On the Island

It is only five days ago that I saw the flower-gatherers and went searching like them for pleasant things. But already I have my hands full of the fruits of that search. From many kind friends have come the assurances of help and tales of what they are doing. Some of our *extranjeros*, you know are doing the most interesting things.

Yesterday I met Captain E. R. Tailyour (pronounced tailor) and learned a lot about an interesting aspect of the island which misses most of us.

Captain Talyour was 20 years in the service of the Kenya government, but during that time he amused himself with a hobby—the study of the ancient Arab culture in its archeological aspects.

He has been in Majorca for only six months, but has found it to his liking, for he has become vastly interested in the field that is open here for his research of borough of Terreno.

A number of well known English and American residents of the Island dropped in for tea at the home of Mrs. Frances King Cooke in El Terreno. They had the pleasure of hearing Prof. Marcel Rossignol de Rives read several of the old French classics, as well as some of his own Provençal verse.

During the afternoon it was whispered that M. de Rives could sing, and it became necessary for him to prove the accusation. It developed to the delight of the guests that he did sing very well. For the gathering he sang both traditional ballads and new songs.

M. de Rives was in the French consular service at Nicaragua during the famous disturbance in that country. He escaped from it with serious injuries to return to France. Still recuperating, he came to enjoy the bracing air of Majorca.

Mrs. Anne Ryan of New York has been studying Junipero Serra lore in that father's home town of Petra. Recently she returned to Palma and told us how successfully her stories have been received in the magazines of The States.

BULL FIGHTS START IN PALMA MAY 8

U. S. Government Forces to Enter Search For Kidnaped Lindbergh Baby

WASHINGTON.—In government circles here it was announced that a plan was under consideration for the creation of a special commission to make an official inquiry into the disappearance of the Lindbergh baby.

The move carries with it the consideration of new laws on the crime of kidnaping, since the planned commission is to make for the prevalence of the crime.

Legal action by the federal government has admittedly been prompted by the imposition of the severest possible sentences on kidnapers who have come to trial since the Lindbergh's baby was stolen.

The particular aim of the commission

will be to study the nature of the kidnaping, and to find there exists a special genus of criminal who commits only this kind of crime. It will study the Lindbergh crime more in a effort to remedy the situation which made it possible than in hopes of finding the lost, or murdered, child.

HOPEWELL, New Jersey. — Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindberg in a statement to the press have expressed hope that something might come of the governmental inquiry into the disappearance of their child.

Mrs. Lindbergh is still under the care of a nerve specialist.

World News Storms Hit Italy, 3 Tourists Die

BERLIN.—Officials of the German General Electric company announced that the 40 percent decrease in income made it necessary to cut the staff. This would involve some 12,000 workers, for the company is the largest of its kind in Germany.

LONDON. — Home Secretary Samuels told the House of Commons that the Government did not propose to lift the ban on Barbusse and Muenzerberg, who have been recently prevented from entering the country. He scored communism in the course of his speech as a force seeking to bring about general collapse.

MEMEL.—The Lithuanian Government announced that the state of martial law, which has existed for some time in fermenting Memel as well as in the rest of the country, would be suspended. It will be replaced by a "law for the protection of the Republic".

The discontinuence of martial law was occasioned by the recent promise given to the League of Nations, though comment on the new law indicated it was just as severe as before.

LONDON.—Directors of the India Tyre and Rubber Company announced heavy losses for the past year, and that they had started a thorough reorganization under a new chairman.

NAPLES. — The Argentine auxiliary

Lepers Escape Colony On Mediterranean

From late radio reports it was learned that the lepers in the famous colony of Fontilles had broken out and spread throughout the countryside.

The story, which received no later confirmation, stated that the members of the colony ran wildly across the fields embracing and kissing whomever they met.

The leper colony of Fontilles is one of the biggest in the world, and is famous throughout Europe. It is located near Alicante on the Mediterranean coast.

Salamanca Bulls May Compete In Contests

The bull fighting season in Palma will open this year on May 8.

This date was definitely set late yesterday, and at the same time it was announced that for the first time in many years the prize ferocious bulls of the Marques de Villamarta will appear in the Palma arena.

Bull fighting in Palma has met with varying success in past years, many of the spectators expressing decided annoyance at the cow-like temperament of the animal contestants. This year, however, the impressario of the Palma festivals has announced that Salamanca bulls, famous for their ferocity, are to be entered in the contests.

which yearly brings many *extranjeros* to Spain, is scheduled this year to out-do previous performances. All of the matadors are native Mallorquins and six young bulls—wild and full of pugnacity—are being groomed for the occasion.

The old bull ring on the outskirts of Palma—already visited by many tourists and visitors to the Island—has been rebuilt for the festival. All of the colorful carnival aspects of those fetes for which Madrid and Barcelona are famous, are being arranged, including the grand procession before the fights, the draped boxes, the singing piccadores, the blaring brass band, the gay señoritas and the cabbage throwing galleries.

The matadors so far selected are Melchor Delmonte, Quinto Caldentey and Eduardo Víctor.

The season already has opened in Valencia, Barcelona will have fights next Sunday (Easter) and Monday. Madrid's festival will be featured by seven events, starting April 10 and continuing each Sunday until May 29. Alicante and Beziers each will open its season on April 10.

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RIOTS PERIL RUMANIA KINGDOM

Students Kill Police In Gun Battle At Jassa

BUCHAREST.—Student riotings spread throughout Rumania late yesterday, threatening one of the oldest and most powerful remaining monarchies in Europe.

The cause for the rioting—which broke out in the university town of Jassy and spread to other cities—was laid to a new law regulating professional standards. Political observers, however, saw a deeper significance in the uprisings and predictions that attempts would be made to overthrow the monarchy were freely made.

More than a score of students were wounded, two policemen were killed and many other participants were arrested in Jassy. The situation remains in a highly tense state, and the entire nation is seething with excitement.

The fighting in Jassy started when police attempted to interrupt an indignation meeting of students of the organization known as the "Iron Guard", a nationalistic group. The meeting was held to protest the suppression of public meetings in Bucharest, where students were protesting the new law requiring without warning the requirements for professional degrees.

The Government police charged the "Iron Guard" assemblage. The students messed and broke through the police cordon, beating their way into the open with clubs and crowbars.

A stronger police force arrived as reinforcements, charged the students with fixed bayonets and drove them into the Student Clubhouse. There the students barricaded themselves in and opened fire from the upper windows, killing two policemen and seriously injuring many others.

The police returned the fire and after several unsuccessful attempts finally stormed the clubhouse, arresting a those within.

The university was ordered closed, but further demonstrations are expected.

The ceremony of the washing of the feet of the poor at the Cathedral of Palma was celebrated late yesterday in accordance with the ancient ritual.

Sprinkled among the señoritas, in their most formal costumes of somber black, relieved by towering mantillas, stood many *extranjeros* as the sacred rites were performed. The occasion was Holy Thursday, next most revered day to Good Friday, which is being celebrated today.

The Bishop of Palma officiated at the ceremony and washed the feet of twelve poor persons, especially selected from the multitude for the occasion.

The Cathedral was crowded. The solemnity of the rites brought worshippers from the outlying districts, many of whom will remain in Palma until after the Easter services Sunday.
