NEW ORLEANS .- «Hold That Ti-ger!»

From Harlem to Hollywood, synchronized to clanging symbols, stamping feet; drowned out with whoops, blaring trumpets and screeching clarinets, that cry has rattled the rafters and rocked the radios for 15 years.

Back here in New Orleans, disgusted with it all, is the man who started it. He is Nick La-Racca, organizer and director of the most celebrated band of «outlaws» that ever raided the music world - The Original Dixieland Jazz Band.

Eighteen years ago they were just five boys who lived in the same neighborhood here. They didn't know a note of music, nor did they evre try to learn one. They were content to improvise their own tunes. They were featured over the greatest stars of vaudeville and legitimate stage. They played the capitals of Europe and were feted by royalty. They commanded a salary of \$1,2000

All the Founders Of Belgium Had Prepared Defenses Against Great Britain, Book Says

LONDON.-Official secrets about the system of treaties and diplomacy which brought on the World War have been revealed here with the astonishing disclosure that in 1912 Belgium did not even trust Britain, the guardian of her neutrality, and in fact, had prepared her military defense against a possible British invasion. It is contained in a volume entitled "British Documents On the Origins of the War.'

While the British public still feels that their country did the right thing when she entered the World War to uphold Belgium's neutrality, many received a jolt to read these disclosures whose authenticity cannot be doubted. The first reation was that nothing except a new diplomacy can assure world peace, no matter how many anti-war treaties are

Cigarets Originally Used Hundred Years Ago

PARIS. - The cigaret is 100 years old, but the conditions of its birth are so obscure that the world is not celebrating its centennial. Indirectly, smokers will toast its 100 years by smoking 2,000,000 tons of cigarets this

Like many another famous inwas due to an accident. The generally accepted story is that it was born in 1832, during the troops of Ibrahim Pacha, Viceroy of Egypt.

Legend says that the Egyptian soldiers were faced by an emergency. A camel carayan had brought a great quantity of Turkish tobacco, but another caravan loaded with pipes had been captured by the Turks. The soldiers had plenty of tobacco and wanted to smoke, but in the obsence of pipes, were obliged to find a substitute.

An officer solved the problem the situation very well, through by rolling a pinch of tobacco in a piece of tissue paper and enjoved the smoke. The news spread over the camp and those who could not find tissue paper

> The French tobacco monopo-Europe from the Near East, carried back by navigators. As far as Francé is concerned, the oldest official documents is an order signed by Louis-Philipe on Oct. 22, 1843, which authorizes the royal factory to manufacture cigarets.

Less than 20 years later, France smoked 7,400,000 cigarets a year. Last year, Frenchmen smoked 18,351,659,000 cigarets, corresponding to 18,000 tons of tobacco.




