CEREMONIES IN MADRID

DECORATIONS

MADRID, Tuesday

The sixty-second anniversary of the procamation of the short-lived First Republic of Spain was celebrated here and throughout the country yesterday.

Don Juan José Rocha, Minister of State, presided over the first ceremony of the day here. It consisted of handing diplomas to several newly appointed members of the Order of the Republic, and took place at the Ministry of State at 11:30 a.m.

Don P'o Diaz, former mayor of Jaca, received the sash of the order. Señor Diaz held the mayoralty of the Aragonese city at the time of the proclamation of the Second Republic in 1931, and performed valuable services to the movement as president of the local revolutionary committee.

Other degrees of the Order were Gamoneda, journalists, Señor Gómez Bardaji and Doctor Jaime Ezthe Cortes and officials of the Ministry of State.

BISHOP'S SERMON ON NAZIS

Munich, Tuesday

In a sermon against the semiofficial Nazi campaign to get rid of Catholic and Protestant schools in Bavaria the fearless and embattled Cardinal Faulhauber, Archbishop of Munich, held the threat of excommunication over the heads of Nazi leaders in his episcopate.

The sermon was heard by Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, who still retains a considerable following despite the coming of the Third Reich and the amalgamation of German states, and numerous Ministry here yesterday. church dignitaries.

Rumours that strong Italian forces are being massed in Eritrea and Italian Somaliland along the Ethiopian frontiers are vigorously denied here, being described as attacks have convinced the Government of the necessity of taking precautionary measures in order adequately to defend Italian colonial territory, especially in view of the clearly perceptible unrest in the Ethiopian border regions.

For that reason, it is stated, the available military forces have been concentrated at strategic points along the frontier. These measures are described as being of a pur-

> That discovery naturally led me on to genealogical researches among other people I know. So I looked up the records on the Ganchero, who claims that his family tree goes back to the time when they lived in it.

MORE SNOW IN

MADRID, Tuesday

be passing from Spain, has become withdrawal of the new unemploymore intense than ever.

Temperatures below zero are reported from forty provinces, while Madrid itself has been treated to the unprecedented phenomenon of a whole day's snowfall. Snow has Ministry for a study of the chafallen as far South as Cádiz and Seville, while Segovia holds the temperature record with fourteen and the possibilities of using the degrees below zero.

The railway from Madrid to Sanbrian passes. Communication between the Castilian port and the Melbourne air race. capital is by way of Bilbao on the East and Oviedo on the west, and trains from both of those places are running with difficulty and arriving late.

from Reinosa in Santander province, and the roofs of some houses in nearby villages have collapsed under the weight. The villagers are organising wolf hunts, as the hungry beasts have become so bold as to come to the doors of isolated cottages.

The roads being impassable, sledges are being used to supply food to the villages. Both foodstuffs and fodder for cattle are being exhausted, and some animals have died of cold and hunger.

The snowfall has been continuous for two days in Lugo, in Galicia, isolating many villages. Another heavy fall has taken place at Pontevedra, also in the North-West.
