PALMA PREPARES FOR GAYEST SUMMER SEASON

U. S. Kidnaping Inquiry Opens As 28th Day Brings No News of Lindbergh Baby

The twenty-eighth day of mystery concerning the disappearance of the infant son of Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Linbergh passed without a single new valid being discovered.

At the same time a survey of the crime of kidnaping throughout the nation was begun by the United States Department of Justice. Acting on recommendations for Congress, the department sought to determine why at this time the crime

has gained such widespread popularity among criminals.

The Philadelphia Public Ledger and other papers in that part of the country continued to cooperate with police in the belief that the underworld tip that the baby was in the Cheasepeake Bay region might have foundation in fact.

New York police were unable to advance a single new theory or to uncover a new lead on which to work.

World News Briefs

MADRID — Confidential reports received here tell of the arrest at Antiguerra of 25 persons involved in an alleged plot against the government headed by radical leaders and involving plans for a peasant uprising.

LONDON — Tin fell to a new low on the world market, dropping to 118 pounds, 3 shillings, sixpence per ton, the cheapest it has been since last September. Cooper also weakened and the price of gold declined somewhat.

VIENNA — From the Brazilian government to the Austrian came an offer of 10,000 sacks of coffee for the unemployed. The Austrian decided they would charge not one shilling, which is the cost of transport, but two, which would show a neat profit to be devoted in turn to shipping Tyrolese peasants to Paraguay.

BAGDAD — The Irak government appears to be making a determined drive against the Kurds and reports reaching here from the Barsan District tell of the concentration of ten battalions of infantry and two regiments of cavalry in the region, as well as three batteries of mountain artillery, two columns of machine gun cars and twelve armoured cars. The offensive is scheduled to start next month.

REVAL — The Esthonian parliament has adopted a draft of amendments to the constitution submitted by a drafting committee in which the principal change calls for election of a president to serve five years. In the past the premier has acted as president.

Bishop Defends Birth Control

LONDON — In a book published here by Dr. David, Bishop of Liverpool, the celebrated cleric declared that both versions of the English prayer-book not only admit of, but actually advocate birth control.

The book has caused a sensation in church and social circles because of its outspoken thesis and the originality of its contents.

The Bishop holds that the prayer-book admits that sexual intercourse has other functions than that of pro-generation. He holds that it is not only the right, but the duty of parents to regulate the size their families.

In a strong statement on the subject, he challenges the opinions of much of the orthodox world by writing:

"Parents cannot avoid the responsibility for superfluity of children by saying they were sent by God".

The book is devoted to problems of sex marriage and birth control, and the treatment is in a straightforward manner which is creating wide and sometimes bitter controversies on the subject.

LONDON — John D Rockefeller of the United States has purchased the famous Mogul diamond for a sum announced at 2,000,000 francs.

AMSTERDAM — Formation of a new center party has been started here to cover the ground on the borderline between the Communists and the Socialist Democrats.

MILAN — The Finnish aviator Captain Bremer left here on the second leg of his scheduled flight from Helsinki to Capetown.

Island Attracts Smart Crowds Of Visitors

A season of sports and entertainment for the summer months was announced yesterday by hotel and resort owners, and proprietors of the many places of amusement in Mallorca.

In past years Palma has catered to the winter visitors almost exclusively, but for the first time this year, a definite smart summer season is projected. Hotels will retain their full staffs the year round, and the time will be declared one of gaiety and amusement.

Many of the vacation tourists from England and the United States are expected to avail themselves of the many new and interesting features to be provided this year.

A high spot of the season will be the pageant of St. Peter's day, June 29, which will be enlarged to encompass the entire Island. The fete usually is celebrated by the residents of Mallorca exclusively St. Peter being the patron saint of fishermen.

This year there will be a grand pageant when all the unique and quaint customs, native to the Balears, will be celebrated.

Late in July will be held the "Aquatic Caravan", which annually draws many visitors from the Continent to participate in the twenty-day program.

Bathing facilities are being enlarged to care for the anticipated influx of visitors who seek the mild climate and gay entertainment of this Island during the summer. A half-dozen or more completely equipped bath houses are being put in shape, and already scores of persons are availing themselves of these conveniences.

In addition, there are numerous secluded beaches spread about the shore-rim where private picnic and bathing parties may be held.

Mountain climbing expeditions to the cold peaks of Puig Mayor and Puig Minor are being organized by tourist agencies. Many private parties also will

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Luxurious New Hotel to be Built at Pollensa

Victoria-Royal Owners Buy Bay Site

Another milestone in the development of Palma and Mallorca as an all-year round pleasure resort and a community of homes was reached last night with the announcement of a new and luxurious hotel to be built at Puerto Pollensa.

The land was purchased by the owners of the Grand-Victoria hotel group and was announced by Don Pedro Mas, manager of the enterprises, who will supervise construction of the new edifice.

The site of the new hotel will be that broad expanse of land known as Fortaleza, which juts out into the sea and forms one of the boundaries of the Bay of Pollensa.

The furthest removed portion of the point will be the site of the hotel, and spacious grounds will surround it. The site adjoins that owned by the government on which the lighthouse is situated. Behind it and facing the Bay, is the real estate development belonging to José Costa and associates.

Plans for the new hotel have not yet been announced, but the management has promised that its appointments and service will be of the same high quality which distinguish the Grand and Victoria hotels.

The new hotel will be landscaped to provide a comfortable park with facilities for sports and recreation.

The City of Palma was being dressed in her gayest clothing today, as the train bringing His Excellency, Don Alcalá Niceto Zamora, and party speeded toward Cartagena. The party will arrive here aboard a special cruiser at 9:30 a. m. tomorrow.

The celebration of the President's visit, which will last three days and three nights, is called "Fiesta de Primavera".

Chain garlands of myrtle festoon the Avenida Antonio Maura and the Poseo Borne, Calle Conquistador to the Palza Cort. Within them are concealed electric light bulbs, which will throw indirect lights on these main thoroughfares in the evening hours.

A special electric line has been connected with the historic Bellver Castle, which will be brilliantly illuminated during the visit.

Governor Don Juan Manent of the

The walking of the eucañas, a greased mast extended over the water on the end of which is a gold coin, will provide the high lights of the day's entertainment. All who fail are given a peremptory ducking in the bay.

Balears issued a formal statement in which he thanked the populace for its cooperation in planning the fete and for the generous donations received. The statement also called upon all loyal subjects of the Republic to participate in the festivities.

A notice, in Spanish and Mallorquin, has been posted on the façade of the Ayuntamiento (City Hall). It is signed by the Alcalde, Señor Francisco Villalonga Fábregues, and calls attention to the coming visit of His Excellency, at the same time urging the cooperation of the people of Palma in making it a glorious success.

The President's cruiser, *Almirante Cervera*, is scheduled to sail from Cartagena tonight, arriving off Palma around 8 a. m. tomorrow. The reception will begin at 9:30.

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NEW JAPAN-CHINA WAR RAGING

Peace Parley Is Upset by New Fighting

SHANGHAI — Peace negotiations between China and Japan were abruptly adjourned until further notice when the representatives of the World Powers sitting on the conference were informed of the new and heavy fighting at Harbin, near Russian territory.

SHANGHAI — War of considerable magnitude was precipitated in Manchuria today when the Chinese troops under General King Chao suddenly attacked positions held by Japanese and "Manchurian Republicans", and drove all before them.

The significance of the victory became immediately evident from the reactions which followed.

Orders were issued by the Japanese high command to reinforce the broken line with the best of Nippon's soldiery. At a late hour last night troops were on their way toward Harbin and the Chinese Eastern Railway, via motor-trolley and all other available means of transportation.

Meanwhile at the front, the Chinese were stopped after they had taken many towns and strategic positions. The Japanese held them with vicious and continued machine-gun fire, while overhead their bombing planes wheeled and dropped death on the Chinese lines.

The evident successes of Chinese arms brought out another manifestation. Throughout the Japan-controlled Chinese territory the news was followed by communist uprisings.

In Korea, the demonstrators were clubbed and beaten into submission by police who were forced to use the most brutal and direct means possible to restore order.

In Tientay there was mob fighting, in which the communists killed twenty of their opponents.

Chinese military circles in Shanghai knew nothing of the stand Russia would take in the new revolt which is on the border of the Russian sphere of influence, but they believed that the aftermath of communist rioting indicated a soviet connection with the present struggle.
