At the sound of the shot every warrior in sight sprang to the ready, the guard turned out as far away as the cavalry barracks down by the harbour and clients on the terrace of a nearby café leaped for the safety of the inside, overturning chairs and tables in their haste, while the barman of the kiosk disappeared down behind his bar.

A waiter emerging from the café with a full tray of glasses of beer was swept away by the oncoming tide of clients and dropped everything, giving every client a toper's christening. Sir John just stood alone in the midst of it all, glass in hand and topee on brow, and laughed till the welkin rang. Asked why he did not take cover he pointed out that he was the only civilian in sight, and when the only unofficial person in the street starts to run just after a gun has gone off, people are apt to jump to conclusions.

Mr. Adolf Buettner gave a farewell party which, despite all the festivities in Palma, seemed to be quite a success. Mr. Buettner is not too certain as to when he will leave Mallorca, but it apparently made little difference to his guests. And by the way, what has happened to Mr. Hal Wodf? He went to Ibiza last week-end and has not been seen since. His wife, we see, is back from Cala Ratjada.

BOAT:—

It's terrible the way we ramble, but speaking of boats reminds us that Sir John Dunn has become one of Palma's houseboaters. He is living here just now aboard a sturdy, comfortable sailing-cum-motor craft which has become the joint possession of him and of Captain G. E. B. Barkworth. We hasten to add that the vessel is not intended to be always or usually stationary, and that Sir John has not given up his house at Puerto de Andrait.

Captain Barkworth, who left for a short visit to England about a fortnight ago, is now understood to be on his way back and will doubtless get back on the Island as soon as communications become normal again.

DIPLOMAT:—

A notable visitor to the Island who arrived last Sunday is Don Matias Errazuriz, ex-Minister Plenipotentiary in Belgium and Ambassador to the Argentine Republic of the Republic of Chile. He has come from Paris to visit his friends the Señores Saridakis and to acquaint himself at first hand with the beauts of Mallorca, many of which he has already found time to see and admire.

The diplomat is also a connoisseur of art who possesses a considerable collection, including sculptures by Rodi, Casteaux, Trupeskol and others, and paintings by artists of the calibre of Sorolla and Rusiñol.

ISLAND COMMANDER'S REASSURANCES FOR FOREIGNERS

AERIAL «ACT OF PIRACY» CONDEMNED IN EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW

«It was an act of piracy,» Colonel Feijóo, acting Military Commander and Civil Governor of the Balearics, told a Palma Post reporter on Thursday afternoon. «Only a pirate ship or a gang of pirates would send aeroplanes to bomb an open town where there are women and children and foreigners.»

The interview took place in his office at the Gobierno Civil. Two minutes earlier, while the reporter waited in an ante-room, two planes had attempted to bomb the building and been driven off by machine gun fire from the Civil Guard barracks and other neighbouring buildings.

«There is absolutely no cause for alarm,» the Governor went on. «This attack is an attempt to cause panic and demoralise our people, and you see it has not succeeded. Our morale and enthusiasm are immense, and Palma is completely tranquil.»

«The commander of the British warship (H.M.S. Devonshire) was here yesterday and we had an extremely cordial interview. Foreigners may rest assured that everything has been arranged for their safety.»

«The official bulletin reporting the progress of the movement will be broadcast tonight in English as well as in Spanish.»

BRITAIN'S EYES ON MALLORCA

It is with some feeling of assurance that we re-print Lord Cranbourne's statement in the House of Lords on Tuesday night.

It is, in effect, a safeguard which says: All Britishers — and other aliens in Mallorca — will be given the protection of the British Navy should there be any cause to evacuate the island.

To date the Spanish authorities in power have not considered it necessary to clear the island of foreigners, but the order can be expected at any moment.

The Acting British Vice-Consul, Mr. Saward, has the matter well in hand. All enquiries should be addressed to the British Association, Terreno.

BRITISH WARSHIPS STAND BY

FOREIGN COLONY MAY EMBARK

ALL PREPARED

Two British warships will be available at a moment's notice to remove foreigners from Palma should the situation become dangerous.

On receiving the warning those who mean to leave are to assemble at the British Association, Short's Tea Room, Calle 14 de Abril. Embarkation will take place from Los Pinos.

Sailors from H.M.S. Devonshire, which was anchored in the Bay just outside the harbour, kept watch on the roof of the British Association on Thursday night. With them they had signalling apparatus enabling them to communicate with the cruiser whenever the need should arise.

All the arrangements made by the Acting Vice-Consul, Mr. George Saward, in conjunction with the commander of the Devonshire, are centred round the British Association. All foreign residents will therefore do well to keep in touch with the Association or at least make sure that their addresses are known there.

Fifteen British warships are lying off the most important Spanish ports to secure the safety of all British subjects and others who may need the protection of the British flag. One of them is the Devonshire, whose captain brought the news to Palma.

The White Ensign floating at the stern of the Devonshire was a welcome sight to the eyes of all resident foreigners when she first anchored in the Bay on Wednesday. After her commander had been ashore to learn the true state of things on the Island, visiting the Military Commander and H.M. Acting Vice-Consul, she steamed away for a flying visit to Mahón to make sure that all was quiet there.

She was back again on Thursday, when all British subjects were called to meet at the British Association while Mr. Saward went out to the warship and conferred with the captain. On his return the arrangements set forth above were communicated to the waiting throng.

It is understood that there is no foundation for the rumour that a British yacht had been sunk at Mahón.
