## TREMENDOUS SUM Boncoirr Gets Vote APPROPRIATED FOR GERMANWORKLESS <br> Df Confidence By Workable Majority

Money will be Used For Financing Public Works Throughout the Nation

Berlin, Fridag. Carrying out is stated policy of creating work for Germany's unemployed millions, the government today appropriated $5,000,000$ marks for use in large scale public woks construction
This plan was suggested and is now being carried out by Dr Gunther Gereke, federal com missioner for unemployment rel ief in the von Schleicher cabinet. The largest part of the sum will be uscd for road building, repairs and reclamation of swamp and waste land. This later is in preparation for the domestic colonization, a sort of «back to the soil movement which it is believed, will do much to cut down the cities' unemployed.
In authoritative quarters it is predicted the first work under this program will be begun early in February.
With this program the government opens a concentrated drive against unemployment which Cancellor von Schleiicher, in a recent speech broadcast to the nation, described as the chief task of his ministry.
Unlike former chancellor von Papen's program. which relied on private initiative, the new program depends, for its success on the cooperation of publi bodies led by the government. It is emphasized that public works construction is but the forerunner of several plans at present held up the sleve of Dr. Gereke.
Poles May Quit France On Debt Stand

WARSAW, Friday. - The Polish government is seriously consider ing opening independent negotations with America on the debt question and leaving France almost alone in her stand, authoritative quarters revealed here today.
With the semi-olficial report scarcely uttered, the opposition press is already attacking the advocacy of a policythat would be bound to cause a strain between this nation and France, two countries that have long acted in. accord and harmony.

The boy soprano will be dress ed as a sibyl and is to wear a gorgeous crown for the occasion. The sibyl, or sibila, which he represents is a prophetess of the future common in many other churches. On this occasion, however, the standard Mallorcan classic is always sung-prophesying the birth of Christ.

Jogoslav - Italian Strain Alarms Europe

Rome, Friday-T he recent speech of Foreign Minister Jeftitch of Jugoslavia has further in creased Italian anger over alleg ed-Italian demonstraticns in Dalmatia and it is now reported here that the large European powers are alarmed lest relations between this country and the Balkan state be broken off. Jertitch reffered to the incide ats in Dalmatia as trivial, while the Italian press has devoted space to shooting aftrays which, if they really took place, were of serious
proportions
The semi - official Giornale D'Italia goes so far as to see Jugoslavia preparing for war with Italy and finds France an instigator of the idea, on the somewhat hazy grounds that such a situation would cover up economic difficulties at home

Speech Outlining Policy Is Followed by 365 to 215 Vote Favoring Premier

Paris, Friday.-After facing the Chamber of Deputies late yesterday and declaring his policies, Premier Joseph Paül-Bōncour was accorded a vote of confidence by a majority of 150 .
There were 365 in favor of the government and 215, against it, giving the Premier a workable majority and apparentlv assuring his continuance in office for some time to come.

The declaration itself was about what had been expected and startled no one. After the usual circuitous route leading up to the one question of primary importance. a route that gave Paul-Boncour time to pour forth the usual platitudes about not having sought his office, the Premier took up the war debt problem.

At this point Boncour had some nice things to say about his predecessor, Edouard Herriot. He declared that most of the former Premier's policies would be continued and only on the debt matter there be a difference.

Without threatening to attempt to force the Chamber to agree to payment of the last debt instalment, he nevertheless urged the program of approaching the United States «with peculiar caution» in order to see if some sort of a settlement might not be arranged.

The Premier blamed the curent economic crisis on mental conditions of the people invol-

# Vice-President May Go to Work la fladora 

Garner Slated For Real Job Under<br>Roosevelt

United Press Staff Correspondent Washing ton.-If Franklin D Roosevelt carries into the White House one of his earlier ideas he may make an important handy man out of his vice-president John N. Garner.
When Roosevelt was running for vice-president in 1920, he was quoted in a magazine arti cle as suggesting that the Vice president should not be conde mned to sit in lonely grandeur but instead should be put to work. One suggcstion was to give the Vice-prcsident a roving commision to help the President
His idea was to make the Vice president an assistant instead of a social figure who dines in so ciety by night and sits in the Se nate by day. Such a chainge would not necessarily require le gislation.
«If there ever a waste of manpower it would seem to be here,, Roosevelt is quoted as saying in an articule in the Saturday Eve nimg Post of October 16, 1920 «Here is a man paid $\$ 12,000$ a year who traditionally has complained that he has next to no thing to do."

Some here thought they s a w indications during Ronsevelt's debt visit that Speaker Garner would emerge as an important figure in tha next administration. He was the most silent of all vice-presidential candidates. But when Roosevelt came here Gar ner was with him almost contantly. He, it is said, undertook to keep Roosevelt from weaken ing on the debt issue.
Garner would not indicate that Roosevelt had asked him to undertake auy special activity in the next administration. But he said he was ready to serve in any way desired-
Roosevelt voiced his views about drafting the Vice-president for useful work in 1920 just after Warren Harding had announced that if elected he would have the Vice-president sit with the cabinet. Roosevelt approved this idea, but said it was not emough since many important admistration matters were not discussed at cabinet meetings.
He would use the Vice-president as a major coordinator of government departments and Congress.
«The vice president might aid the President generally and when occasion suggests serve him specifically with reports on situations affecting one or more of the departments or bureaus," the Roosevelt magazine article said.

## Goods Graft Worries Soviet

Moscow.-Petty graft,
goods rather than in money, has
become so widespread an evil in
he past year that the Soviet
press is obliged to fight it with exceptional vigor.
It has grown into an important although intangible element in the national economy, disturbing plans for distribution of goods and giving thousands of less scrupulous citizens strong advantages over their neighbors in matters of feeding, clothing, etc. In popular lingo there is constant reference to "category Z » in the supplying of the population. This is a humorous allusion to an unofficial but nevertheless vast category of people drawing additional food rations or orders for conșumers goods through wellplaced acquaintances, relatives or official «pull,
at present being given a big splash of publicity in the English and American journals, and it is not all publicity trash.
As the foreign population grows, those of us whi, got here early, started business of one sort or another and dug ourselves in are bound to benefit. The occasional remarks of a very rew, running down the growth of the colony, will hardly annoy the majority who watch this expansion with pleasure, either because or business interests or becanse of the perfectly healthy desire to have the Island become as popular, gay and prosperous as its limited area will permit.

The official categories, A and B, for factory workers, may be important, but the supplemenary «Category Z » is decisive, Those who can avail themselves f the proper friends and connections manage to obtain extra food supplies, another pair o boots, a railroad ticket, a theat er admission card and ot he things difficult for the ordinary mortal.
In discussing the recent decree imposing death penalttes upon persons violating socialized property a Moscow newspaper warns against various forms of petty graft wich, it insists, a as serious a blow at socialized property as outright theft. It is an open secret here th acquaintance is $t$ he strohgest possesion today, even more important than money. A friend in the co-operative organization distributing alothes may be surer method of purchasing dress than any a mount money

This seemingly innocent pett gratting and tavoritism is a direc result, of course, of the increas ing scarcity of goods. Thousands of persons hold jobs where the wages are smailer merely be cause they can remain closer to supplies of deficit goods. Money is not a temptatin, Food, cloth es, household goods, a gram aphone or radio thesese the temptations. For these peo ple change their jobs, thei city of residence and especially their friends.

## PEIPING LETTER

## Peiping, China. - Peiping's

 population now has reached the $1,500,000$ mark and the increase of nearly half a milion souls chietly is due to refugees from Manchuria. When the capital of China was :moved from Peiping five years ago it was expected that shortly the foreign le gations would follow Chinese officialdom to Nanking and that this city would become of little consequence, largely because it lacks trade and commerce.But Legations remain here and at present there is no indication that they will be transterred to Nanking. Ministers and members ot Legation staffs are able to travel to Nanking and Shanghai at their conveniencé and there appears to be no disposi tion to abandon the costly, perties in the Legation quarte here.
he Japanese action in ousting Marshal Chang Hsue-liang from Mukden more than a year ago served to give Peiping a new lease on life. The extension of of Japanese military influnce throughout Manchuria sent hundreds of Chinese officials and their numerous followers scurrying here. During recent months the guerrilla warfare in Manchuria has caused addition al refugees to flock here with the result that the city is facing an acute housing shortage.
