tourist.

The heights of Capdepera are first made out, then the hills of San Salvador with the monastery are to be seen, then Ronda, then the Islands of Conepera and Cabrera, and finally Capo Blanco leads as once more to the Bay of Palma.

There are, however, few more beautiful views than coming into Palma with the evening sun lighting up the Town and the Cathedral which forms a fitting termination of an ever-to-be-remembered trip to Menorca.

PALMA.

Our majestic mountain Puig Mayor has donned her mantle of snow and the lesser Puigs have followed her example—consequently we poor mortals suffer. But in Barcelona snow fell for several hours. The Tibidabo is clad in 18 inches of snow and Barcelona, lying below has assumed the aspect of a Northern town. February here can be compared to April in England—hail—rain—sunshine. February this year has been exceptionally cold but the old experienced resident tells us that at any moment we may expect the warm spring weather, the "clima ideal" promised us by the Spanish postal authorities.

Our peaceful Palmesanos were rather startled on Monday morning 16th to find that no trams were running, that workmen had refused to work, that shops were closing their shutters again after early opening, and that, in short, Palma was suffering from the ordered general strike throughout the whole of Spain. The disturbance however was small. A number of youths went shouting through the streets and pushed a tram over in the Calle Colón. By afternoon every thing had calmed down and shops were opened again. The following contains the gist of the declaration published by the Mayor of Palma and posted outside the Town Hall and on other places the same afternoon:

"Citizens!

The enemies of the Republic are trying to attack the present Government. A minority, insignificant in social and numeric importance have disturbed today the calm and orderly life of our town, with the intent of an unjustified general strike imposed by violence, a deed that cannot be tolerated by the present liberal government. A meeting of the town council has decided that this state of strike shall not continue. Therefore I beg Commerce and Industry to open their shops, and the whole town to maintain the serenity and calm necessary to show the breakers of peace that their attempts have failed.

The Town Council does all in its power to keep order and protect the liberty of the citizen.

THE MAYOR."

Mallorquin Pirate Story.

A remarkable book named "Relació dels sucesos memorables oco-rreguts en aquesta isla de Mallorca" by one, Jaime Pujol, is guarded carefully in the Archives of the Cathedral of Palma as it is the only existing copy known.

We quote from it the

following interesting narrative:—

On 17th of February, 1613 an Algerian pirate ship manned by 23 Moors and 8 white pirates were cruising in front of the harbour of Campos when they sighted a Majorcan fishing boat. The fishermen however kept well within the bay in protection of the shore. At last the pirates conceived the idea of hiding the Moors in the interior of the ship and pretending to call for help. Then, when the fishermen saw that it was a Christian ship and dared to approach, the Moors were to jump out and capture the fishing vessel. The white men however when they saw the Moors so nicely ensconced below could not resist the temptation of battering down the batches. They then called for help and when the fishermen came on board they told a long story of how the eight white men had captured a Moorish pirate ship, and had made the crew prisoners. The Majorcans then steered the ship into Campos harbour and gave all up to the authorities. Again they told their story of a brave attack and capture for which deed the authorities ceded them half of the sum obtained by the sale of the Moorish slaves and the ship with cargo.

But "murder will out" and sometime later during a fierce quarrel the true story was told and the eight white pirates were hanged.

Latest News.

Bilbao 18.—At midnight a conflagration broke out in a private house. Whole families jumped from the balconies. There were 3 killed and 20 wounded.

Berlin 19.—The proclamation of the Republic of Manchuria has awakened general interest.

Geneva 19.—The Japanese government in a note to the Council of the League of Nations denies that the hostilities in Shanghai were provoked by the Japanese.

The note goes on to say that the Chinese police have been substituted by the Japanese police as the former had abandoned their posts.

Geneva 20.—The Chinese Delegation has sent another urgent appeal to the League of Nations asking them for a special session in which to examine the situation caused by the Japanese ultimatum which expires tomorrow at 12.

Shanghai 19.—The Japanese bombardment announced for tomorrow has already begun today. The Chinese artillery answers vigorously all along the line.

Japanese airplains flew ower Fu-Chew releasing notices stating the imminent occupation of said city.

Shanghai 20.—A message coming from Washington states that the United States Government will not recognise the Republic of Manchuria. This has caused an excellent impression in Shanghai.

London 19.—The Chamber of the House of Commons passed by an important majority of vote the first clause on the new importation laws, which establishes a duty of 10% "ad valorem" on all merchandise except food stuffs.

London 19.—The Bank of England has decided to reduce its discount to 5 per cent.—The said decision is considered a proof of existing confidence and security.

Berlin 19.—In the Castle of Sibyllenort near Breslau the ex-King of Saxony, Frederic August, has died.

14 Febrero 1618.—Grande escasez de trigos; hubo necesidad de crear tablas o mesas de pan en varios puntos de la ciudad, en los cuales se daban a los hombres 20 onzas y 14 a las mujeres y a los niños.

15 Febrero 1526.—Pregon ordenando se pusiesen luminarias por razón de la paz estipulada entre los Reyes de España y Francia.

16 Febrero 1612.—Es desterrado un matrimonio de Palma, siendo ella sacada a la vergüenza con capirote y banderillas.

17 Febrero 1644.—Rogativas en la Seo, Parroquias y conventos para alcanzar el acierto en el nombramiento de un buen obispo.

18 Febrero 1619.—Fué ahorcado un hombre de Palma por bandolero y por no haberse presentado al Baile de Manacor, cuando se le pregonó; y otro hombre, de Alaró, lo fué por homicidio de Magin Bosch, asociándose luego a los bandoleros.

19 Febrero 1406.—Un cautivo de Nicolás Coha, llamado Burgar, mató con una lanza a su amo y a la esposa de este, é hirió a otros dos cautivos. Fué condenado a muerte cruel.

20 Febrero 1635.—Rogativas por necesidad de lluvia. En 4 de Marzo continuaban todavía.

Concert of Daurius Milhaud.

We highly appreciate the good judgement and initiative of the Asociación de Cultura Musical in acquiring the composer Darius Milhaud for their last concert on Friday 19th. The Spanish people, with their strong and wholesome feeling for music, applauded after each piece, but we could see that this was perhaps from proverbial Spanish courtesy rather than appreciation of atonal music. The singer, Jane Bathori, who is also a very good pianist, it without doubt an excellent interpreter of her master. The influence of Debussy on Milhaud's music is evident, and he is at his best when he most approaches him, as in the last piece of "Trois Aubades du Brazil". The singer too succeeded best in "Trois Chansons de Bilitis" by Debussy, which was unfortunately the only Debussy of the evening. We should like to have heard more of him, especially from Jane Bathori. Very charming was the first piece "Morceaux en forme de Poire" by Eric Satie—the very title being a happy description of this composition for four hands.

Of Milhaud's compositions the "Chant de Nourrice" in the "Poèmes Juifs" contained some wonderfully tender passages but the most impressive of the whole evening was the "Chant du Laboureur" This song ends in the Marseillaise; but if for instance, Tschaiowsky in "1812" or Schumann in "The two Grenadiers" employed and declined the real Marseillaise by Isle d'Adam, Milhaud did not use any note of it, and notwithstanding it was the Marsellaise unmistakably, in idea and rhythm.

It was rather disturbing that the composer played his own compositions from written music.

The Salon Mallorca was only half filled—an astonishing fact considering the scarcity of truly artistic concerts coming to Palma and rather unfair to the Asociación de Cultura Musical as it makes the greatest efforts to introduce a higher musical standard in Palma.

Extended Telephone Service.

It is now possible to telephone, by means of the International Wireless Service, from any telephone in Palma to all parts of the world, not even excepting far-off Australia. The charges for this service are listed below, and are based on a conversation of three minutes. As is customary, there is a difference in cost between the day rate, 8 A. M. to 9 P. Rates for each additional minute of conversation are also given, these charges representing also the additional charge a person-to-person call over those for the usual number-to-number call.
