## RECOVERY ACT DECISION

## Newark, Thursday

For the third time within a fort night a Federal Judge has ruled against the Recovery Act. Justice Fake decided here yesterday that the Act is unconstitutional in respeet to the authority to regulate intrastate commerce, and granted the $\mathrm{Acme}_{\mathrm{e}}$ Company an injuction restraining the government from enforcement of the Fabricated Metal code, with which the Acme Company is concerned.
Presumably the Supreme Court has still to pronounce its ultimate dictum on these issues. But the Supreme Court has been in the habit of supporting the majority of the lower courts in cases against the Recovery Act.
Meanwhile a national coal strike looms on the lowering horizon, the Mineworkers' Union demanding a arisen.

The sensational developments which were expected yesterday in the trial of Herr Rintelen, the former Austrian Minister to Rome who is accused of having had a leading hand in the revolt in Vienna of last July, failed to materlize.
The state's star witness and Herr Rinteient/s former valet, Ripoldi, was on the stand yesterday. Ripoldi had recently addressed a long tele-
gran to the court from Milan, with the information that Herr Rintelen had been repeatedly visited in the Austrian legation in Rome by a man who gave the name of Rudoif Williams.
This Rudolf Williams was sup posed to be identical with the alleged National-Socialist agent Weidenhammer, a fact which would refute the statement of Herr Rintelen that he had never had any secret dealings with the Austrian National-Socialists.
In his testimony yesterday Ripoldi reiterated that the myster ious williams had visited Herr Rintelen six or seven times but he failed to adduce any proof of Williams' being identical with Weidenhammer, since his assertion that Williams wore a moustache did not harmonize with the statement by another witness for the prosecution who described Weidenhammer as clean-shaven.
Ripoldi's testimony lost even
more in value when it was brought
e out that the cost of the telegram e he had addressed to the court from Milan was paid by the banker Castiglioni, who in the years following the war had played a somewhat questionable role in Austrian e finance and polities, and who subsequently acquired Italian citizenship and is now living in Milan. Mention or Castiglioni's name aused a considerable stir in the

## TURKEY AND EGYPT

## CABINET'S PLANS

## Athens, Thursday

Part of the defeated insurgen Greek Fourth Army Corps, pursu d by Government troops, is seek ng refluge in Turkish territory, cording to a message receive ere today from Istanbul.
A military train consisting ve coaches and filled with rebe fficers and men is standing on he Orient line between the Greek and Turkish frontier stations of Pythion and Usunkueppue, whil their representatives negotiate with the Turkish authorities for permission to cross the frontier Small detachments of the insurgents have succeeded in crossing位 Maritza river at other places, hus entering Turkish territory, where they were immediately disarmed.
The Egyptian Government is be ng placed in an awkward dilemma by the presence in the port of Alexandria of the Greek rebel steamer Kerkyra, which is commanded by Second Officer of the cruiser Giorgios Averoff.

## Charge of Piracy

The Greek Minister in Cairo demanded that the vessel and her rew be seized as pirates. Had the Egyptian Government consented he prisoners would have been handed over to the Greek authorties for trial, in accordance with xisting treaties.
That course however was block$d$ by the existence in Alexandria of a powerful and influential Greek colony, which sympathises with the Venizelist cause and threatened reprisals if the demand was granted. To avoid further complications the Egyptian Government ordered the steamer to leave port immediately.
The crew refused to go, What measures the Egyptian Government will adopt next is the sub ject of animated conjecture in Alexandria and Cairo.
The cruiser Giorgios Averoff arrived yesterday at Salamis arsenal Before surrendering the ship to the Government the crew had given M. Venizelos and other rebel leaders a passage to safety in th Italian Dodecanese Islands.
Complete order has now been restored throughout Greece. Interrupted telephone and railway connections have been restored, the order prohibiting foreign aeroplanes from flying over Greece has ibeen rescinded, and two mobilised classes of reservists are being sent

## TO BE TRIED IN ABSENCE

Rome, Thursday
Goodbye to Greece and goodye to politics for ever,> said M Venizelos, ex-President and exPremier of Greece and leader of the defeated insurrection, in an interview granted to Italian press representatives shortly after his ar rival in the island of Kas-
os, in the Italian Dodecanese, where he is now interned.
The aged politician-he raised the flag of revolt in Crete on his seventy-first birthday, March 3went on to say that he wished Greece a great future, to achieve which had always been the object of his efforts. The unsuecesful revolution, he sald, had been honourable in its aims, but he himself ad not wished for methods of iolence.
M. Venizelos stoically accepted his internment for the time being apparently hoping that when relase comes he will be able to live n exile in France or Italy. He appeared resigned to the fact that he vould not be able to return home. The Italian authorities have aleady declared that they consider he fugitive leader a political exile. He will therefore not be liable to extradition to Greece, where proceedings are to be instituted against him in absentia.
The same procedure is to be folowed with regard to General Kamenos, leader of the rebel forces in Macedonia, and other fugitives who have succeeded in making their escape abroad. About 300 othor leaders of the insurrection will be tried by court martial, and General Kondylis, Minister of War, has stated that they will be punished severely.
M. Pistolakis, a relative of M . venizelos, was arrested in Athens yesterday. He is said to have spent onsiderable sums of money in financing the revolt.

## SNOW, FIRF AND EARTHQUAKES

A series of hich caused considerabi shocks is reported today from Murcia.
The first tremor was felt at night fall, and caused great alarm among the population, everyone rushing out into the streets. Several buildings were damaged, and in others furniture was overturned and pictures fell from the walls.
A second shock occurred at 9 p.m. It was of short duration and caused no serious damage.
«Enormous loss» is reported have been caused in Manresa by a fire in a sawmill owned by Don José Corominas. The flames destroyed not only a large supply of timber, but also the machinery of the mill.
The, M.Z.A. railway company i only issuing tickets as far as Por Bou, as the blizzard is preventing them from making connection with the French trains. Ribas station is blocked by a train which is snowed up and unable to move.
Yesterday's express from Madrid arrived here an hour and forty minutes behind time owing to a block on the line near Riudecañas. Three trucks of a goods train had derailed in a tunnel there owing to the breaking of an axle.
Telegraph connections with the Pyrenean towns and villages are being maintained with great difficulty. Snow lies sixty centimetres deep at Puigcerda, and is still fal ling heavily.
The storm has caused some damage in Barcelona, particularly in the Horta district, where some thirty pine trees were torn up by the roots. Mail boats and other regular liners are arriving behind their schedules, and considerable damage has been done to small boats at Casa Antunez, but the wind is beginning to fall.

The funcion of those organisms is to take care of recruiting for the navy, preparation for naval mobilisation, and other administrative matters, n all of which they are subordinte to the commanders of the chief haval bases.
The Comandancia for the Balearics is to be at Mahon, which is the headquarters of the officer commanding the Balearics nava base. Other comandancias are established at Barcelona, Valencia, Málaga, Seville, Gijón and Billbao and for the North of Africa and the Canary Islands.
Each comandancia will be com manded by a captain, commande or lieutenant-commander, accord ing to its size and importance.

How M. Flandin will deal with the situation is not yet known. It s expected however that he will submit some kind of a compromise proposal to the Chamber tomorrow.
