### Search Atlantic for Lindbergh Baby On Report that He is Held on Yacht

NEW YORK. Warning has been flashed to all transatlantic liners to be on the lookout for a yacht which according to late reports is the prison of the stolen Lindbergh baby.

The authorities were advised of the yacht by a Connecticut bootlegger who has been active in the search for the

infant and found a message transmitted by a carrier pigeon from some undetermined point in mid-Atlantic. The bird, according to the man's story, was driven ashore in Connecticut by a storm.

A radio checkup of ships which might have sighted the suspected craft brought only inconclusive answers from their captains.

## Ceramics Exhibit Opens Here

Vidrierias Gordiola, whose gallery is on Calle Victoria 8, opened an exhibition of rare ceramics yesterday. The works come from the famous Spanish house of Juan Ruiz de Luna located in Talavera, where the art has been developed for three centuries.

All manner of things made of pottery were shown in the exhibition, but the reproductions of famous paintings attracted the widest interest.

Among these last there were imitations in ceramics of Rubens, Goya, El Greco and Velasquez. Interest of many guests at the galleries centered around a Zurbarán in pottery.

## World News Briefs

WEIMAR.—This historic old German town was crowded with disciples of Goethe, celebrating the 100th anniversary of the death of the famous poet and philosopher. Distinguished representatives of German social, political and artistic life, including Chancellor Brüning were present for the ceremonies.

LONDON.—Repercussions following the publication of a book by David Lloyd George, in which the war-time premier scored the results of reparations, sounded throughout England. Word from France and Germany indicated that the seeming reversal of his former opinion voiced by the ex-premier had caused sharp political disputes.

SHANGHAI.—Encouraging word of an armistice agreement between China and Japan drifted out the conferences attended by representatives of the two warring nations, the United States, Great Britain, Germany, France and Italy.

BARCELONA.—Wholly unconfirmed radio reports from Madrid state that several persons have been killed and scores injured in new political rioting. The dispatch said Seville and Madrid were the centers of the rioting. Official news services carried nothing concerning the alleged uprising.

MARSEILLES.—The Argentine Cruiser Chaco with its cargo of deported aliens which no port seems willing to allow to land, was reported cruising toward Genoa.

PARIS.—March 29 was set as the date for the general strike of Paris theaters, motion picture houses and music halls unless the Minister of Finance reduced sharply the present amusement tax. The strike movement has been given the support of French playwrights.

### Death Toll of 106, Thousands Homeless First Reports State

NORTHPORT, Alabama.—A tornado of terrific intensity swept through the old South late yesterday, leaving in its wake a trail of death and destruction.

Latest reports showed 106 known dead. Communications with many stricken sections were interrupted and it was feared the death toll may go much higher. Thousands were injured and many more rendered homeless.

Coming off the Gulf of Mexico, the tornado swept northward across Alabama, Tennessee and Kentucky. Metropolitan centers not in the direct path reported driving rain and lightning.

Hurricane warnings had been posted along the Mexican Gulf and serious damage to ships was probably thus prevented. Shipping however, was delayed in most gulf ports. Land transportation was paralyzed.

The blow in most places was accompanied by a lashing rain which flooded homes, sent rivers out of their banks and increased the suffering of the homeless. Aid was rushed to the most accessible points by the Red Cross and other relief agencies.

Damage to field crops was not excessive from the wind, although the accompanying deluge has taken a large toll. No estimate of the loss was hazarded by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Fruit trees were uprooted in many sections and in the Alabama sector where many were in bloom, the damage was especially heavy.

Several small cities were isolated when the storm severed telegraph and telephone connections. Some of them may not be heard from for several days.

# SENATE BODY APPROVES 4 P ct. BEER

## Aid to Business Cited In Report of U. S. Economic Group

WASHINGTON. — Endorsement of four percent beer manufacture and sale as an aid to the economic recovery of the United States was made yesterday to the senate by the Economic Commission appointed to consider the problem.

The recommendation was considered of extreme importance as a barometer of opinion although there is little likelihood that the present senate would agree to the change. Wet leaders, however, hailed the report as a distinct victory and freely predicted that senators voting against putting the suggested action into effect might be hard put for votes at the November elections.

The commission considered the matter from a strictly business point of view. Its report, which steered clear of political and moral issues, set forth that the farmers would particularly benefit from the use of surplus grain.

A general stimulation of business was forecast in case the change was made—one group benefitting and passing on the benefits in turn to others. Action on the report by the senate is being closely watched.

Quevedo, new ambassador to Germany from Spain arrived and was greeted by officials of the Foreign Office.

BERLIN. — The Junkers Construction Works, Germany's largest airplane manufacturing concern, filed a petition of bankruptcy. Professor Junkers, designer of the famous Junkers planes and head of the concern, explained the move was taken to insure continued operation of the plant and to protect stockholders.

PARIS.—Answering recent alarming statements concerning the physical condition of Ex-president Poincaré, an announcement was made that no change has been noted by physicians attending the veteran diplomat who has been ailing for several months.

RIGA. — A cabinet crisis is feared following the resignation of Minister of Finance Semgals from the Latvian cabinet.

## The Spirit That is Spain

*Ethel Gillespie (Mrs. E. G. Jack) is a Canadian writer, well known in America for her interesting stories of her travels throughout the world and for her short stories. In the following article, written exclusively for THE PALMA POST, Mrs. Jack has given a poignant resumé of her impressions of Spain. During her present stay on the Island Mrs. Jack is stopping at the Grand Hotel.*

The complexities of modern Spain make a bewildering picture to the traveler. Monarchies and dictatorships, all forms of government may come and go, but what impresses me most is the simple, human quality of its people, faithful to their religion, which is the essence of the spirit of Spain. However much the country may be shaken with impending change, revolution, it is still a country saturated with traditions. And traditions, religious and philosophical are closely bound up with the life of the people.

It was with a sigh that I left the enchanted mountain of Monserrat, that shrine of beauty dedicated to the service of the Holy Grail, and returning to Barcelona, set sail for Palma de Mallorca. The stars, huge and golden glowed brightly in a purple sky, a crescent moon hung low as we slipped through the phosphorescent waters of the Mediterranean. It was after dawn the next morning when we steamed into port—as fair a port as any in the world. Fishing boats in the bay moved before a soft wind from the south. The ancient town of Palma lay sleeping in the warm golden haze of a spring morning.

Dominated by the Cathedral, the church is the salient feature here. Glittering spires pierce the sky, the sun refining the towers of the Cathedral into a cadence of gold. It lifted its voice in a sudden clangour of sweet bells as we went ashore, calling the faithful of Mallorca to early mass.

It is indeed a striking site for a great ecclesiastical edifice. Lofty, impressive the Cathedral crowns the old Moorish town which rises on the gradual slope of a hill. The history of Mallorca is lost in antiquity, but there is evidence that in the dark and misty ages before the beginning of what we now call ci-

vilization, this region attracted man for purposes of barter and security.

Everywhere there are ruins that challenge our interest. They tell a story of a Phoenician settlement, of the Roman conqueror which pictures the glory that was Rome. Later, Mallorca fell into the hands of the Moors. Magnificent examples of their influence, breathing their spell of romance, are to be seen in lofty Bellver Castle, the palace of the Almudaina and more ancient towers and fortifications.

## Wheat-Coal Barter Falls Through

BERLIN.—The *Boersen Courier*, important financial paper, announced that the proposed exchange of coal for wheat between Germany and Argentina had all but fallen through.

The barter was vigorously backed by factions in both countries because of the peculiar conditions into which they have been thrown by the current difficulties of international trade. In the Argentine wheat is being burned for fuel. In Germany some seven million persons are reduced nearly to starvation while the coal piled in the Ruhr Valley steadily deteriorates in value.

An attempt at a similar barter with Brazil for coffee fell through recently in spite of the fact that coffee-growers have been dumping their coffee in the sea and burning it in their furnaces.

## Trotsky Periled in Storm on Black Sea

CONSTANTINOPLE. — Leon Trotsky, exiled Russian revolutionary hero, and two companions narrowly escaped death near here when a small motor boat in which they were cruising was driven ashore on a rocky and deserted island in the Black Sea.

The three men fought their way through high seas to the barren shore while waves dashed their light craft to pieces. They were forced to spend the night on the island where all suffered from exhaustion and exposure.

They were rescued next day by fishermen who saw their distress signals. A search meanwhile had been organized for them.

Trotsky returned to Constantinople to find that permission to visit Czechoslovakia had been denied him by the government. The Turkish government had given its permission for the visit.

Trotsky at first was refused permission to leave the country, but he produced certificates from physicians showing that his health demanded that he visit some of the famous Czech spas.

The Turkish government thereupon gave its permission on the condition that his wife remain in Constantinople as hostage to guarantee his return.
