KANE HOMEWARD BOUND

Completes Six

Months Sentence

GIVES LOCAL
CORRESPONDENTS THE SLIP


On Thursday Captain Kane was released from the local jail and flew immediately to Marseilles, Paris and home. On that day he completed his sentence of six months, to which the original sentence of two years, eleven months, was reduced by appeal to Madrid.

Palma representatives of the foreign press dashed hither and yon as they sought a final interview with the Captain and in the hope of securing photographs of his departure. Most of them assembled on the quay expecting him to take the Marseilles boat but waited in vain. While they were waiting there he took the plane from Alcudia.

The sympathy of the majority of foreign residents in Spain, and particularly of those in Mallorca, was with Captain Kane throughout his six months' incarceration during which at all times he behaved like the gentleman and captain that he is. It does not behoove us who live outside the boundaries of our own countries to criticize or comment on the laws of the country in which we we choose to live as ex-patriates. Customs and laws vary greatly in all parts of the world and what might well pass almost unnoticed in one country becomes a grave offense in another.

When something happens, as happened in Captain Kane's case, it almost inevitably becomes at once an international affair due to the publicity which papers seeking sensational news give it. Were it not for the furore which these blatant journals create many of these affairs might be satisfactorily explained. As it is, the hands of consuls and those who really have the welfare of the individual at heart are hindered and often completely tied by the blare of publicity which shrieks at the public from headlines.

The captain has served his time and the case is closed. His ship, the *Brompton Manor*, has been repaired from the ravages of the sea whose storms took the life of his second-in-command during the summer. His bridge is ready for him again. May you not think too harshly of Mallorca, Captain, and *hasta luego*.



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International News

LONDON NAVAL CONFERENCE

Representatives of ten countries placed their views before the Naval Conference at its first plenary session at the Foreign Office on Monday, after Mr. Baldwin had delivered an address of welcome to the delegates. Sir Samuel Hoare was absent for a short but necessary rest. France, Italy, Japan and the United States were represented. A twenty-per-cent tonnage reduction in the world's leading navies to promote international peace was proposed by President Rosevelt through his Ambassadorat-large, Norman Davis.

MMe. NINA GRIEG

Madame Nina Grieg, widow of the composer, died at Copenhagen last Monday at the age of 90. Madame Grieg was always the inspiration for her famous husband. Music was sacred to her. She was able even at an advanced age to interpret the songs of Grieg as no one else could, and took part, at public concerts, in four-handed compositions which she had been accustomed to play with the master himself.

DENIED

The United States Supreme Court, with the single written word, «denied,» made known its decision in refusing to review the action of the trial court in the Hauptman Case. And so the German carpenter is brought a step nearer the electric chair in which he is to die for the kidnapping and murder of the Lindbergh child. He has but one faint chance left to escape from the «chair.» This is an appeal to the New Jersey State Board of Pardons. It is understood that his attorney will make this appeal at once, but is also a forgone conclusion that it also will be denied.

SPANISH CABINET CRISIS

Prime Minister Chapaprieta handed in his resignation Monday to President Zamora. The action had been anticipated following the political uproar caused by the denunciation of Senor Nombela former Inspector General of Colonies.

WARSAW

Because Italy owes about \$1,500,000, Polish coal shipments to Italy have barely exceeded 50,000 tons a month, which means that payment difficulties have been as effective as sanctions in this case.

THE PALMA SEWER SCHEME

Not a very salubrious subject, is it? I approach it with fear and trembling. I don't want to make a smell and shall try and tone it down to suit the taste or rather odour of my Majorca Sun readers. To say that it is not important would be foolish and though it is all buried under the ground and out of sight, it's not out of smell. To my mind it is one of the most important works the Palma Council have ever undertaken, second only to the water scheme, and one which naturally had to follow that or else this growing city with all its natural advantages would wake up one morning with the blackest cloud that ever over-shadowed it. It would come from underneath, not from the heavens. I never heard yet of any of the dread diseases coming from fresh air and sunshine and as Palma has more than its share of these luxuries, what a million pities if all should be obscured by the want of sanitation.

I remember about four years ago, a well known lady staying at the Formentor Hotel asked for a doctor to go out at once from Palma, to examine her throat. I did the trip with him. She evidentally thought she had diphtheria. While waiting in the hotel lounge, several of the people came and asked me to find out at any cost what it really was and 'phone them after the doctor's analysis, in his laboratory. I guarantee if that had been what they hoped it was not, that hotel, which was crowded at the height of the summer boom season, would have been empty the next day. So from just the commercial advantage it is inestimable to this popular tourist town. Have you ever spoken to the summer tourist who drops off here for the day? He has generally visited Algiers, Naples or even Nice. He not only tells you how nice the people are but the lack of nasty smells which you find in most Mediterranean ports. Of course, Palma is only beginning to develope this side of business and up to now is not big enough to create this disturbance, but that does not say its city engineers have been asleep. They have seen the rapid development of the

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town and are planning accordingly, so that tourists, visitors, resident or transient, will never be able to go home and say; «Oh, yes! Very nice, good climate—very cheap. But, my dear, those awful smells. I heard it is a hot-bed of typhoid and I left as soon as I could.» That sort of advertisement would kill paradise.

Lord Castleross' now famous tale on Palma in the «Sunday Express» had a small grain of truth in it. When he spoke of the Mediterranean Sea as a sewer sea he had evidently bathed off the Carlton Hotel in Cannes or the Grand Hotel in Juan-les-Pins, or a shady corner at Monte Carlo, Good Lord! You do get there those whiffs and tastes of drains which these towns run off the shore into a tideless ocean. In Victoria, British Columbia, I worked for six months just studying tides and currents on the great tidal ocean of the Pacific, to see where the sewer could be emptied into the sea, so as to keep the shores clean. Even then, we had to take it a mile out to sea. I often donned a diver's suit and inspected the work, so you see the difficulties a tideless ocean brings.

Palma, not like other Mediterranean towns, has forseen them and overcome them, though I believe there is much opposition to the programme which the engineers have worked out. This, I consider, is chiefly ignorance; almost as bad as in the days when many people objected to a railway running anywhere near their town site or property.

I said at the beginning of this article I approached it with fear and trembling. I well remember about five years ago, I had to go to England with a well known Spanish engineer from Valencia, Sr. A.. to study some sanitary work. Going over on the boat from Calais to Dover, bursting with pride, I introduced the engineer to a bottle of Bass, always my first introduction when I get on that boat. He would pay for it. He received half-crowns, two-shilling pieces, sixpenny pieces and most of the regular English money in change for his one pound note. I tried to explain the values of them. He said: «Firbanks, you are behind the times in England.» I thought nothing more of it till a few days after;

we were inspecting work in the heart of London, Southwark, and the arrangement we saw then broke my heart as a proud Englishman. He said: «Do you remember what I said on the boat?»

After seeing the modern way they have with the water here I should certainly tell the people to leave it to the man at the wheel. He's no fool and Palma, I'm sure, will be ultra-modern in its treatment of sewage. Of course, I'm confident he will get plenty of setbacks and snags. When I inspected some council tenements in Manchester for workpeople, they used the bath for coal and often the W. C. for rubbish. I'm thinking what will happen to his small sewer pipes when the maid, who perhaps is not quite so enlightened as her English sister, so we think, throws dirty housecloths, and occasional sardine cans in it. I know it cost me Pts. 50. to have my drains cleaned because of those things being found in my sewer here in Palma.

Of course, I know all the pipes are very accessible with very modern manholes at every change of direction, and, as I said before, I trust the man at the head. Terreno will, I think, benefit perhaps as much as anywhere. You know how it has been built up and modernized to suit the foreign element. Have you ever thought where the sewer runs to? Oh, yes—septic-tanks, blackholes they call them, but with all the moderness put into that part of the

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THE YOUNG IDEA..

A Reflection upon the Youth of Spain

A great deal is said of illiteracy in Spain, and as is usual in cases of sweeping generalities, many of the estimates given are absurd. Official statistics place the percentage of illiteracy at 21%, A lady tourist last year informed the writer that the figure was nearer to 99°/o. Both figures are wrong, especially the latter. Admittedly there exist in Spain regions where learning is practically unknown, nor, owing to the nature of the occupations of the inhabitants, is it particularly necessary, if one takes into account the evils attendant upon universal education-concentration upon cities, discontent in agricultural regions, etc. Similarly one finds in Spain (which is larger than France-did you know that?) provinces where education is taken for granted and reaches a very high level. Principal among these is Cataluña. There the percentage of illiteracy is exceptionally low, and may soon be non-existent. Since the advent of the Republic a great deal has been done for education all over Spain, and in Cataluña the Government of the Generalitat has opened modern schools in many places, furnishing them with competent teaching staffs. In Barcelona particularly, where the lack of schools has ever been an urgent problem, up-to-date schools have been opened in many districts, mainly for nonpaying pupils, though a graduated system of payment, according to the parents' means, is also in operation. In a number of the higher-grade schools, where pupils are prepared for Matriculation and the University, German and English are taught, whilst French and Latin form part of the curriculum of all these centres. Castillian and Catalan, both oral and written, are also taught as in most

cases the pupils are bilingual. As an example of the innate imagination of the average Spanish child, the following compositions written by second-course English students are interesting and amusing. The compositions were on a "free" theme, and the pupils,

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whose ages range from thirteen to fifteen, show not a little humour in their efforts. Corrections have been made in one or two places.

«Clear Night», by E.V. (boy). Based on the popular Song, «Mi Jaca».

«A light breeze blows. The moon smiles, reflected in the quiet sea. In an olive tree an owl hoots, and upon the grass of the green field, beside the high-road, sleeps my hack, my good hack. 

PYRANNA-HO!

Sent us by «Another Bronzed Traveller,» inspired by Mr. Smallwood's article reprinted in our last issue.

IT WAS in a small public-house in Deptfort that by chance I ran across the bronzed traveller who first told me about Pyranna. Having traded extensively in coral in places as remote as Spitzbergen and Tristan da Cunha, I at once decided to go to Majorca, though I failed to find the place on the map.
On making inquiries, however,

ascertained that I might take a Pacific-Mail ship to Lisbon and there embark for Ascension Island, whence with ordinary luck I might be able to secure a passage to Pyranna on one of the many trading schooners that carry such commodities as copra, gum-copal, cassava and beeswax from these sequestered islands to the gilded emporia in Regent Street and the Rue de Rivoli.

The voyage to Lisbon was uneventful. save for a few water-spouts in the Gulf of Biafra; but, after leaving the Portuguese coast, we had the misfortune to run into the equatorial equivalent of the Labrador Current and narrowly escaped being wrecked on an iceberg

At Ascension I found that my information had been incorrect. The place was absolutely destitute of copra, beeswax, etc; but a minor detail such as that could never deter such a bronzed traveller as myself. Making myself understood by means of gestures, I ascertained from the natives that a schooner left the island every Friday for Pyranna, and that this schooner was called «the Wash-boat».

The occupations and means of subsistence of isolated and semi-civilized communities have always interested me as much as their ethnological customs and traditions; but it was not without some difficulty that I succeeded in discovering that the Majorcans - or Pyrannese, as they may be called-were

too occupied in their industrial and commercial activities to take in their own washing, which regularly every Monday was sent across to Ascension Island--a distance of approximately nine hundred

These so-called «washing schooners» had all been christened «the Europa»; and that on which I had the good fortune to secure a berth was «the Europa III», the skipper of which was a half-caste Pyrannese with whom I was able to converse fluently in a kind of pidgin Spanish-Kanaka.

Our cargo being clean washing, the boat was well out of the water and I immediately foresaw that, should we encounter heavy weather, we would be likely to roll badly—a contingency I had some cause to dread; for I must confess that, in spite of my varied experiences upon the Seven Seas and my knowledge of geography acquired at first hand, I am, and have always been, a very poor sailor. My fears, however, proved to be quite, groundless, for we had not been four days out from Ascension before we were becalmed for weeks in the doldrums.

The half-breed skipper had told me that with favourable winds he could get the washing to Pyranna in about three weeks; but on this occasion, I am afraid, the Europa III was more than two months late. The only incident on the voyage worthy of remark was that we

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sighted the Europa I, outward-bound with the dirty linen, and so over-freighted in consequence that her decks were half awash—in other words, the Atlantic Ocean, or the Pacific (for I can never remember these things), was doing the work of the Ascension Islanders.

As my bronzed traveller had led me to imagine, the place was nothing but a vast atoll, crowned with feathery palms and other sub-tropical flora.

The eager aborigines joyfully seized my baggage and carried it to a singular and altogether unique conveyance, called locally a *tah-k'si*, in which I was transported to the stone-built hut with a palm-thatched roof where I have lived ever since, the rent being fifteen Majorcan piastres per annum-the equivalent of three and threepence, or about seventy cents American.

world now, they are about as useless as anything can be except for seeping into the garden and down into the lower part of it. I know I can get more mosquitoe bites in half-an-hour in Terreno than in any other part of Palma. I'm sure when the sewer scheme is finished, that part will be like the rest of Palma or even the Panamá Canal, free of them. I know since the water scheme has been put in, 50°/o of the contagious diseases have gone. I'm sure when the sewers are there it will indeed be a health resort.

The arrangement for the treatment of the sewerage down near the gas works has been severely criticised and that Part is now hung up waiting the opinion of Madrid, because, as I said, of local opinion that does not understand what I know. The smell which they say will be the chief objection is not near as bad as the leather works all around that district. I have skated on these tanks in England

and I have fallen through the ice into them, and coming out, have smelt less than after swimming in a farm duck pond. I should say a faint odour like tar will be the worst scent anyone will get and I'm sure the smell of the leather works will take care of that.

Mr. Engineer, what I have not seen yet, are, ventilation towers. Are they a thing of the past now? I'm confident, if the by-laws of Palma insisted on them in the sanitation of the houses, our bathrooms would be sweeter smelling places. It seems such a pity to me, in most of the modern houses and flats that are now going up, this is not taken care of. What about it?

I'm afraid when Palma is really sanitary minded, which it is rapidly becoming, more than many of the other Mediterranean seaside towns, living in the little house boats on the dockside will be a thing of the past. A specified time will only be allowed before moving day or rather sailing day. Perhaps, then, I will compete in the swim of the Port.

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BOOKS

The Brothers
L. A. G. Strong
(Albatross)

A book which immediately, without any doubt or hesitation, transplants one into what is to most people a complete change of atmosphere is one which might be welcomed at any time. Just such a book is «The Brothers,» which from the first line plunges one into the curious, bleak simplicity of the far northern parts of Scotland, where the people are still half savage, from certain points of view, yet possess a marvellous grandeur all their own.

Cunning but weak, John Macrae and his simple-minded brother love, in their primitive fashion, the same girl and revive a family feud which culminates in a rowing contest magnificently described. The author's deep love for the west coast of Scotland shows, perhaps in spite of himself, in the living descriptions of the stormy little fishing village, and of the crude, rugged people who fought nature and the law in the days when smuggling was still pursued and life was ruled by local tradition and superstition. The climax, in which John uses his brother to rid himself of the girl who unconciously tortures him, is worthy of the pen of Thomas Hardy.

I am against the promiscuous use of the word «strong,» but can think of none better to describe the technique of this book. To my mind it is by far the best that this author has written. If the end, when John returns from all his troubles and runs happily down to the sea again, smacks somewhat of all the other endings of Mr. Strong's books, that is nothing against it, particularly. In fact, the only thing one might possibly say against the end is that it is the end.
