## M. COT'S SPEECH IN ZURICH

## WILD SCENES OF DISORDER

## STUDENT PROTEST

Wild scenes were witnessed wh French Air Minister Pierre Cot yes terday attempted to make a speech here on the subject with which he is most familiar.
The Air Minister intended ad dressing his audience on the creat ion of an air fleet as an internat ional police force. His speech was arranged by the League of Nations and the Pan-European Union.
But he had no more than begua to speak when he was violently interrupted by a deafening din. Stu denits present in the audience shouted and stamped, making it impossible for the speaker to cont inue.
Just exactly what the row was about could not be immediately ascertained. After a few minutes however, when the noises were sor ted out, it was discovered that the students were protesting agains the shooting of the Frenchmen who fell on the Piace de la Concorde a year ago.

## Police Called

Efforts were made by those with in the hall to quiet the disturbers but were completely unavailing I was then that the police were called. They arrived within a few minutes and promptly ejected the noise-makers.
Most of the rioters seemed, according to official Swiss reports, to be French and French Swiss, although Zurich, which is very near the German border, is normally more German than French and German is the language most generally spoken there.

Geographically, historically and politically Spain has been forced to follow and support Britain's polcy in the Mediterranean. That policy, declares señor Cambó, wa already felt irksome before the

## World War.

In the matter of armaments, he contends, Spain cannot afford to look on passively at the continuat on of the present race among nat ions already better armed than Spain. Whatever happens, he conoludes, Spain must be able to rely on herself for her own national defence.
Señor Cambo's article is symp omatic of the interest arouspolitical circles her y the drawing together 0 the two powers whicin Spain's chief neighbours an rivals in the Western Mediterran ean and in Africa. It is widely ap preciated that Spain cannot rem wich completely changes the as pect of Mediterranean affairs.
The recent declaration on the subject made by Señor Rochia, Minister of State, in Cortes was a disappointment to those who had expected a definite statement of polcy. The Minister said little beyond welcoming the move towards European peace, but he has promised to enter more fully into the Mediterranean aspects of the Rome agreements in a speech to the Foreign Affairs Committee of the House
An aspect of the Mediterranean question which concerns Spain ciosely is the revision of the Statute of Tangier, which is due to ta ke place this year. Great Britain Spain, France and Italy all have interests to defend in the inter national city, which is enclosed on its landward side by the Spanish Zone of Protectorate in Morocco. ## THE NIGHT WATCH

Right down to the humbiest de3ivery boy, the watchword of The Pailma Post is HONESTY. Which brings me around, little by little, to the fact that I am about to pen a brief dissertation upon integrity. I could, of course, merely say, «Honesty is the best policy» and let it so at that-I should have to stop there because I no more know why the saying is true than did the platitude vender who first peddled it.

## INFLUENZA IN MADRID

## MADRTD Wednesdas

About seventy per cent of the population of Madrid either has or has had infuenza during the past week, according to estimates made by competent medical authorities The epidemic is attributed to the sudden changes of temperature which have succeded the recen coid wave.
The latest distinguished victim is Señor Jalon, Minister of Communications. He was obliged to stay in bed instead of attending Monday's Cabinet meeting.
Señor Lerroux, the Premier, had been prevented by an attack of the prevailing ailment from accompanying Señor Alcala Zamora President of the Repubitic, on his weekend journey to Valencia to attend the launch of the exploration ship Artabro. Señor Lerroux was Cabinet meeting
Señor Alcalá Zamora was als present at the meeting, but took to his bed with infuenza immedia eiy on his return home. His condition is reported to be not serious.
The President's wiffe and daugh ter were also prevented from trav elling to Valencia on Saturday by the same cause. Señorita Alcalá is already convalescent, and Señor de Alcalá is reported to be much improved.
Generally speaking, the epidemic has been of a mild type, though it is widespread. Madrid chemists report that their sales of aspirin and other sudorifics have quintupled, and some pharmacists in the Cuatro Caminos district have exhausted their stock of aspirin and been unable to make up prescriptions.
The light diet prescribed as part of the treatment for the dis ease is blamed for a falling off of from ten to fifteen per cent in last weeks sales in Madrid food shops, aithough the sale of brandy, esteemed a sovereign remedy against the «'flus, has reduced the deficit somewhat. Restaurants have also suffered, especially the chéaper ones, about one-fourth of whose ellientèle is missing.
