which falls to a newspaper is that of voicing to the best of its ability the regrets of those whom it represents, on the occasion of the departure of one who has been a real friend to them all. This duty is ours today, for before the next issue of the Majorca Sun and Spanish News goes to press the retiring Consul General of the United States, Claude Ivan Dawson, with Mrs. Dawson, will be on their way to America, carrying with them the good wishes of everyone who has come into contact, officially or personally, with them during these last five years.

Perhaps the outstanding reason for Mr. Dawson's success in the important post which he has filled here is his steady interest in all things Spanish. At the outbreak of the war in

Cuba, in 1898, he was a sergeant in the District of Columbia Volunteers. This was a regiment which did not get to the front, but Sergeant Dawson was determined to get into active service, and the result of his determination was that he was appointed as assistant to the Army's Postmaster, and thus saw some extremely active service in the Cuban campaign, before those joint scourges, fever and 'embalmed beef,' laid him low with a long and serious illness. His account of the battle of Santiago Bay is characteristically modest.

«We saw ships far out to sea, almost hidden in clouds of black smoke, and we could, from our position at Daiquiri, hear the sounds of the guns, but we did not realize fully the extent and importance of what was going on. It was not until afterwards that we heard of the gallantry of those brave Spaniards under Admiral Cervera, and of the fine account our own fleet had given of itself.»

After this taste of foreign lands and the practice of the Castillian tongue, the young law student could not bring himself to return to his studies at Georgetown University, for the call of the Caribbean Islands was strong. 1899, therefore, saw him with the insular government of Porto Rico, in which he served for five years in secretarial and executive capacities. It was during this time, in 1902, that he met and married

Miss Theodosia Brock, who was a visitor to the island. Of the happiness of their married life it is not necessary to speak, since it has been an open book to all who know them and have seen what a true partnership it is. Mrs. Dawson has been by her husband's side ever since, during his service in Washington with the Interstate Commerce Commission and the following years of consular work which began with his appointment, after examination, as Consul at Puerto Cortes, in June, 1910, and are ending this week with his farewell to Barcelona.

Mr. Dawson was secretary of the Peace Conference in Honduras in 1911, a time which he characterizes as the most interesting of his life, when, in order to attend the installation of the new president, it was necessary to spend

nearly eight days on horseback to reach the capital of the country. In 1912 he was sent to Valencia, and saw for the first time the Spain which had so strongly influenced the countries in which his work had lain until then. More than three years were spent there, until he sailed on Christmas Day, 1915, for Tampico, the first of his various posts in Mexico. Promotion had been rapid, covering three classes in a single year, and he attained the rank of Consul General during his Mexican service. where he made also the acquaintance of H.B.M. Consul General, Norman King, who was destined again to be his colleague in Barcelona.

The only break in Mr. Dawson's consistent record of service in Latin countries was when he became Consul General in Stockholm for nearly three

years, from early in 1924 until November, 1926, whence he was again sent westwards, this time to Rio de Janeiro. After a short term of service there, he became a member of the Board of Review of Foreign Service Personnel, until his appointment to Barcelona as Consul General. During his term of office here, he had, among many others, the interesting experience of making the first, and so far, the only official visit to the Republic of Andorra in its thousand-year history. For him the mayors of Andorra assembled, each with his key, and the ancient wooden safe was opened in which is guarded the charter given to the tiny republic by the great Charlemagne himself, the ancient rituals were gone through, and the classic garb was worn.

It is much to be regretted that Mr.

Dawson does not contemplate the writing of a book on the Spain that he knows so well. There is need of a book so well-informed and so wellbalanced as the one his varied experience of Spain and her daughter countries would enable him to create, but he feels that his time has come to rest, and he and Mrs. Dawson have already begun the building of their future home, in Asheville, North Carolina. There the hospitable latchstring will be left out for the friends they have made in so many lands, as well as for their own widely separated family in the United States,

since their son lives in Oklahoma, a brother in Los Angeles, and a sister in Miami. Mr. and Mrs. Dawson show no need of rest, but there is no question as to their having richly earned it, and we who have profitted by their stay among us for these five years should be the last to begrudge it to them. We feel their loss, but we hope that what is loss to us is gain to them, and they have let us feel that wherever they are we shall find a welcome, and that they may again come some day to visit us in this sunny country which is second in their hearts only to the one to which they are now returning. We are glad to have had them with us, and we wish them a hearty Godspeed on their journey. May the rosemary that perfumes the Catalan hills grow and flourish in their new garden for many happy years to come. - E. O. D.

INTERNATIONAL

On Monday, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden spoke before a crowded House of Commons. He admitted in his speech that he, as well as the balance of the British Cabinet, shared the anxiety felt by the House in regard to England's immediate future. The course which she follows in the next two years may well be a decisive factor for war or peace in Europe. Once an ardent enthusiast for disarmament, he spoke favour-ably in regard to England's decision to spend three hundred million pounds in re-arming, insisting that she was doing so in order to maintain peace. His speech was disappointing in some ways, as he refused to reveal what stand he intends to take during the coming week at Geneva in regard to oil sanctions.

Relieved from Command

Major General Johnson Hagood, in command of the Eighth Corps Area of the United States Army, has been summarily relieved of his command by direction of President Roosevelt. General Hagood recently testified in Washington before the House Appropriation Committee, at which time he criticized the Government and it is presumed that his removal comes as a result of this action. This is in spite of the fact that the War Department issued an order before the hearing freeing the testifying officers from the usual restrictions. The General is due to be retired next year, and may be kept on the inactive list until then.

BOOKS

«The Adventures of a Gadabout»

George W. Houghton

(Selwyn and Blount)

English-speaking people in Spain who have also known the French Riviera are likely to be very interested in a new book which will be on the market next week. It is «The Adventures of a Gadabout,» a tale of the travels and experiences of Mr. George W. Houghton as told and illustrated by himself.

Mr. Houghton is a versatile artist and journalist whose work is well known in Paris, and whose travels have taken him all over Spain and France; for, although his plans when he left England ten years ago were to work his passage round the world, he got no further than the French Riviera for some considerable time. The reason for this was that he was too fascinated with the various faces which the French resorts presented to him to leave them only briefly studied. It is, consequently, not only of the brighter side of the Riviera that he writes. He introduces you to the human flotsam and jetsam that has to find beds in tramway shelters, and with him you venture into Marseilles doss-houses and watch the parade of all nations that is for ever passing in and out of such places.

As editor of an English newspaper in Nice, Mr. Houghton met an extraordinary variety of notabilities. He interview ed King Carol of Roumania, caricatured King Gustav of Sweden, who signed the sketch, and had a memorable dinner with two Manchester businessmen who won 750,000 francs the first time that they played baccarat. Social lights of Monte Carlo, Deauville and Le Touquet are vividly portrayed, and the book includes chapters devoted to Sir Herbert Barker and Mr. George Bernard Shaw, with a self-portrait of the latter which he presented to the author. Of particular interest, perhaps, so far as we are concerned, are two amusing chapters of Majorca, the new «Riviera,» which com pletes a book on popular places and people by an author well trained in artistry and observation.

About 70.000 people went to the Barcelona About 70.000 people went to the Barcelona Stadium last Sunday afternoon to see this important match, the attraction being two-fold, first that Spain had won the encounter against Germany at Cologne last year and wanted to beat them again, and secondly they were feeling a bit sore at their defeat by the Austrians at the Stadio Metropolitano in Madrid last month. For these reasons they went to the Stadium at Montjuich *en masse* last Sunday afternoon full of hope and confidence, as a win over Germany

of hope and confidence, as a win over Germany would avenge Madrid.

The Germans employed the W. system, playing the greater part of the game with three forwards, four halves and three backs. This combination was your effective and they seem show. wards, four halves and three backs. This combination was very effective and they soon showed the Spaniards what kind of a team they were. They dribbled very little, with no headwork, but their passing and control of the ball was marvellous and they had their opponents guessing time after time. With little difficulty they got within reach of the Spanish goalkeeper and in the second half completely dominated the game. One can almost say that the German team playwithin reach of the Spanish goalkeeper and in the second half completely dominated the game. One can almost say that the German team played a hundred per cent better than the Spanish eleven and their triumph was due to their technique, and to the precision with which they are accustomed to play. In the second half, particularly, we saw a splendid exhibition of football. To counter this the Spaniards adopted tactics called La Furia Española, which they had employed with great success against Italy, but they played very poor football, putting none of that enthusiasm into their attacks which they have employed in other International Matches. When Fagh, the German outside left, got the ball from his Captain and beat Zamora with a fast ground shot, the Spaniards got disheartened but, in one of those wild dashes, Luis Regueiro sent in the equalizer after 33 minutes play. The Spaniards then played better football, the German goal having some very narrow shaves. When the referee blew half-time, the score being one all the excitement was tremendous.

On the resumption of play, it was clearly seen that the home eleven were a tired and beaten team and the Germans then gave us another fine exhibition. After twenty-three minutes Fagh scored the winning goal. Szepan, the Captain, and Lanz and Fagh were the most conspicuous of the German side. On the Spanish side the only men who played well were the backs, Zabalo and Aedo. In the first half particularly they did some very good work, especially the former, who distinguished himself many times. The reference was the Belgian, Langenus, and the game was played in a very sporting manner.

MARDI GRAS IN NEW ORLEANS

If one happened to land in New Orleans on the night of the Comus parade (which was last Tuesday), he would surely think himself abroad in Hades one moment and the next be inclined to believe himself stranded in paradise. For here, in this glamorous old French city, it is *fiesta*. This is *Mardi Gras*. Tipsy people, shrilling whistles, gourdes fashioned into weird music-makers, a river boat anchored at the foot of Canal Street toot-tooting to to its boiler's content, shadows of light, laughing people in crowds or singly filing down the street, little lost marionettes looking wistfully into eyes of gay-hearted strollers. Some lose the crowds and seek the Vieux Carré, the picturesque quarter of the city, seeking some purple adventure or absinthe house -for to drink absinthe on Mardi Gras is to the drinker the best of luck. Vieux Carré is the oldest quarter of New Orleans. The section has changed very little in the last hundred years, and the spirit of the French and Spanish still lingers in every nook and cranny. New Orleans, ever since the beginning, liked to smile, to laugh, to sing. And this is the season one waits for to indulge in all those little things one has wanted to for, oh! so long.... willing to pay for one's sins with the forty days of fasting that follow in the Lenten season.

Down Rampart Street, on Mardi Gras, is the real music, the real dancing. This is the negro and mulatto section. They, too, have their king-he is King Zulu, and smokes huge black Havanas and 'totes' a silver flask, which usually caresses his lips just enough to make him sincerely gay. He is followed by a retinue of negroes dressed as American Indians, savages and in other odd attire, generally accompanied by some riproaring jazz band. (This year everybody is singing «The Music Goes 'Round and 'Round!») It is the habit of King Zulu and his followers to give to the spectators lining the street some token, and so out into the crowd they hurl bananas and cocoanuts. One year they tossed hot catfish! The king's bodyguard are big, black giants, carrying on their shoulders stuffed white roosters. They dance and sing throughout the whole season. Surely no section enjoys Mardi Gras so thoroughly as the negroes.

Year after year visitors flock to the green, purple and yellow-festooned «Pelican City.» If you—or you—or you are looking for adventure, come to New Orleans when Mardi Gras comes around

This, of course. is a great mistake; but surely it is a worse mistake to take for granted, as apparently Mrs. Thomas does, that all mention of the ageless, fatalistic manana tendency must, without deeper study, immediately be classed as detrimental? When some extranjeros are trying to get a door mended, or a garden weeded, and find it takes several days even to get the job started, they smile and say, «This mañana busíness!» But it gives them a feeling of slight superiority which is quite harmless, and I doubt if anybody really takes it as seriously as Mrs. Thomas implies. Anyway, how many of us actually do today what we would rather put off until tomorrow, given the chance? And why should we? Which is what I got out of Mr. Mickle's delightful poem.



THE NEW SPANISH GOVERNMENT

A PEACEFUL CHANGE

Complaints of British Reports

TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES

Sir,-The frenzied alarm and the incursions into the future of certain London papers misrepresenting a peaceful and Parliamentary change of Government in Spain as a «Red reign and the breaking down of law,» are being read here with amazement and annoyance by

both British and Spaniards.

Readers of *The Times* will realize that the election has returned to power Señor Azaña, who, only two years ago, was effecting in Spain the only construction that has anywhere yet been realized by Parliamentary procedure and by democratic development; that since his fall this progress has been suspended, the peace seriously disturbed, and the old corruption is creeping back; that neither Señor Azaña nor his Ministers are Socialists and that, they have the support of the propertied Republicans and Reformists as well as the proletariat revolutionaries; finally, that in spite of incipient civil war and class fronts between the well-to-do and the workers the change has been constitutionally and peacefully carried out.

Some provocation there has been and some panic. For the last we are not truly without responsibility. Gibraltar hotels owe much gratitude to the B.B.C. for broadcasting on the night of the election that some of the Madrid police had joined in Communism. As *The Times* reported, the police had checked an officer who was exceeding orders and were acclaimed by a grateful crowd.

If this Left Government are not rebellious Reds, no more are the Right Opposition irresponsible reactionaries. The Right Opposition parties are showing both public spirit and political common sense. For example, the Permanent deputation of the Cortes, where the Right have

a two-thirds majority, have unanimously passed the Amnesty Bill of the Left Government.

You, Sir, could not spare us space to deal with all the misrepresentations by which the relations of two friendly peoples and the interests of our own country are being prejudiced. It is enough to point out that the previous Right Government was, if not reluctant, certainly reticent in associating itself with our action in support of sanctions in the Mediterranean, whereas the new Left Government declares itself unreservedly on our side. Again the Right Government had to rely on the incessant activity of the police, that considerably incommoded British tourists. The previous less repressive régime of Señor Azaña will now be restored. Indeed, British property-owners in Spain, like ourselves, are welcoming an event which confirms our faith in progress by democracy in Spain.







In summer there is a second evening parade.

When everyone has strolled up and down at least half a dozen times, and everybody has seen and admired everybody else, then—back into cart and camion, and so home to bed.
