ROME PACTS

Rome, Monday

Blackshirt militia, as well as many thousands of ex-service men, have applied since February 1 for enrolment in the force standing by for despatch to the East African colonies.

Such was the announcement by ice via the Azores. Signor Mussolini made in the session of the Fascist Party Grand Council on Saturday night. According to the official statement issued to the press, it drew «thunderous applause» from the twenty or so members of the Council.

«Clamorous applause» also wellcomed the statement of the military measures which have already been taken, as well as those which are being prepared, for protecting Italian interests and pacifying the native population of the East African colonies.

Pact With France

The Council also passed a resolution approving all the diplomatic steps which have resulted in the licity, it was not announced that relations between Italy and France being put on a new footing and bringing the questions which have been at issue since the World War mearer solution.
