# ISLAND COMMANDER'S REASSURANCES FOR FOREIGNERS

## **AERIAL «ACT OF PIRACY» CONDEMNED** IN EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW

«It was an act of piracy,» Colonel Feijóo, acting Military Commander and Civil Governor of the Balearics, told a Palma Post reporter on Thursday afternoon. «Only a pirate ship or a gang of pirates would send aeroplanes to bomb an open town where there are women and children and foreigners.»

The interview took place in his office at the Gobierno Civil. Two minutes earlier, while the reporter waited in an anteroom, two planes had attempted to bomb the building and been driven off by machine gun fire from the Civil Guard barracks and other neighbouring buildings.

«There is absolutely no cause for alarm,» the Governor went on. «This attack is an attempt to cause panic and demoralise our people, and you see it has not succeeded. Our morale and enthusiasm are immense, and Palma is completely tranquil.

«The commander of the British warship (H.M.S. Devonshire) was here yesterday and we had an extremely cordial interview. Foreigners may rest assured that everything has been arranged for their safety.

## **BRITISH WARSHIPS** STAND BY

## FOREIGN COLONY **MAY EMBARK**

#### **ALL PREPARED**

Two British warships will be available at a moment's notice to remove foreigners from Palma should the situation become dangerous.

On receiving the warning those who mean to leave are to assemble at the British Association, Short's Tea Room, Calle 14 de Abril. Embarkation will take place from Los Pinos.

Sailors from H.M.S. Devonshire, which was anchored in the Bay just outside the harbour, kept watch on the roof of the British Association on Thursday night. With them they had signalling apparatus enabling them to communicate with the cruiser whenever he need should arise.

All the arrangements made by the Acting Vice-Consul, Mr. George Saward, in conjunction with the commander of the Devonshire, are centred round the British Association. All foreign residents will therefore do well to keep in touch with the Association or at least make sure that their addresses are known there.

Fifteen British warships are lying off the most important Spanish ports to secure the safety of all British subjects and others who may need the protection of the British flag. One of them is the Devonshire, whose captain brought the news to Palma.

The White Ensign floating at the stern of the Devonshire was a welcome sight to the eyes of all re sident foreigners when she first anchored in the Bay on Wednesday. After her commander had been ashore to learn the true state of things on the Island, visiting the Military Commander and H.M. Acting Vice-Consul, she steamed away for a flying visit to Mahón to make sure that all was quiet

She was back again on Thursday, when all British subjects were called to meet at the British Association while Mr. Saward went out to the warship and conferred with the captain. On his return the arrangements set forth above were communicated to the waiting throng.

It is understood that there is no foundation for the rumour that a British yacht had been sunk at Mahón.
