# LONDON PACT IN **COMMONS**

# AERIAL LOCARNO **EXPLAINED**

#### WHITE PAPER

LONDON, Tuesday

The Anglo - French agreement concluded here on Sunday was welcomed in the House of Commons yesterday. The communiqué issued at the close of the conversationsbetween MM. Flandin and Laval, French Premier and Foreign Minister, and members of the British Cabinet was published during the course of the day as a Parliamentary White Paper.

Sir John Simon, Foreign Secretary, mentioned that before the issue of Sunday night's communiqué steps had been taken to inform the governments of the other countries concerned in the Locarno Treaty-Italy, Belgium and Germany-of the trend of the Anglo-French discussions, and to explain that they were now invited to join with the French and British Governments in equal consultation.

Sir John then referred to the scheme for providing a deterrent against unprovoked aerial aggression by one country against another in Western Europe. He explained that it was agreed between the French and British ministers that if the scheme were adopted Britain's commitment would not extend to cases beyond the class of case already covered by her Locarno obligations.

Mr. Lansbury, Leader of the Opposition, expressed his recognition of the importance of the communiqué during question time. Sir Herprovoked cheers when he congratulated the Foreign Secretary on the measure of agreement so far achieved, and expressed the hope that it would lead to a useful res-
