LEFT LEADER'S **OPTIMISM**

HEADED REVOLT

«I am certain of the triumph of the Left,» declares Don Luis Companys, former President of the Generalidad de Cataluña, in an interview on the chances of next Sunday's elections, published in the current number of Mundo Grá-

The interview took place in the prison of Puerto de Santa María, where the Catalan Left leader is serving a sentence for high treason. It was he who as head of the Catalan local Government in Barcelona proclaimed the Catalan State within a Federal Republic of Spain and declared the Madrid Government illegal on October 6,

«Of Catalonia,» continues the former President, «there is no need to talk. There triumph is assured in spite of our opponents, who are very experienced in electoral pracas is known, turned them down.

«However, in any case, the landslide will be so enormous that they will not be able to snatch victory from us.»

Asked about the rest of Spain, Señor Campanys said; «I believe that the Left will win there too: the record of the Right parties assures them the verdict.
